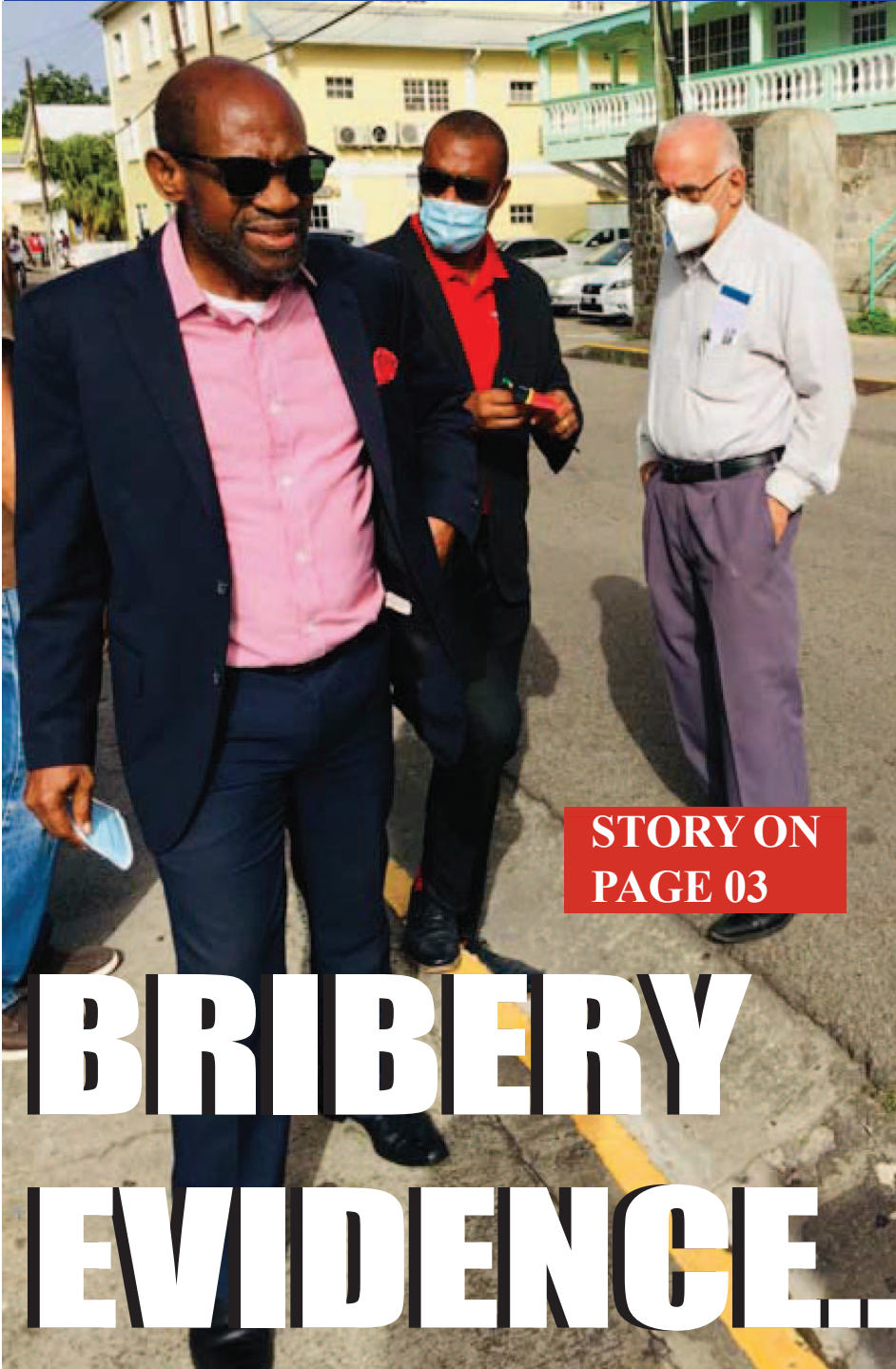

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Editorial

Corruption Incorporated Unlimited

Just like so many others across the region, we, the people of St. Kitts and Nevis, have fought, long and hard, to lift our people and our countries out of abject poverty and dismal living conditions. We have brought hope to our folk where there was none before, and we have laboured, untiringly, to open up opportunities for the following generations, so that each succeeding one would have better and ever improving opportunities.

On the African continent that has also been the case in most instances, especially in the post-colonial era.

Rather unfortunately, so many African nations have suffered the experience of falling victim to some of the most greedy and corrupt politicians, that any people could have had the misfortune to elect to govern their affairs.

But, arguably, in those cases, was it a matter of misfortune, or were they the cases of people paying for allowing themselves to be misled, either because they were naïve, greedy, or basically corrupt just like the politicians?

Several great political philosophers have, from time to time, pointed out that, in a democracy, the people get the kind of government which they deserve.

A part of what that means is that the people, who ultimately have the power, must be held responsible for those who they elect to office, and, if they are foolish, careless, indifferent or corrupt about it, they will have only themselves to blame for whatever political and economic disasters befall them.

As those who have the power, the people, should they so desire, also have the right and the means to remove from office, those who in any way betrayed their trust, or who they do not wish to have governing their affairs any longer.

Very unfortunately, it often turns out that when a people discover that they made terrible mistakes where certain political entities are concerned, removing the undesirable elements from office can often prove far more difficult and problematic than anyone could have imagined.

Steeped in the craft of deception and mamaguy, those masters and mistresses of corruption play on the people's weaknesses, and, rather than seeking to lift them to higher levels of enlightenment and awareness, they mercilessly prey on the people's vulnerabilities and the states of desperation which they, the corruptors and agents of darkness, engineered and maintained.

What is perhaps most distressing is the fact that they use the people's power to keep them, the people, in subjugation, perpetually dependent on handouts and other demeaning forms of alms, which blind them to the realities of their political and

What a travesty!

SKNLP Points To Former Gov't Minister Agreeing With Election Irregularities

BASSETERRE, St.Kitts (Friday 3rd July 2020) –The Deputy Leader of the Opposition St.Kitts-Nevis Labour Party (SKNLP), Marcella Liburd, has pointed to immediate former elected government minister Ian ‘Patches’ Liburd high court filing regarding issues of the 2020 elections which gives backup to the SKNLP’s own move to have concerns addressed via the court system too.

