Editorial

Let Us Keep Democracy Alive

All across the globe there are strong indications that democracy is very much on the decline, and it is quite amazing that large segments of various populations are, apparently, happily facilitating the erosion of that for which many others worked so hard, for so long, and made great sacrifices, in numerous cases making the greatest sacrifice of all, namely losing their lives, for the benefit of others.

The recent explosion of civil protests in America, have quite literally, gone global, thanks largely to the very advanced levels of communication which most everyone now enjoys, especial that which is termed 'social media'.

On the surface, those responses appear to be in connection with race-based problems which having been plaguing that country for centuries, but there are other factors, all of which are clearly systemic in nature.

The social injustices add to the weight of the ethnic ones, and when the economic ones are factored into the mix, the resultant brew can only be that which it is, namely toxic and lethal.

When some politicians toss around certain words and phrases, they set off the chaos, mayhem and destruction which inevitably follow, and they clearly do not care about the human and other kinds of sufferings and losses which follow, just so long as they get into power, or if they are already there, they are helped to remain there.

But just why is it that these 'developments' are taking place, and how is it possible that they should be?

Many social scientists have pondered and researched those questions. The common conclusion is that there is no single reason why democracy is under threat and in such a perilous situation.

However, in every case the threat is the direct outcome of unbridled lust for money and power, the one being complimentary to the other, and each being an indispensable ingredient in the attainment of both. In other words the anti-democracy threat is sparked and fueled by the economic and political hunger of people who are driven by unhealthy desires, coupled with the fact that they devoid of morals and virtue.

One writer pointedly defined one such individual, a North American 'politician', as "a man who wants the power and fame that he feels he has been unjustly denied."

It does not require much reflection to discern the direct applicability of that assessment to our situation here in St. Kitts and Nevis.

Such creatures and their efforts could never succeed without the following and support of sizeable elements of their respective country's populations. So, just who are those that 'follow' and make it possible for the anti-democracy fiends to succeed?

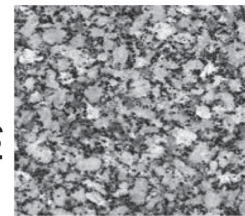
In trying to explain that phenomenon several analysts have written and spoken about what they have defined as 'the seductive lure of authoritarianism'. But, just what is that?

Many have been inclined to apply a crude, stereotype to the followers of authoritarian movements, describing them as being those that they live on the fringes, and who have been left behind by 'economic, demographic, and technological change'. But others have pointed out that there are also those followers who are

'worldly, educated, and employed'.

A careful look at the situation in a variety of countries around the world will cause one to realise that the antidemocratic, political movements have all enjoyed the support of conservative elites.

It is so because, as one writer puts it, the authoritarians need some members of the intellectual and educated elite to help them to launch and wage 'a war' on the rest of the intellectual and educated elite.

In reality it is all about 'opportunism'. Those who side with the authoritarians expect to have their 'loyalty' (such as it is) rewarded with lucrative and influential positions, contracts, or other forms of financing. However, when speaking amongst themselves or with others, they never let on to their real objectives. They will 'speak the good talk', and try to appear reasonable, objective, and 'democratic', but that is as far as any of it goes.

The authoritarians and their anti-democratic enablers do have certain traits in common. Having no grounding in any people-centered political or economic philosophy, they say whatever is convenient for the moment, and will just as quickly ignore those utterings and take actions obviously contrary to whatever it is that they said, even moments before.

For example, when in opposition, there will be talk of all those who 'bang water cum yah', and, to add to their efforts at demonising the good person they need to get out of their way, they will, without batting an eye, enable others to 'bang water' and come here to help with fooling our people into believing that we were living under a galloping dictatorship. One wonders if there is still any doubt in our people's minds as to the identity of the real dictator.

Also, the moment that they get to where they wanted to be, they ruthlessly dispense with our people and surround themselves with 'advisers' and others from elsewhere.

The authoritarians and their enablers

complained, long and loud, about our own citizens returning to take part in elections, but, having used some of them, they later turned on those same persons, as well as thousands of others, all our own, and used other 'foreigners' to undermine our people's voting power, all while keeping themselves in positions of authority, malpractices which were so blatantly practiced that thousands of our people observed candidates pulling voter IDs from their pockets and handing them to persons falsely representing themselves as some of our citizens. And all that was on Election Day, and within the precincts of the voting stations.

In addition to their anti-immigrant talk, they infamously indulge in uttering anti-communist and pro-democracy nonsense, deliberately confusing people by comparing an economic system with a political one.

They also talk up 'Law, Order, and Justice', while underhandedly instituting anti-democratic measures that seriously undermine the independence of our the nations' judiciary, police, and the media, all copied from that which is practiced on the global level.

The global threat notwithstanding, we here in St. Kitts and Nevis MUST stand firm and do our part to rescue our country and our people from the bondage of undemocratic government. It will not be easy, especially as so many of our people have taken to getting their information from hyper-partisan and deliberately polarising 'news' sources, most of which traffic in false propaganda. As one writer puts it "People have always had different opinions, now they have different facts."