“Elections must be free and fair. I don’t think that there is anybody in this country who would say that these elections were free and fair! If you want to know if the elections were a travesty, look at ‘Patches’ coming to say that there were irregularities. They appointed all of the workers...and ‘Patches’ come to say that there were irregularities ...imagine that!”

She was at the time making remarks following the party’s election petition filing on Friday 26th June speaking outside the courthouse on East Independence Square Street in Basseterre, one day after (Ian) Liburd of the People’s Action Movement (PAM) in Constituency One did his petition filing on Thursday 25th June.

Meanwhile, Marcella Liburd’s remarks that day came about whilst adding to comments by Party Chairman Dr. Terrance Drew who said: “Today, the St.Kitts-Nevis Labour Party has made a step. This step is not just for partisan reasons but it really deals with the democracy of St.Kitts and Nevis. What took place in the last elections was a travesty and I don’t think that as a people and a country that we should accept it and that is why we are filing election petitions today...six of them so that people can understand exactly what took place.”

In thanking party supporters on behalf of the political organisation, he noted that “the fact that you all have come out is a demonstration that you all understand that in the last election, a lot of wrong things happened; a lot of irregularities and illegalities.”

Dr. Drew continued: “The fact that the lists were messed with, the fact that they had the Electoral

Office closed down during the week of elections, the fact that people didn’t even know which station would vote at, and so we see a lot of irregularities and illegalities taking place during the last election and we are saying to our people that we will not accept that and that is why we are here today. So these cases will be heard and the truth will be sounded.”

Following the Friday 5th June general elections, SKNLP newcomer Dr. Geoffrey Hanley beat incumbent (Ian) Liburd by 24 votes with 1658 to 1634 according to the official results.

Liburd had expressed being “totally dissatisfied”; sharing sentiments via his radio talk show programme early on about plans to challenge the matter based irregularities reports he had received.

“...I strongly believe the politics of St.Kitts and Nevis must take place in a framework of a true federal parliament democracy” he said during an episode after his courthouse visit whilst making allegations in talking about “those opposite” implying that he has been robbed of his seat.

In the election petition, he is challenging the 98 rejected ballots with claims that the majority of voters showed intent to choose him.

Liburd is also making claims about Dr. Hanley’s non eligibility to stand as the parliamentary representative because of dual citizenship status.

Days leading up to the general elections after being nominated on Wednesday 27th June, however, Dr. Hanley, during a live broadcast event, had dismissed rumors that he had US citizenship by showing his St.Kitts-Nevis passport with a US Visitor’s Visa.

Premier Brantley wants full share for Nevis from PM Harris under Charlestown Accord

Charlestown, Nevis, July 1, 2020 - With three ministers in the Federal Cabinet, the Charlestown-based Nevis Island Administration (NIA) of Premier Hon Mark Brantley, has called for an urgent meeting with the Federal Government..

Brantley has expressed the view that Nevis is not getting the percentage share that was agreed to in the Charlestown Accord in 2014 and has called for talks with prime minister Dr the Hon Timothy Harris to rectify that situation.

“There have been issues that have bedeviled the relationship between St Kitts and Nevis over the years, and one of the fundamental issues was the sharing of resources. And the Charlestown Accord sought to address that, sought to ensure that the talents that were available in Nevis were unleashed for public and national development as well. We have made good progress, for example in the area of foreign affairs, the fact that Nevisians are now participating in diplomacy a role that they had been hitherto denied and I take great pride that as minister of foreign affairs,” said Premier Brantley at a recent press conference..

“I have shepherded that particular aspect where Nevisians since 2015, and for the first time in the history of the country, are ambassadors and working in the diplomatic core at home and abroad. ... And we have seen Nevis and Nevisians getting a better share of the national resources that flow from the Citizenship by Investment Programme,” said Brantley.

According to WINNFM, premier Brantley is of the view that what was promised in the Charlestown Accord has not been fully delivered, and he wants to see that happen.

“I, however, have been on record saying and I continue to say, that the full rigor of the Charlestown Accord has not yet been implemented and that is something that I have already telescoped to the prime minister has to be done and done early in this term

to the terms of the Charlestown Accord particularly as they relate to the sharing of resources from the Citizenship by Investment Program. Those resources continue to be lopsided in terms of the share that goes to our brothers and sisters in St Kitts compared to what comes to the island of Nevis.

“And so, while Nevis is getting more than it has ever received in the history of the country, we know that we are not getting what was agreed in terms of percentage shares and that now has to be a matter of urgent discussion and resolution between the NIA and the federal government,” Brantley, who is also Minister of Foreign Affairs and Aviation in the Federal Cabinet.

The other two full time ministers in the Nevis Island Administration who are also full time federal cabinet ministers in Basseterre are Hon Eric Evelyn and Hon Alexis Jeffers.

Evelyn, who is Minister of Culture, Youth, Sports, Community Development and Telecommunications and Information in the Nevis Island Administration in Charlestown is also the Federal Minister of Environment and Cooperatives in Basseterre.

Jeffers, the Deputy Premier of Nevis and that island’s Minister of Agriculture, Lands, Housing, Cooperatives and Fisheries, Natural Resources and Disaster Management is also the Minister of Agriculture, Fisheries and Marine Resource in the Federal Government in Basseterre.

Brantley, the Premier of Nevis and that island’s Minister of Finance, Statistics, Economic Planning, Education, Library Services, Human Resources, Industry, Trade and Consumer Affairs, Health, Tourism and Information Technology, Public Utilities and Energy and Foreign Investments holds the portfolio of Foreign Affairs and Civil Aviation in the federal cabinet.

As elected representatives in the Nevis Island Administration in Charlestown and the St Kitts and Nevis National Assembly in Basseterre and holding ministerial posts in the Cabinets of the Nevis Island Administration and the Federal Government in Basseterre, Brantley, Jeffers and Evelyn are entitled to receive two ministerial salaries, two constituency allowances, two travelling allowances and two telephone allowances monthly.

Opposition Puts Bribery Evidence Before Court In Challenging All Seats Lost

BASSETERRE, St.Kitts (Friday 3rd July 2020) - The Opposition St. Kitts-Nevis Labour Party (SKNLP) is challenging, at the high court level, issues surrounding the 6 out of 8 seats lost in the 2020 general elections- conducted on Friday 5th June- with hopes that evidence of alleged bribery and other proof will see either the party's candidates appointed or another go at the polls for voters.

On Friday 26th June, the party filed the six petitions for Constituencies Two, Three, Four, Five, Seven and Eight as Constituencies Six and Two were won.

SKNLP Leader and former Prime Minister Dr. Denzil Douglas, who is the elected Parliamentary Representative for Constituency Six, gave remarks outside the courthouse (The Sir Lee Llewellyn Moore Judicial Complex) located on East Independence Square Street in Basseterre, indicating that included in evidence found is that of massive bribery.

"We have found from the evidence that there was massive corruption, there was inducement, there was bribery in a massive way. Assets of the government, assets belonging to you the people used to bribe the electorate-the voters- as to vote for them."

Dr. Douglas spoke while surrounded by his seven colleagues of the all-eight team and party supporters.

He added: "These are serious matters that we believe could have affected the outcome of the elections and thus we are asking

the court to look at the evidence, look at the petitions of our candidates and determine whether or not those who were returned were fairly and justifiably returned and if not quash the returns of the returning officer and if we do not have our candidates appointed instead then we would have a new elections, and so today, we say to you the people that that government headed by Harris is illegal- it is illegitimate and so we are asking for new elections, fair elections, fair elections, fair elections to elect our members of parliament."

The Opposition Leader touched on the absence of international observers during the general elections.

"We also want to make it clear that is why there were really no serious observers here during the elections. They did not want any international observers in the elections. They were prevented from coming because [Dr. Timothy] Harris told them if they came, they would be quarantined for 14 days and then the elections long gone after the 14 days and so we again say that the elections were fraudulent, the government is illegal and we want fresh elections."

Notably, a CARICOM Election Observer Mission arrived in the Federation on Wednesday 3rd June and a local observer team, which saw an NGO (Non-Governmental Organization) coalition comprising of The Christian Councils and Evangelical Associations of St.Kitts and Nevis supported by the St.Kitts-Nevis Chamber of Industry and Commerce), monitored the election process.

Both bodies claim that the general elections were free and fair.

Dr. Douglas thanked supporters for the tremendous support provided whilst stating that the party and its candidates were treated unfairly for the elections.

"We have been unfairly treated as a party and as candidates for the elections. While we were on lockdown, they were out there campaigning. They used all kinds of things to bribe the people of St.Kitts and Nevis and so today we say to you: we ain't taking it so at all; we ain't taking it so at all. We call for fresh elections and we say to you that the government is illegitimate and illegal..."

The SKNLP is the only organisation on St.Kitts to have had a full slate of eight candidates contesting the general elections.

The Team Unity coalition made up of three parties- People's Labour Party-PLP, People's Action Movement-PAM and also Concerned Citizens Movement- CCM on Nevis) got 6 seats on

St.Kitts and all 3 seats on Nevis, resulting in seats- 9 to 2 in the federal count.

The other successful SKNLP candidate is newcomer Dr. Geoffrey Hanley of Constituency One (East Basseterre).

Constituency Six: SKNLP Leader Denzil Douglas (1553), PLP newcomer Kevin 'Ninky' Williams (476).

Constituency Seven: PLP Leader Dr. Timothy Harris (1870), SKNLP newcomer Leon Nata -Nelson (607).

Nurseries, Preschools Asked To Get Safety Check Approval Ahead Of New School Year

BASSETERRE, St.Kitts (Friday 3rd July 2020) - In light of coronavirus (COVID-19) safety guidelines, the new Minister of Education, Jonell Powell, has informed about plans for the phased reopening of schools including the requirement of early childhood centers to get checked for approval ahead of the new school year in September 2020.

In an address to the nation on Thursday 2nd July, he disclosed that summer break will begin after Friday 10th July followed by the new school year on Monday 7th September 2020.

“Having determined that the school year starts on 7th September 2020, the Ministry of Education will take a phased approach to the physical reopening of learning institutions. The phased approach to the return of students is necessary in order to ensure that schools can effectively implement and sustain the health, hygiene, and safety protocols and where possible establish and maintain reasonable measures for physical distance in keeping with the school context. The efforts, in this regard, are informed by the recommendations outlined in documents from UNICEF, UNESCO and CARPHA regarding the reopening of educational institutions. Additionally, the Ministry of Education continues to work closely with the National COVID-19 Task Force.”

On the topic of the early childhood centers, he had this to say: “We’re currently working together to address the needs of the early childhood sector to explore the phased opening of this very critical sector. As a nation, we’re moving towards effectively living and working with the threat of COVID-19, and as more and more of our citizens transition back to the workforce, the care and welfare of our youngest citizens will remain of utmost priority thus the Ministry of Education, through its Early Childhood Development Unit, and in conjunction with the National Task Force for COVID-19 will begin the process of a phased approach to reopening the early Childhood sector on a case by case basis.”

The Education Minister told that proprietors and supervisors of nurseries and preschools are asked to contact the Early Childhood Development Unit at 466-2810 for guidance on the application process to commence the review of your facilities in light of the COVID-19 safety requirements.

“Once the Early Childhood facility has been determined to be compliant with the new safety and health protocols of the early childhood sector, then that nursery or center would be able to secure approval for reopening.”

In regard to the end of the school year, he outlined that: “Recognising that many of our teachers and students have been engaging in online

Illegal Immigrants Found On Premises Of Local Homeowner Not Officially COVID-19 Negative

BASSETERRE, St.Kitts (Friday 3rd July 2020)- Thirteen (13) adult male Haitians found by local authorities occupying the space of a homeowner in Keys Village, having recently entered the island illegally, are currently being monitored for coronavirus (COVID-19) symptoms though first testing resulted in negative results.

Homeowner Mervin Maynard has been charged with harboring those immigrants after they were found on his premises.

Reportedly, a joint search was conducted on Maynard's premises on Monday 22nd June by the Police and the St. Kitts and Nevis Defence Force.

Information coming from the Police Public Relations Department indicates that he was formally arrested and charged for the offence of Harbour Persons who Entered the Federation Illegally which is contrary to section 31 (d)(1) of the Immigration Act 2009 of the revised edition of the laws of the Federation.

Maynard was charged on Friday 26th June.

A total of thirteen (13) nationals of Haiti were on his premises; three of which fled and evaded the Police, but were later apprehended.

According to police, they arrived in Keys on Sunday 21st June by boat from the island of

Dominica.

In regard to the monitoring of these immigrants, the Ministry of Health informed on Sunday 28th June that the public health team of the ministry evaluated all immigrants and that they received

their first molecular COVID-19 tests.

As told: "The Ministry received the 13 laboratory results, which are all negative for coronavirus. The Government is providing accommodations for the immigrants and they are being monitored for COVID-related symptoms."