But fight on we MUST, otherwise ALL will be lost, always remembering that 'Democracy Dies In Darkness'.

For our own sake, and for the good of those who will follow, let us become a guiding light that will shine against the dark and nefarious attempts to kill democracy in our beloved St. Kitts and Nevis.

Cargo Information Bill Addresses Border Control Matters

BASSETERRE, St.Kitts (Friday 4th September 2020) - The Advance Cargo Information Bill, 2020 -which is generally geared towards border control in the area of risk management- has been passed in the parliament of St.Kitts-Nevis.

On Thursday 3rd September 2020, Prime Minister and Minister of National Security Dr. Timothy Harris, during a presentation for the bill that introduced and read for the the time, commented on

its benefit saying: "Mr. Speaker, when the bill passes it is anticipated that the information provided by the advance cargo information system, would help to ensure that the customs and Excise Department would be better placed to protect the Federation and the region from threats emanating from international trade."•

He has explained that the lack of information has posed a significant challenge for the customs and Excise Department to be able to identify to a sufficient degree of certainty the threats posed by incoming consignments to the Federation.

The National Security Minister continued: "This in turn has hindered the Department in its ability to effectively implement a proper risk management system. The department has therefore found that the information derived from the manifest system has proven to be inadequate for our contemporary framework and the complex challenges now faced by border control, and of course this has to do with the importation of illicit goods into the Federation whether they be drugs, contraband, counterfeit; whatever it is those are now some of the security threats which border control all over have to relate to and respond to."•

According to him, it is anticipated that this proposed Advance Cargo Information system would come at no significant cost to

the cargo reporters. He said cargo reporters would now be able to access the system using a secure web page and they will not require specialized equipment or software to make submissions into the system.

"Additionally, Mr. Speaker, Cargo reporters, businesses and consumers would benefit from improved facilitation of legitimate cargo. At the fulcrum of this, we are attempting to ensure only legitimate cargo enters the territorial space of St. Kitts and Nevis. This improvement would flow from the expected increase in efficiency of cargo reporting having one system for submissions for multiple jurisdictions. So, once you enter one, you need not enter for each destination you would go. And, of course, the anticipated reduction of clearance times by the use of the risk assessment and the improved quality assurance."•

Dr. Harris said the Advance Cargo Information System forms a critical part of the World Customs Organization SAFE Framework of Standards and therefore, assisting participating countries to standardize and harmonize their electronic cargo information all in support of regional and international trade.

"Access to regional and international intelligence databases - which is what IMPACS [Implementation Agency for Crime and Security] would provide, through the receipt of real-time notification and pre-alerts improves the sharing of information between Customs Departments all over." •

Teacher Writes Open Letter to Minister of Education

Dear Mr. Minister, teachers are not responsible for "making up" time lost during a global pandemic. We make so many sacrifices as we raise and educate the nation's children for months without adequate breaks. Yes without breaks, most holidays we are working with the students to compensate for insufficient time assigned per subject and low levels of mastery each year. Each day we have to plan, practice and administrate in a profession with inadequate support and resources. Thus, burnouts are normalized in the teaching profession.

Moreover, the ministry of education is creating a hazard by getting the children back to school as soon as possible without proper support, or a functional plan. As a teacher, I am a resource. As a human being, I am a limited resource. So, I don't feel cared for, considered or even given an honest opportunity to make equitable contributions to this haphazard dialogue of reopening schools. The shift system seems closed and confusing.

Is my health and safety really a priority when reopening school? The students are staggered on shift to manage the amount of persons they are exposed to. However, I am expected to contact the same large number of students daily. While working an extra five hours per week yes, I will be working as soon as I enter the compound. I would be greeted with complaints and anxieties. There is no rest! There is no quiet, no stillness. The school premises are a constant state of unpredictable chaos. So, the increasing demands on the profession during a pandemic make the task even more robust. Again, teachers make so many sacrifices without

reward, and to demand this sacrifice is unconscionable and counterproductive.

How am I expected to cover the same amount of work on the curriculum in a shorter time? Mr. Minister in most instances, the time allocated previously was never enough every year. Yet teachers often take work home, work on weekends late nights around family and other commitments. Giving second, third and fourth chances to slow students on a regular basis Mr. Minister I am exhausted.

Demanding teachers work five extra hours per week is overwhelming and it puts a demand on the other essential duties a teacher is required to carry out. To show up and teach effectively involves tremendous planning. Mr. Minister, we both know proper preparation prevents poor performance of teacher and student. Hence, a teacher is required to be a master planner, practitioner, administrator and record keeper. These responsibilities are now more demanding with a blended approach as she or he has to prepare work for the e-classroom in addition to an updated and relevant prep book. Mr. Minister, we struggle with lesson planning for the physical classroom. Now we are expected to plan and present on two platforms. It's called a blended approach eh say. Hence, increasing the workload is irrational.