An official from the Ministry reconfirmed that that day that it had been 70 days since the announcement of the last COVID-19 case in the Federation.

All of the Federation's 15 confirmed cases have recovered and there are no active cases at present.

instructions since the physical closure of our schools, the Ministry of Education has taken a decision that provision of instructions will end on 10th July 2020 as was scheduled on the academic calendar. This means that there is no extension of the academic school year."

"As such, public school students in St.Kitts and Nevis will commence their summer break after 10th July 2020. Where there are school matters to complete, teachers are required to avail themselves for the completion of all duties. Students who are scheduled to write over CSCE examinations for 13th July 2020 would be expected to report to their schools' examination centres very early for each examination in light of new protocols for assessing examination spaces at schools, students registered for exams are encouraged to get to their schools at least one hour of every examination time."

The Education Minister said the first school term is proposed to end on Friday 11th December 2020.

"It is the intention of the Ministry of Education for student-teacher engagement to be maximized during this period thus the processes of teaching, learning and assessment are expected to accentuate until 4th December 2020. The days of 7th to 11th December 2020 are designated for grading and record keeping. This allows teachers a period for uninterrupted marking and updating of records. Parents and guardians can therefore begin to collect reports for term one from 14th December 2020."

According to Powell, "As we look towards the next academic year, the Ministry is staunchly committed to the course of action which will increase student contact time and minimize loss of learning."

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As jobs crisis deepens, ILO warns of uncertain and incomplete labour market recovery

GENEVA (ILO News) – The number of working hours lost across the world in the first half of 2020 was significantly worse than previously estimated, while the highly uncertain recovery in the second half of the year will not be enough to go back to pre-pandemic levels, even in the best scenario, and risks seeing continuing large scale job losses, warns the International Labour Organization (ILO).

According to the ILO Monitor: COVID-19 and the world of work: 5th Edition, there was a 14 per cent drop in global working hours during the second quarter of 2020, equivalent to the loss of 400 million full-time jobs (based on a 48-hour working week). This is a sharp increase on the previous Monitor's estimate (issued on May 27), of a 10.7 per cent drop (305 million jobs).

The new figures reflect the worsening situation in many regions over the past weeks, especially in developing economies. Regionally, working time losses for the second quarter were: Americas (18.3 per cent), Europe and Central Asia (13.9 per cent), Asia and the Pacific (13.5 per cent), Arab States (13.2 per cent), and Africa (12.1 per cent).*

The vast majority of the world's workers (93 per cent) continue to live in countries with some sort of workplace closures, with the Americas experiencing the greatest restrictions.

Second half of 2020

The new Monitor presents three scenarios for recovery in the second half of 2020: baseline, pessimistic and optimistic. It stresses that the long-term outcome will depend on the future trajectory of the pandemic and government policy choices.

The baseline model – which assumes a rebound in economic activity in line with existing forecasts, the lifting of workplace restrictions and a recovery in consumption and investment – projects a decrease in working hours of 4.9 per cent (equivalent to 140 million full-time jobs) compared to Q4 2019.

The pessimistic scenario assumes a second pandemic wave and the return of restrictions that would significantly slow recovery. The consequence would be a fall in working hours of 11.9 per cent (340 million full-time jobs).

The optimistic scenario assumes that workers' activities resume quickly, significantly boosting aggregate demand and job creation. With this exceptionally fast recovery, the global loss of working hours would fall to 1.2 per cent (34 million full-time jobs).

Impact on women

The Monitor also finds that women workers have been disproportionately affected by the pandemic, creating a risk that some of the modest progress on gender equality made in recent



decades will be lost, and that work-related gender inequalities will be exacerbated.

The severe impact of COVID-19 on women workers relates to their over-representation in some of the economic sectors worst affected by the crisis, such as accommodation, food, sales and manufacturing. Globally, almost 510 million or 40 per cent of all employed women work in the four most affected sectors, compared to 36.6 per cent of men.

Women also dominate in the domestic work and health and social care work sectors, where they are at greater risk of losing their income and of infection and transmission, and are also less likely to have social protection. The pre-pandemic unequal distribution of unpaid care work has also worsened during the crisis, exacerbated by the closure of schools and care services.

Key challenges ahead

While countries have adopted policy measures with unprecedented speed and scope, the Monitor highlights some key challenges ahead:

- Finding the right balance and sequencing of health, economic and social and policy interventions to produce optimal sustainable labour market outcomes.
- Implementing and sustaining policy interventions at the necessary scale when resources are likely to be increasingly constrained.
- Protecting and promoting the conditions of vulnerable, disadvantaged and hard-hit groups to make labour markets fairer and more equitable.
- Securing international solidarity and support, especially

for emerging and developing countries.

- Strengthening social dialogue and respect for rights.

“The decisions we adopt now will echo in the years to come and beyond 2030. Although countries are at different stages of the pandemic and a lot has been done, we need to redouble our efforts if we want to come out of this crisis in a better shape than when it started,” said ILO Director-General Guy Ryder.

When France Extorted Haiti - The Greatest Heist In History

After enduring decades of exploitation at the hands of the French, Haiti somehow ended up paying reparations - to the tune of nearly \$30 billion in today's money.

In the wake of George Floyd's killing, there have been calls for defunding police departments and demands for the removal of statues. The issue of reparations for slavery has also resurfaced.

Much of the reparations debate has revolved around whether the United States and the United Kingdom should finally compensate some of their citizens for the economic and social costs of slavery that still linger today.

But to me, there's never been a more clear-cut case for reparations than that of Haiti.

I'm a specialist on colonialism and slavery, and what France did to the Haitian people after the Haitian Revolution is a particularly notorious example of colonial theft.

France instituted slavery on the island in the 17th century, but, in the late 18th century, the enslaved population rebelled and eventually declared independence.

Yet, somehow, in the 19th century, the thinking went that the former enslavers of the Haitian people needed to be compensated, rather than the other way around.

Just as the legacy of slavery in the United States has created a gross economic disparity between Black and white Americans, the tax on its freedom that France forced Haiti to pay - referred to as an "indemnity" at the time - severely damaged the newly independent country's ability to prosper.

The cost of independence

Haiti officially declared its independence from France in 1804. In October 1806, the country was split into two, with Alexandre Pétion ruling in the south and Henry Christophe ruling in the north.

Despite the fact that both of Haiti's rulers were veterans of the Haitian Revolution, the French had never quite given up on reconquering their former

colony.