Evidently, Mr. Minister teaching is a rewarding yet demanding career. It comes with long hours and a heavy workload. Thus, it's easy to fall prey to teacher burnout. Therefore, as a teacher I endure greater job-related stress than other professionals. Also, with the student population rising and an increase number of bilingual students to my monolingual ability every day, I have to show up incredibly brave to overcome the many challenges of impossible workloads, endless accountability, a testing culture that's not relevant the world of work and now a blended approach with reduced contact time with the same amount of work to cover.

Obviously, Mr. Minister, an overworked teacher is detached from her students' outcomes, and feels ineffective. Teachers are usually high achievers who like to work hard and are always looking for ways to improve. Thus, educators fall prey to perfectionism and don't leave enough time for rest and recuperation with increasing working hours.

SYMPTOMS

- The most common symptoms are fever, tiredness, and dry cough.

- It can take up to 14 days for symptoms to appear.

TRANSMISSION

- Droplets from nose or mouth when infected people cough and exhale.
- Standing within one meter of an infected person.
- Touching contaminated surfaces or objects and then touching eyes, nose or mouth.
- Ageing and underlying diseases (e.g. diabetes, heart disease) increase risk.

WORKPLACE PREVENTION MEASURES

- Undertake risk assessments and implement controls.
- Explore alternative work methods.
- Share information and establish communication plans.
- Wash hands frequently and adopt good hygiene practices.

No 2020 Independence Parade

BASSETERRE, St.Kitts (Friday 4th September 2020)- Prime Minister Dr. Timothy Harris has announced that there will be no 2020 Independence Parade for the occasion of the 37th anniversary due to health and safety measures in place concerning COVID-19.

“In keeping with the new norms and to continue our leadership on the matter, Cabinet yesterday determined that: There will be no Independence Parade this year. This is to reduce the probability of the spread of the virus with thousands of participants attending the Independence Parade,” he said in a statement on the weekly Leadership Matters programme aired on Tuesday 1st September.

“This decision was a painful one, given the seminal importance of Independence at the fulcrum of our sovereign state. We encourage persons to wear national colours, carry their national flags with them and display their flags at their homes and premises. We encourage the visible display of national pride, patriotism and the showcasing of our emblems of nationhood. We encourage community activities to mark the day, mindful to comply with our COVID-19 Regulations,” he added.

Scheduled to take place, however, are a National Heroes Day commemorative event and the Prime

Minister’s Lecture Series while the usual Governor General’s cocktail reception on Independence night has been crossed off the events calendar this time around.

“In sum, Independence events in the context of COVID-19 have been modified to minimize health risks to everyone. As a consequence, some events have

been cancelled, scaled back or will be delivered virtually,” Dr. Harris commented.

According to him: “The usual cocktail reception hosted by our esteemed Governor General Sir S. W. Tapley Seaton on Independence night will not take place this year. This event would attract thousands of persons from all walks of life. Our National Heroes Day commemorative event will take place at the National Heroes Park, with social distancing and

wearing of masks being observed. The programme will be curtailed. Members of the public are invited; the dignitaries and family members will also be involved in the ceremony. The Prime Minister’s Lecture Series will be delivered this year by one of our citizens in an environment which will be more compliant with the new norms of COVID-19.”

Dr. Harris said Independence celebrations, this year, are taking place at the peak of the Hurricane Season and at a time when COVID-19 continues its rampage

around the world.

He noted that globally there are 25,327,098 cases, with 848,255 deaths recorded and 208,215 newly diagnosed cases within the last 24 hours.

“Far from being gone, COVID-19 is still with us and is doing great harm to our bodies, our economies and societies. St. Kitts and Nevis’ infection and mortality rates are among the lowest in the world. We thank God for sparing us from the deaths and containing the number of cases here to 17: the lowest number of all independent member states in the OECS, the Caribbean and the

Americas,” he expressed.

“We, however, must never be lulled into complacency, but we must continue to utilize the non-pharmaceutical measures such as the frequent washing of our hands with soap, wearing of masks, boosting our immune system and observing physical distancing all in our effort to keep COVID-19 at bay and far away,” he encouraged.

Enhanced Country Poverty Assessment Tool helping Caribbean Countries COVID response

- Tool incorporates climate change and disaster response

Bridgetown, Barbados. September 3, 2020. Governments in the Eastern Caribbean have been making use of the Enhanced Country Poverty Assessment (eCPA) toolkit, with one using it to help guide their response to the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic.

The eCPA Toolkit was developed by the Caribbean Development Bank and implemented through its Caribbean Disaster Risk Reduction Fund (CDRRF) - a multi-donor trust fund supported by the Government of Canada and the European Union. The Country Poverty Assessment Unit of the Organisation of Eastern Caribbean States (OECS) Commission also supported the research and training that was carried out during the development and roll-out of the Toolkit.

Government officials have noted that the toolkit helps take the guesswork out of determining which families require social protection programme benefits.

In Saint Lucia, the toolkit has been used to design a Survey of Living Conditions-Household Budget Survey (SLC-HBS) from which data was extrapolated to inform a national eligibility test, making the identification of vulnerable communities and individuals more scientific.

“It improves efficiency, ensuring that the right persons get the help because in the past we’ve had errors of inclusion and errors of exclusion where persons who are not poor are accessing cash transfers and persons who are genuinely

poor are excluded from it,” explained Chief Economist in the Department of Economic Planning, Tommy Descartes.

“Previous data-sets looked at income poverty, but now you’re looking at deprivation in terms of education, health, employment, which will help Saint Lucia provide better interventions to poor households,” he said.

Based on the data, Descartes said Saint Lucia will be “expanding the number of households [assessed] by 1,000 to respond to COVID-19 over the next two to three months as part of an economic resilience and recovery strategy. We will be using the instrument to ensure that the right households are getting public assistance”.

Coming on stream in 2018, the Toolkit built on the existing Country Poverty Assessment with the incorporation of climate change, disaster risk management and geographic information systems considerations.

In addition to the design of its SLC-HBS, Saint Lucia has used the Toolkit to prepare the Participatory Poverty Assessment (PPA), the Institution Assessment (IA) and Macro Socio Economic Analysis (MSEA).

While Saint Lucia is the only country so far to have used data derived from the eCPA toolkit for its COVID-19 stimulus package, other countries in the Eastern Caribbean have been using it to varying degrees but all with the same goal - boosting social registration systems to improve social protection programmes. These countries include The British Virgin Islands (BVI), Grenada, St. Kitts and Nevis, and St. Vincent and the Grenadines.

The BVI has used the Toolkit to design its Survey of Living Conditions-Household Budget Survey (SLC-HBS), the PPA, and the Institution Assessment and Macro Socio Economic Analysis, both of which are in progress. Both St. Kitts and Nevis and St. Vincent and the Grenadines have used the toolkit to conduct all of the components of the Enhanced CPA. Meanwhile, Grenada has used it to conduct the SLC-HBS and to start preparatory activities for conducting the PPA.

Descartes stated that Saint Lucia’s focus will be building on the toolkit, using it as the basis for a larger reform of the country’s social safety net system.

Project Coordinator of the ECPA in the Statistical Unit of the OECS, Geraldine St Croix, highlighted that the eCPA helps build capacity within governments, allowing administrations to do the work themselves as opposed to relying on external actors.

“For the prior rounds of the eCPA, we hired a team of consultants to do it. This time, we decided to empower Member States for the sustainable future of poverty assessments,” she said, explaining that talent gaps were created by outflows of people from across government ministries. “There are consultants that come in at times where specific skills are required, but in terms of in-country implementation of field exercises, the Member States carry it out themselves.”

The project coordinator emphasised that the data derived is used to inform evidence-based decisions affecting people’s lives.

“A wealth of information is collected from targeted poor and vulnerable communities and focus group discussions provide opportunities to hear their voices first hand. So, in terms of disaster risk reduction, the vulnerable sub-population and the data can assist in identifying measures to improve their resilience. In addition, the inclusion of poverty and vulnerability mapping in the Enhanced CPA has proved useful in pictorially displaying areas of vulnerability across [CDB’s Borrowing Member Countries] and encouraging Government to take appropriate action,” she said. 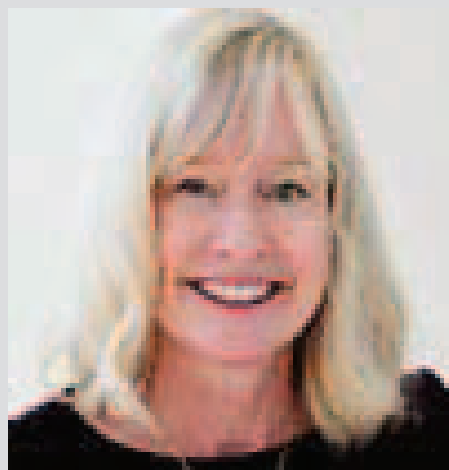



Does Forgetting A Name Or Word Mean That I Have Dementia?

The number of cases of dementia in The US is rising as baby boomers age, raising questions for boomers themselves and also for their families, caregivers and society.

Dementia, which is not technically a disease but a term for impaired ability to think, remember or make decisions, is one of the most feared impairments of old age.

Incidence increases dramatically as people move into their 90s. About 5% of those age 71 to 79 have dementia, and about 37% of those about 90 years old live with it.

Older people may worry about their own loss of function as well as the cost and toll of caregiving for someone with dementia. A 2018 study estimated that the lifetime cost of care for a person with Alzheimer's, the most common form of dementia, to be US\$329,360. That figure, too, will no doubt rise, putting even more burdens on family, Medicare and Medicaid.

There's also been a good deal of talk and reporting about dementia in recent months because of the US presidential election. Some voters have asked whether one or both candidates might have dementia. But, is this even a fair question to ask? When these types of questions are posed - adding further stigma to people with dementia - it can unfairly further isolate them and those caring for them. We need to understand dementia and the impact it has on more than 5 million people in The US who now live with dementia and their caregivers. That number is expected to triple by 2060.