In 1814 King Louis XVIII, who had helped overthrow Napoléon earlier that year, sent three commissioners to Haiti to assess the willingness of the country's rulers to surrender. Christophe, having made himself a king in 1811, remained obstinate in the face of France's exposed plan to bring back slavery.

Threatening war, the most prominent member of Christophe's cabinet, Baron de Vastey, insisted, "Our independence will be guaranteed by the tips of our bayonets!"

In contrast, Pétion, the ruler of the south, was willing to negotiate, hoping that the country might be able to pay France for recognition of its independence.

In 1803, Napoléon had sold Louisiana to the United States for 15 million francs. Using this number as his compass, Pétion proposed paying the same amount.

Unwilling to compromise with those he viewed as "runaway slaves," Louis XVIII rejected the offer.

Pétion died suddenly in 1818, but Jean-Pierre Boyer, his successor, kept up the negotiations. Talks, however, continued to stall due to Christophe's stubborn opposition.

"Any indemnification of the ex-colonists," Christophe's government stated, was "inadmissible."

Once Christophe died in October 1820, Boyer was able to reunify the two sides of the country.

However, even with the obstacle of Christophe gone, Boyer repeatedly failed to successfully negotiate France's recognition of independence. Determined to gain at least suzerainty over the island - which would have made Haiti a protectorate of France - Louis XVIII's successor, Charles X, rebuked the two commissioners Boyer sent to Paris in 1824 to try to negotiate an indemnity in exchange for recognition.

On April 17, 1825 the French king suddenly changed his mind. He issued a decree stating France would recognize Haitian independence but only at the price of 150 million francs - or 10 times the amount The US had paid for the Louisiana territory.

The sum was meant to compensate the French colonists for their lost revenues from slavery.

Baron de Mackau, whom Charles X sent to deliver the ordinance, arrived in Haiti in July, accompanied by a squadron of 14 brigs of war carrying more than 500 cannons.

Rejection of the ordinance almost certainly meant war. This was not diplomacy. It was extortion.

With the threat of violence looming, on July 11, 1825 Boyer signed the fatal document which stated, "The

present inhabitants of the French part of St Domingue shall pay ... in five equal installments ... the sum of 150,000,000 francs, destined to indemnify the former colonists."

French prosperity built on Haitian poverty

Newspaper articles from the period reveal that the French king knew the Haitian government was hardly capable of making these payments, as the total was more than 10 times Haiti's annual budget.

The rest of the world seemed to agree that the amount was absurd. One British journalist noted that the "enormous price" constituted a "sum which few states in Europe could bear to sacrifice."

Forced to borrow 30 million francs from French banks to make the first two payments, it was hardly a surprise to anyone when Haiti defaulted soon thereafter. Still, the new French king sent another expedition in 1838 with 12 warships to force the Haitian president's hand.

The 1838 revision, inaccurately labeled "Traité d'Amitié" - or "Treaty of Friendship" - reduced the outstanding amount owed to 60 million francs, but the Haitian government was once again ordered to take out crushing loans to pay the balance.

Although the colonists claimed that the indemnity would only cover one-twelfth the value of their lost properties, including the people they claimed as their slaves, the total amount of 90 million francs was actually five times France's annual budget.

The Haitian people suffered the brunt of the consequences of France's theft. Boyer levied draconian taxes in order to pay back the loans.

And while Christophe had been busy developing a national school system during his reign, under Boyer, and all subsequent presidents, such projects had to be put on hold.

Moreover, researchers have found that the independence debt and the resulting drain on the Haitian treasury were directly responsible not only for the underfunding of education in 20th-century Haiti, but also lack of health care and the country's inability to develop public infrastructure.

Contemporary assessments, furthermore, reveal that with the interest from all the loans, which were not completely paid off until 1947, Haitians ended up paying more than twice the value of the colonists' claims.

Recognizing the gravity of this scandal, French economist Thomas Piketty acknowledged that France should repay at least US\$28 billion to Haiti in restitution.

A debt that's both moral and material

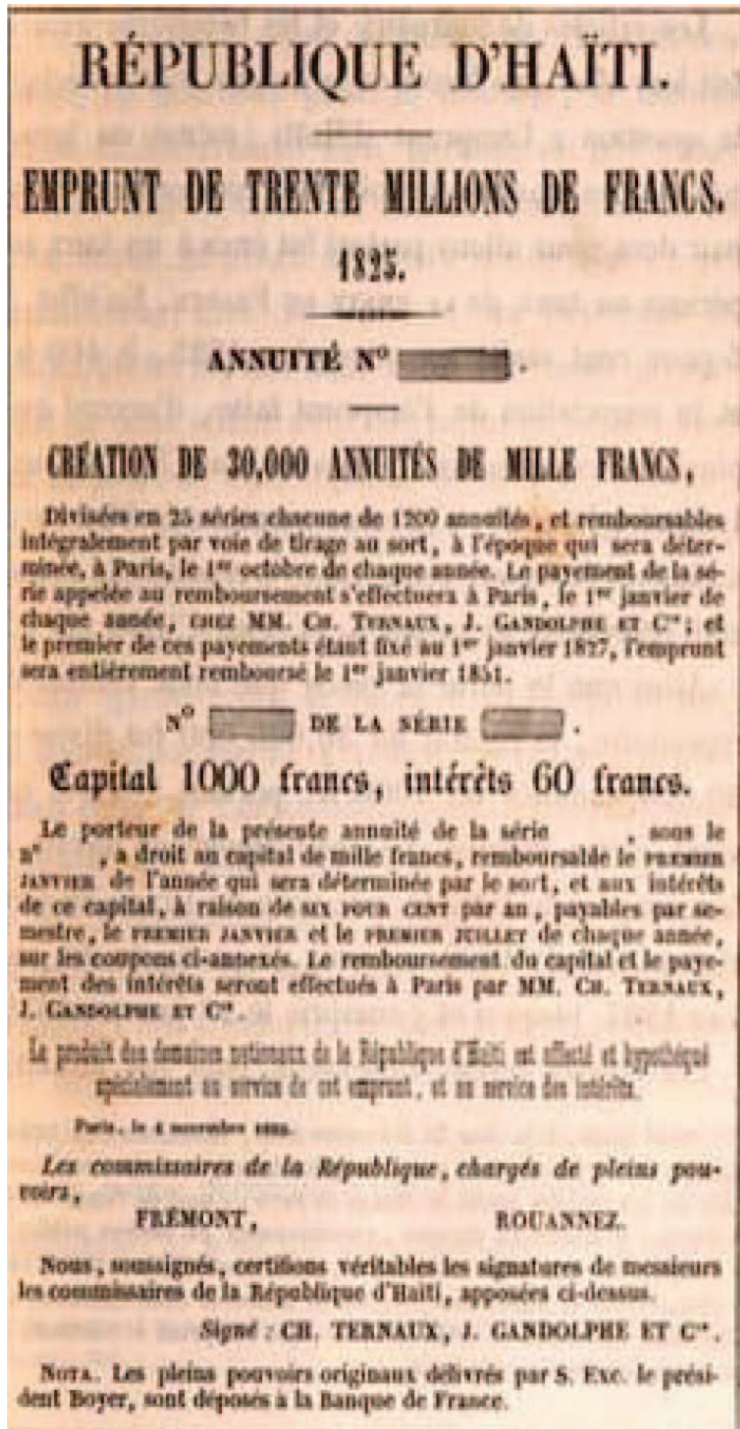
Former French presidents, from Jacques Chirac, to Nicolas Sarkozy, to François Hollande, have a history of punishing, skirting or downplaying Haitian demands for recompense.