First, it is important to know that dementia cannot be diagnosed from afar or by someone who is not a doctor. A person needs a detailed doctor's exam for

a diagnosis. Sometimes, brain imaging is required. And, forgetting an occasional word - or even where you put your keys - does not mean a person has dementia. There are different types of memory loss and they can have different causes, such as other medical conditions, falls or even medication, including herbals, supplements and anything over-the-counter.

Older people wonder and worry about so-called senior moments and the memory loss they perceive in themselves and others. I see patients like this every week in my geriatric clinic, where they tell me their stories. They forget a word, get lost in a story, lose keys or can't remember a name. Details vary, but the underlying concern is the same: Is this dementia?

Normal memory loss

As we age, we experience many physical and cognitive changes. Older people often have a decrease in recall memory. This is normal. Ever have trouble fetching a fact from the deep back part of your "mind's Rolodex"? Suppose you spot someone at the grocery store you haven't seen in years. Maybe you recognize the face, but don't remember their name until later that night. This is normal, part of the expected changes with aging.

What's more of a potential problem is forgetting the name of someone you see every day; forgetting how to get to a place you visit frequently; or having problems with your activities of daily living, like eating, dressing and hygiene.

Diabetes As A Consequence Of COVID-19

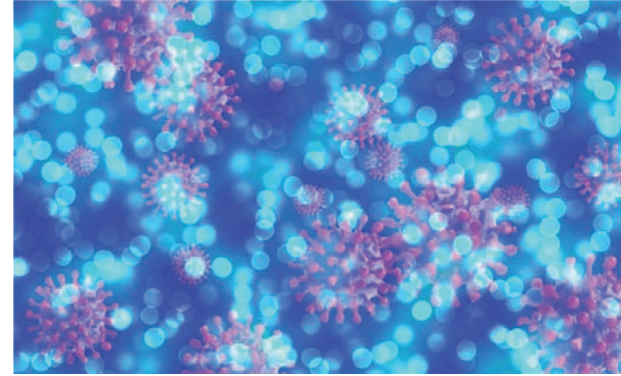

The SARS-CoV-2 coronavirus, which causes the coronavirus disease COVID-19, can penetrate many different body cells. This has been shown in multiple research papers published in recent weeks. Thus, not only can the function of the respiratory tract and the lungs be severely disrupted, but also numerous other organs.

The SARS-CoV-2 virus can also penetrate the so-called beta cells in the pancreas and damage them, as a research team involving the Cluster of Excellence "Precision Medicine in Chronic Inflammation" has now observed for the first time.

These cells are responsible for producing the insulin required for a healthy metabolism. A SARS-CoV-2 infection can apparently disrupt this function, which as a result leads to diabetes. The observations were published by Professor Matthias Laudes, Schleswig-Holstein Excellence-Chair for endocrinology, diabetology and clinical nutritional medicine at Kiel University and his research team of the Clinic of Internal Medicine I at the University Medical Center Schleswig-Holstein (UKSH), Campus Kiel, together with researchers from Munich and Dresden, in the renowned scientific journal *Nature Metabolism*.

The publication is an initial description of insulin deficiency diabetes after a COVID-19 illness, based on an observed case. "A 19-year-old patient came to us in the clinic with newly-developed severe diabetes with insulin deficiency. It could be shown that he apparently had experienced a SARS-CoV-2 infection a few weeks before," reported Laudes, who is also a member at the steering committee of the Cluster of Excellence "Precision Medicine in Chronic Inflammation" (PMI). "Such an insulin deficiency diabetes, ie type 1 diabetes, is usually triggered by an autoimmune response, in which the immune system incorrectly identifies the beta cells in the pancreas as foreign and attacks them. But this autoimmune response was not present in this patient. We assume that here, the SARS-CoV-2 virus itself attacked the beta cells."

This also fits with the fact that the beta cells possess a crucial receptor: the ACE2 receptor. The SARS-CoV-2 virus can specifically bind with this receptor. The receptor is also used by the virus as an entry point into the other body cells which it attacks.

The lead author of the publication is the medical doctor and early career researcher Dr Tim Hollstein,

who only joined the department of Professor Laudes at the beginning of this year, after a research stay at the National Institute of Health (NIH) in The US. "I am delighted that Dr Hollstein could make such an important observation as a young early career researcher. This newly-discovered metabolic disease demonstrates how important a detailed clinical and laboratory chemical characterization of COVID-19 can be for patients at a university endocrinological center," said Laudes.

Under the leadership of cluster spokesperson Professor Stefan Schreiber, the UKSH is also conducting a long-term follow-up study into COVID-19 patients under the name "COVIDOM," in which all persons reported as infected in Schleswig-Holstein will be invited to participate.

"This success of Professor Laudes and his team underlines the importance of accurate follow-up observation after COVID-19. We are certain that as a result of this disease, even more health-relevant metabolic problems can arise," said PMI spokesperson Professor Stefan Schreiber, head of "COVIDOM" and director at the Department of Internal Medicine I at the UKSH, Campus Kiel.

Venezuela Opposition Politician Breaks With US-Backed Guaido

Venezuela's opposition leader Henrique Capriles on Wednesday 2 September 2020 broke with US-backed leader Juan Guaido, whose coalition has vowed to boycott the crisis-torn nation's upcoming congressional elections claiming they're rigged.

CARACAS, Venezuela (AP) - A popular opposition politician in Venezuela broke on Wednesday with US-backed leader Juan Guaido, whose coalition has vowed to boycott the crisis-torn nation's upcoming congressional elections claiming they're rigged.

Henrique Capriles said he's determined to fight for fair elections on 6 December, despite obstacles created by socialist President Nicolas Maduro. "We aren't going to hand over the National Assembly to Maduro as a gift - never," Capriles said. "If he's going to take anything away from us, he's going to have to do it by force, which only looks bad for him."

Capriles, 48, said he's forging a new path that will offer struggling Venezuelans an option to standing on the sidelines as Maduro gains a monopoly on power amid an opposition election boycott. Venezuelans have no other option but to press for political change, he said.

Capriles himself can't run in the elections since he's been banned from politics by Venezuelan authorities, though he remains an important player behind the scenes. And it's unclear how he would field candidates or what his decision to break with the boycott will concretely imply.

follow you closely if you have mild cognitive impairment.

You want to note the timing of any impairment. Was there a gradual decline? Or did it happen all of a sudden? This too you should discuss with your doctor, who might recommend the MoCA, or Montreal Cognitive Assessment test, which screens for memory problems and helps determine if more evaluation is needed.

Also, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention lists problems in these areas as possible

Following his comments, his Justice First party tweeted that it will meet on Thursday. "In the face of the events that have occurred in recent days, we want to announce to Venezuelans that tomorrow our National Directorate will

gather to establish a position in front of Venezuelans," it said.

But Venezuela's Supreme Court, loyal to Maduro, recently ordered the takeover of several influential political parties, including Capriles' Justice First party. The move included suspending and replacing the board of directors of each party. It was unclear what the party leaders gathering Thursday can do.

Capriles' announcement shattered a streak of unity spanning 18 months for Venezuela's opposition movement. The coalition in early 2019 rallied around Guaido, who claimed he would oust Maduro and quickly won backing from dozens of

nations, including the United States.

This moment of hope, however, fizzled when Guaido's initiatives failed to remove Maduro, including a supposed military uprising.

Maduro maintains power with key international supporters, including Russia and Iran, as well as the backing of Venezuela's military.

In an hour-long speech live streamed online, Capriles criticized Guaido without naming him. He said Maduro clearly holds power in Venezuela while opposition lawmakers maintain an "internet government," holding online meetings.

Hardly a political newcomer, Capriles led the Justice First party in 2012, when he lost the presidential election to Hugo Chavez and again the next year after Chavez's death in a contest against Maduro. He's credited in recent days with negotiating with Maduro to win pardons for dozens of political dissidents, including several jailed as what the opposition called political prisoners.

Capriles said he knows he's up against steep challenges in the upcoming election.

"No one is saying that with this election we are going to solve our political, economic and social crisis," Capriles said. "What I do know is that if we don't fight it will be even more difficult for us."

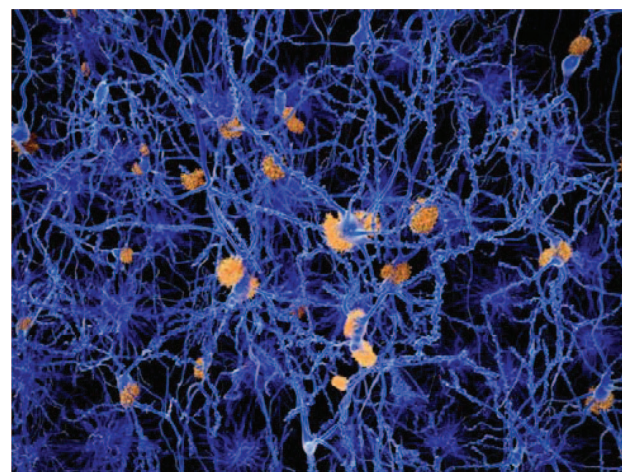

More severe issues

When memory loss interferes with daily activities, see your doctor about what to do and how to make sure you're safe at home.

There are numerous types of severe memory loss. Dementia tends to be a slow-moving progression that occurs over months or years. Delirium is more sudden and can occur over hours or days, usually when you have an acute illness. Depression can also cause memory changes, particularly as we get older.

Dementia and other brain issues

Alzheimer's dementia is the most common type of dementia, followed by vascular dementia. They have similar symptoms: confusion, getting lost, forgetting close friends or family, or an inability to do calculations like balance the checkbook.

Certain medical conditions - thyroid disorders, syphilis - can lead to dementia symptoms, and less common types of dementia can have different kinds of symptoms.

Alzheimer's has a distinct set of symptoms often associated with certain changes in the brain.

Focusing on safety and appropriate supervision,

particularly in the home, is critical for all people with dementia. Your doctor or a social worker can help you find support.

It's also important to be aware of two other things that can lead to decreased mental functioning - delirium and depression.