In May 2015, when French President François Hollande became only France's second head of state to visit Haiti, he admitted that his country needed to "settle the debt." Later, realizing he had unwittingly provided fuel for the legal claims already prepared by attorney Ira Kurzbanon behalf of the Haitian people - former Haitian President Jean-Bertrand Aristide had demanded formal recompense in 2002 - Hollande clarified that he meant France's debt was merely "moral."

To deny that the consequences of slavery were also material is to deny French history itself. France belatedly abolished slavery in 1848 in its remaining colonies of Martinique, Guadeloupe, Réunion and French Guyana, which are still territories of France today. Afterwards, the French government demonstrated once again its understanding of slavery's relationship to economics when it took it upon itself to

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financially compensate the former "owners" of enslaved people.

The resulting racial wealth gap is no metaphor. In metropolitan France 14.1% of the population lives below the poverty line. In Martinique and Guadeloupe, in contrast, where more than 80% of the population is of African descent, the poverty rates are 38% and 46%, respectively. The poverty rate in Haiti is even more dire at 59%. And whereas the median annual income of a French family is \$31,112, it's

only \$450 for a Haitian family.

These discrepancies are the concrete consequence of stolen labor from generations of Africans and their descendants. And because the indemnity Haiti paid to France is the first and only time a formerly enslaved people were forced to compensate those who had once enslaved them, Haiti should be at the center of the global movement for reparations.

Study Reveals High Prevalence Of 'Hidden' Illnesses In People With Type 2 Diabetes

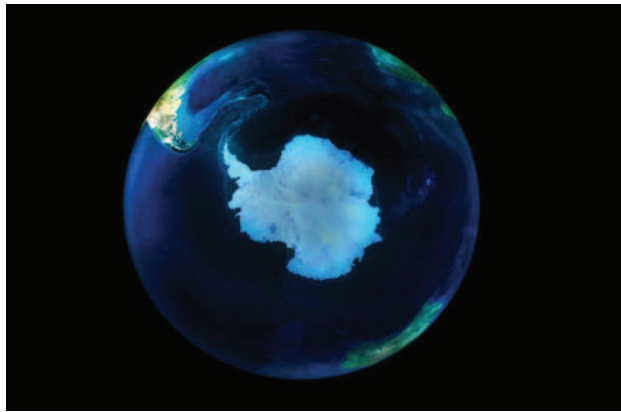

A University of Manchester study of tens of thousands of patients in England with type 2 diabetes has shown that 77% of them have at least one other physical or mental health condition.

The observational study highlights how some conditions, such as schizophrenia which is 2.4 times more likely to be present when compared to people without diabetes, are under-reported in diabetes guidelines and were previously not thought to be so strongly linked to type 2 diabetes.

The patients were also 1.8 times more likely to have depression when compared to people without diabetes, 1.6 times more likely to have asthma when compared to people without diabetes, and 1.6 times more likely to have COPD as people without diabetes.

However, the study also estimates the prevalence of conditions known to have an association with the condition - such as high blood pressure: around 52% of the 5 Million UK patients with diabetes are likely to have hypertension.

In addition, 18% of people with type 2 diabetes were also diagnosed with osteoarthritis, 24% with hyper-lipidaemia, 12.4% with depression, and 5.6% with anxiety.

The prevalence of cardiovascular disease was double in people with type 2 diabetes than people without diabetes. The results also show the prevalence of depression in people with the condition aged 16-35 was higher compared with rates observed in people aged 76 and over.

And the association with other illnesses was generally higher in women compared with men with type 2 diabetes, though the reason for this difference remains unclear. The prevalence of hypothyroidism, for ex-ample, was nearly four-times higher in women than in men with the condition.

The study - published today in BMJ Open - is the first large study in England to compare the patterns of 18 major illnesses between people with and without type 2 diabetes using primary and secondary care data.

From the Clinical Practice Research Datalink GOLD data, the team compared 108,588 people with type 2 diabetes to 528,667 people without, registered in 391 English general practices.

Linking with hospital electronic health records, they examined the annual patterns of 18 physical and mental health conditions in people with and without type 2

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Extreme Warming Of The South Pole

The South Pole has been warming at more than three times the global average over the past 30 years, according to research led by Ohio University professor Ryan Fogt and OHIO alumnus Kyle Clem.

Fogt, professor of meteorology and director of the Scalia Laboratory for Atmospheric Analysis, and Clem co-authored a paper with an international team of scientists published in the journal Nature Climate Change on the findings. According to the study, this warming period was mainly driven by natural tropical climate variability and was likely intensified by increases in greenhouse gas.

Clem, a current postdoctoral research fellow in climate science at Victoria University of Wellington in New Zealand, is the lead author of the study and studied under Fogt for both his bachelor's and master's degrees at Ohio University.

"I've had a passion for understanding the weather and fascination of its power and unpredictability as far back as I can remember," Clem said. "Working with Ryan I learned all about Antarctic and Southern Hemisphere climate, specifically how West Antarctica was warming and its ice sheet was thinning and contributing to global sea level rise. I also learned that Antarctica experiences some of the most extreme weather and variability on the planet, and due to its remote location we actually know very little about the continent, so there are constant surprises and new things to learn about Antarctica every year."