Delirium, a rapid change in cognition or mental functioning, can occur in people with an acute medical illness, like pneumonia or even COVID-19 infection. Delirium can occur in patients in the hospital or at home. Risk for delirium increases with age or previous brain injuries; symptoms include decreased attention span and memory issues.

Depression can happen at any time, but it's more common with aging. How can you tell if you're depressed? Here's one simple definition: when your mood remains low and you've lost interest or joy in activities you once loved.

Sometimes people have recurring episodes of depression; sometimes, it's prolonged grieving that becomes depression. Symptoms include anxiety, hopelessness, low energy and problems with memory. If you notice signs of depression in yourself or a loved one, see your doctor. If you have any thoughts of harming yourself, call 911 to get help instantly.

Any of these conditions can be frightening. But even more frightening is unrecognized or unacknowledged dementia. You must, openly and honestly, discuss changes you notice in your memory or thinking with your doctor. It's the first step toward figuring out what is happening and making sure your health is the best it can be.

And, as with any disease or disease group, dementia is not a "character flaw," and the term should not be used to criticize a person. Dementia is a serious medical diagnosis - ask those who have it, the loved ones who care for them or any of us who treat them.

Having dementia is challenging. Learn what you can do to support those with dementia in your own community.

Recover Better Together - ● Taiwan can help

In 2020, the world has been hit by an unprecedented public health crisis, with the effects of COVID-19 being felt across every aspect of people's lives. This year also marks the 75th anniversary of the signing of the Charter of the United Nations--the mission statement that stands at the very heart of the inclusive multilateralism the world needs so much at the present moment. Now more than ever, the global community must make a concerted effort to forge the better and more sustainable future called for by the UN and its Member States. Taiwan is ready, willing and able to be a part of these efforts.

With less than 500 confirmed cases and seven deaths, Taiwan has defied predictions and successfully contained COVID-19. We managed this without lockdowns; schools were only closed for two weeks in February. Baseball games also restarted in April. Initially, cardboard cutouts stood in for the crowds, but by mid-July games were back in full swing, attended by as many as 10,000 spectators.

This has all come in no small part due to Taiwan's quick response measures, including the establishment of a Central Epidemic Command Center, the implementation of stringent border controls and quarantine procedures, and transparent information-sharing. We also took swift action to ensure an adequate stock of medical supplies for our world-class health care system. And after making sure we had enough supplies to look after our own people, we started providing medical equipment and supplies to other countries in serious need.

By the end of June, Taiwan had donated 51 million surgical masks, 1.16 million N95 masks, 600,000 isolation gowns, 35,000 forehead thermometers, and other medical materials to more than 80 countries, including the United States, Taiwan's

diplomatic allies, and European nations. We have also joined forces with like-minded democracies to explore the development of rapid test kits, medicines, and vaccines. Working together for the greater good is how the world will defeat COVID-19.

In the Declaration on the Commemoration of the Seventy-fifth Anniversary of the United Nations, governments and heads of state acknowledge that only by working together in solidarity can we end the pandemic and effectively tackle its consequences. They thus pledge to make the UN more inclusive and to leave no one behind as the world looks to recover from the pandemic. Similarly, in remarks at the High-level Segment of the UN Economic and Social Council on "Multilateralism after COVID-19: what kind of UN do we need at the 75th anniversary?" in July, UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres said that networked, inclusive, and effective multilateralism would aid global efforts to promote recovery and the continued implementation of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). We cannot agree more. However, this vision seems lacking when Taiwan-- one of the world's model democracies and a success story in containing the current pandemic-- continues to be barred from taking part in and exchanging experiences and information with the UN system.

Even as the pandemic has made the international community acutely aware of Taiwan's unjust and discriminatory exclusion from the World Health Organization and the UN system, the People's Republic of China (PRC) continues to press the UN to use an erroneous interpretation of the 1971 UN General Assembly Resolution 2758 (XXVI) as the legal basis for blocking Taiwan. The fact is that this resolution does not address the issue of Taiwan's representation in the UN, nor does it state that Taiwan is part of the PRC. In fact, Taiwan is not, nor has it ever been, a part of the PRC. Our President and legislature are directly elected by the people of Taiwan. Moreover, border controls instituted during the pandemic offer further evidence to counter the PRC's false claims. The UN must recognize that only Taiwan's democratically elected government can represent its 23.5 million people; the PRC has no right to speak on Taiwan's behalf.

Not having Taiwan's input in the UN is a loss to the global community, and will hamper Member States' efforts to regain normalcy and implement the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development in full and on time. By drawing on its outstanding work on the SDGs, Taiwan can help countries better recover from the disruption caused by the pandemic. Our economy has proven resilient: the Asian Development Bank forecast that Taiwan's economic performance in 2020 would be the best among the Four Asian Tigers-- the only one to show positive growth. Moreover, many of our SDG indicator-- including gender equality, economic growth, clean water and sanitation, reduced inequality, and good health and wellbeing-- have reached levels comparable to OECD countries. Our ongoing efforts to implement the SDGs coupled with our proven pandemic response put Taiwan in a much better position than most to help the global community in tackling the ongoing challenges facing humanity.