The Antarctic climate exhibits some of the largest ranges in temperature during the course of the year, and some of the largest temperature trends on the planet, with strong regional contrasts. Most of West Antarctica and the Antarctic Peninsula experienced warming and ice-sheet thinning during the late 20th century. By contrast, the South Pole - located in the remote and high-altitude continental interior - cooled until the 1980s and has since warmed substantially.

diabetes over an eleven-year study period in England.

Lead author Dr Salwa Zghebi, Presidential Research Fellow at the University of Manchester, said: "Our findings have important clinical and public health implications in the UK and beyond.

"We address the current need for more research on the coexistence of physical and mental illnesses as highlighted in a recent Academy of Medical Sciences multimorbidity report.

"And we highlight the need for future clinical guidelines in diabetes to refocus patient-centred care on non-cardiometabolic conditions such as asthma, COPD, anxiety, depression, schizophrenia, and osteoarthritis.

"Mental health is of particular concern and our data highlight a profound clinical need in young people with type 2 diabetes who might benefit enormously from mental health interventions."

She added: "These comorbidities are associated

These trends are affected by natural and anthropogenic climate change, but the individual contribution of each factor is not well understood.

Clem and his team analyzed weather station data at the South Pole, as well as climate models to examine the warming in the Antarctic interior. They found that between 1989 and 2018, the South Pole had warmed by about 1.8 degrees Celsius over the past 30 years at a rate of +0.6 degrees Celcius per decade - three times the global average.

The study also found that the strong warming over the Antarctic interior in the last 30 years was mainly driven by the tropics, especially warm ocean temperatures in the western tropical Pacific Ocean that changed the winds in the South Atlantic near Antarctica and increased the delivery of warm air to the South Pole.

They suggest these atmospheric changes along Antarctica's coast are an important mechanism driving climate anomalies in its interior.

Clem and Fogt argue that these warming trends were unlikely the result of natural climate change alone, emphasizing the effects of added anthropogenic warming on top of the large tropical climate signal on Antarctic climate have worked in tandem to make this one of the strongest warming trends worldwide.

"From the very beginning, Kyle and I worked very well together and were able to accomplish more as a team than we were individually," Fogt said. "We have published every year together since 2013, with one of our continuing collaborations being the annual State of the Climate reports. Our work on this project together each year ultimately led to this publication documenting the warming at the South Pole, however, most importantly for me, apart from being a fantastic scientist and collaborator, my family and I are both honored to consider Kyle one of our closest friends."

Caribbean Court of Justice offers parties in Guyana pathway to rule of law

There have been unhelpful and destructive attacks by leading members and zealous supporters of the APNU-AFC caretaker government in Guyana against all with whose position they disagree. The targets are international organisations, CARICOM Heads of Government, other governments that have been major partners with Guyana and their diplomatic representatives.

All these institutions, governments and their representatives have urged that the political parties in Guyana accept an undertaking they solemnly gave. That undertaking was to accept a national recount of the votes cast at the March 2 general elections as the basis for the election result.

Apart from its paid lobbyist in Washington, DC, Bart Fisher, who succeeded in printing an Opinion in the obscure publication, Washington Examiner, research has not revealed any credible supporters of the belligerent stand that APNU-AFC has adopted of rejecting the national recount which President David Granger helped to initiate and to which he said he would be bound.

The APNU-AFC stand is unfortunate. The party, or at least its two main components, the Peoples National Congress and the Working Peoples Alliance, have legitimate places in the political life of Guyana. These are places that should be preserved, because every country needs political parties that offer ideas for good governance and hold themselves ready to form a government at the will of the people as expressed at the ballot box. These parties also need the recognition of the Caribbean and international community that they are democratic entities, prepared to advance their ideas vigorously and ready to accept the judgement of the electorates.

They squander the respect and the encouragement of the regional and international community when they resort to slurs and calumny against Heads of Government and institutions as the only defence for refusing to accept a transparent and fully supervised recount that does not suit them.

The recent assaults on Barbados' Prime Minister, Mia Mottley, as Chair of the Caribbean Community (CARICOM) is loathsome. Ms Mottley carried out her duty to member states of CARICOM, including the nation of Guyana and to the Charter of Civil Society of which Guyana is a signatory. She expressed "sadness" over events in Guyana that have caused the result of an election, held on March 2, not to be declared more than three months later, and she repeated that the report of the CARICOM scrutineers "reflects the result of the recount process as certified by the very staff of the Guyana Elections Commission and witnessed by representatives of political parties".

Nothing Prime Minister Mottley said was untrue. Therefore, it is distressing that President Granger's party was encouraged to say that her statement "appears to be designed to exert undue pressure on the Caribbean Court of Justice (CCJ)". To impute to Prime Minister Mottley such a disreputable motive is unacceptable and unjust.

The CCJ has been brought into this matter as Guyana's final appellate Court. The opposition, Peoples Progressive Party (PPC/C) and others are appealing a decision of the Guyana Court of Appeal, which ordered an interpretation of the words 'more valid votes are cast' and a stay of its decision for three days. The applicants claim that the decision was wrong for many reasons, including that the Court of Appeal did not have the jurisdiction to hear and determine the Notice of Motion. The APNU-AFC has been adamant that the CCJ has no jurisdiction to hear the case, claiming that the Guyana Court of Appeal's decision is final.

Not content with making legal arguments to the CCJ to establish their case, zealots of the APNU-AFC turned to broadening their attacks to include the President of the CCJ, Adrian Saunders. In a webpage constructed for political propaganda with an undisclosed writer, they claim that St Vincent and the Grenadines' Prime Minister, Ralph Gonsalves, the longest serving Head of Government in the region who led his country to election to a non-permanent seat of the UN Security Council, is biased against them and that Justice Saunders will be influenced by his friendship with Gonsalves to rule against the APNU-AFC surrogate in the case.

The attack on Justice Saunders is reprehensible as it is baseless. In the Eastern Caribbean Supreme Court, Saunders twice found against cases in which Gonsalves was the lead attorney. Further, Saunders' judicial independence is recognised internationally, including by the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime on whose advisory board he serves. Justice Saunders will also be accompanied in the hearing by at least five other distinguished judges whose reputations are equally

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untainted.

Fortunately, those who were convinced that the judges of the Guyana Court of Appeal were compromised by familial and other links, did not similarly indulge in casting aspersions on their judicial integrity.

Luis Almagro, the Secretary-General of the Organisation of American States, summed up this sorry tale when he declared: "It is undeniable that this election has gone on long enough. The process in Guyana must be brought to an end, based on the results of the national recount, and with respect for the will of the majority of the electorate".

The justices of the CCJ offer that conclusive opportunity. They held a lengthy case management session on June 25, with all the parties concerned except the Chief Elections Officer, Keith Lowenfield, who discarded the CARICOM report of the recount and invalidated more than 115,000 votes. He chose not to make a submission or be represented by counsel, and therefore not to be questioned by the court when the case is heard. They will begin hearings, after written submissions, on July 1.

The CCJ hearing and, eventual decision, will give the parties in Guyana a chance to adhere to the rule of law, behave lawfully and salvage their own and the country's standing. They should take it.

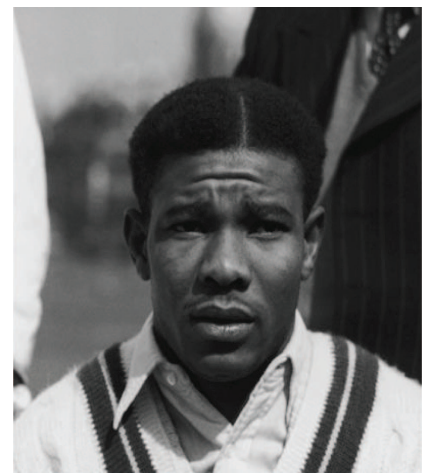
Born, Everton DeCoursey Weekes, he was a member of the famous Empire Club in Barbados, which was also home to several other legends of the game including Sir Frank Worrell, Sir Charlie Griffith and Sir Conrad Hunte.

He made his Test debut at age 22 against England at Kensington Oval in 1948 under the captaincy of George Headley. His final match was against Pakistan in Trinidad a decade later. In his career, Sir Everton played 48 Test matches and made 4455 runs at an average of 58.61 per innings. This included a world record five consecutive centuries in 1948 – scores of 141 against England in Jamaica, followed by scores of 128, 194, 162 and 101 in India. In his next innings, he made 90.

His average of 58.61 runs means Sir Everton is one of two West Indies greats, along with George Headley, in the top 10 Test averages of all time. This average has been bettered by only four

players in history to have scored more than 4000 runs. In all first-class cricket he played 152 matches and scored 12010 runs at an average of 55.34 with a top score of 304 not out.

BORDERS. CURFEWS AND SOE'S

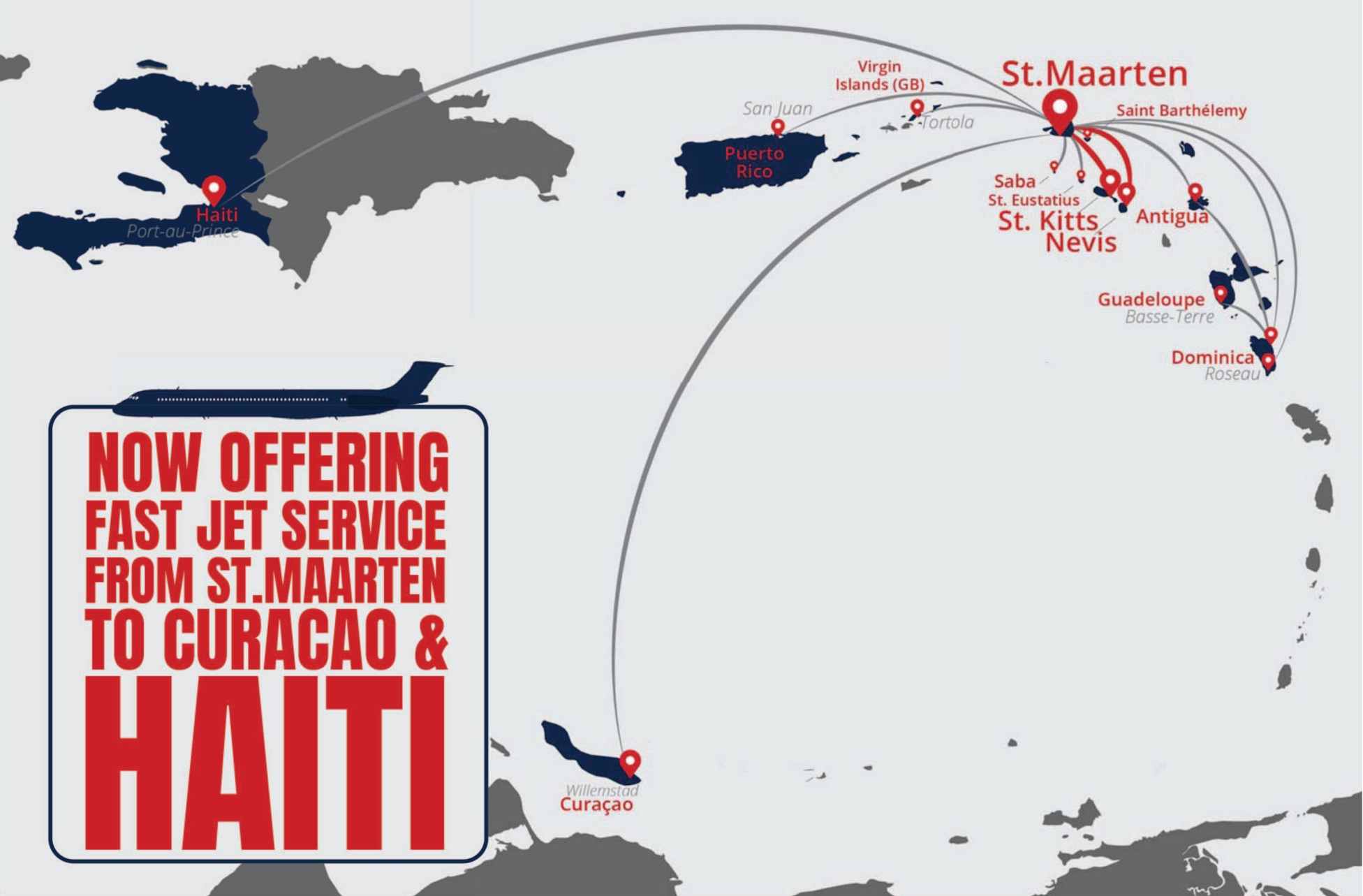
- People in de willage say dat if de lady give dat lady so much dat she carn count it, imagine what de scientist and de practical enforcers dem get.