In fact, Taiwan has long been assisting its partner countries in Africa, Asia, the Caribbean, Latin America, and the Pacific with their development goals in such areas as clean energy, waste management, and disaster prevention. So we are already able to help-- yet we could do that much more if given the chance to participate in UN activities, meetings, and mechanisms.

Unfortunately, the 23.5 million people of Taiwan are denied any access to UN premises. Taiwanese journalists and media outlets are also denied accreditation to cover UN meetings. This discriminatory policy stems from the wrongful claims of and pressure from an authoritarian state, and contravenes the principle of universality and equality upon which the UN was founded.

"We the peoples of the United Nations determined . . . to reaffirm faith in fundamental human rights . . . [and] the equal rights of men and women and of nations large and small" -- thus begins the UN Charter. The ideal of upholding human rights and fundamental freedoms for all laid out in this text must not remain empty words. As it looks ahead to the next 75 years, it is never too late for the UN to welcome Taiwan's participation.

The Bye-Election was narrowly won by the unknown because the Labour supporters whose choice was ignored, did not go out to vote. I was able to associate with the world wide struggle of the Working Class and return to the fold of Labour, from where I had uneducatedly strayed. The Labour Party FAILED to educate its followers as to the WORLD WIDE STRUGGLE being waged between capital and Labour.

Having been formed in 1965, PAM contested its first General Elections in 1966. There was an AIRLINE in Puerto-Rico which operated between Puerto-Rico and St. Kitts. The Company fell in Love with the charm and Beauty of the island and its people, and wanted to construct a hotel at Fort Thomas.

I could well remember Dr. Billy Herbert coming to the Taxi Stand by the Circus and telling the Taxi drivers that he has made the necessary contacts and, as long as we live, we will never see that hotel constructed at Fort Thomas, because it would hamper PAM in their Electioneering campaign. Taxi Drivers, who depend on visitors visiting the country, jumped up with joy and congratulated him for a job well done.

I turned to Dr. Herbert and I said to him, “These Taxi Drivers do not have any sense. You are taking bread out of their mouths and they are congratulating you. I used to sleep on the floor and it seems as if you want my children to do the same. Is this the kind of New Politics you bringing into the country? I love my country too much for this kind of politics.

This was the first demonstration PAM exhibited for its drought of LOVE, RESPECT, LOYALTY to St. Kitts and its people.

England v Australia: Eoin Morgan says 'huge' to have best players back

England will field close to their best team "for the first time this summer" in the opening Twenty20 against Australia, says captain Eoin Morgan.

The Ageas Bowl in Southampton will host the first of three Twenty20s on Friday.

Jos Buttler, Jofra Archer, Mark Wood and Sam Curran return to the squad after missing the Pakistan T20 series because of their Test involvement.

"It means a huge amount. We're seeing the majority of our best team on the park and that's great," said Morgan.

"I don't think we have to go out and pick our best XI every series we play, because we can't put all our eggs in one basket."

The second T20 will be live on BBC One and BBC iPlayer from 13:50 BST on Sunday.

Australia are top of the International Cricket Council T20 rankings and England second.

The series will be followed by three one-day-internationals at Emirates Old Trafford from 11 September.

The T20 World Cup, due to start in Australia in October, was moved to India in 2021 because of the coronavirus pandemic.

England stars return to white-ball cricket

With Jason Roy missing because of a side strain, wicketkeeper Buttler will open the batting for England alongside Jonny Bairstow.

It means Tom Banton or Dawid Malan could miss out, despite both impressing in the drawn T20 series against Pakistan that finished on Tuesday.

All-rounder Ben Stokes, who missed the last two Tests and T20s against Pakistan to visit his ill father in New Zealand, is still missing, while Test captain Joe Root and all-rounder Chris Woakes are not part of the T20s but feature in the one-day squad.

England have been the fastest scoring team in T20 cricket since the 2016 World Cup, but have also been the most expensive with the ball.

Australia, who have not played a competitive match since 13 March, arrived in the UK on 24 August and quarantined at Derby's County Ground before travelling to Southampton.

They have won nine of their past 11 matches and their past four series, and, in T20 captain Aaron Finch and David Warner, have the "best opening partnership in the world", according to coach Justin Langer.

Warner is Australia's highest T20 run-scorer with 2,207 at an average of 31.52 and strike-rate of 140.48, while Finch is second with 1,989 runs at an average of 38.25 and strike-rate of 155.87.

Marnus Labuschagne scored a 51-ball century in Australia's final intra-squad T20 warm-up game on Tuesday, but Finch said he "might have to wait a little bit longer" to make his T20 international debut.

All-rounder Glenn Maxwell also made a hundred in a 50-over practice game. He has not played for Australia since October 2019 after taking a break for mental health reasons then suffering an elbow injury.

Pace bowler Riley Meredith, wicketkeeper Josh Philippe and all-rounder Daniel Sams, all of whom have impressed in the domestic Big Bash League, have yet to make their Australia debuts.

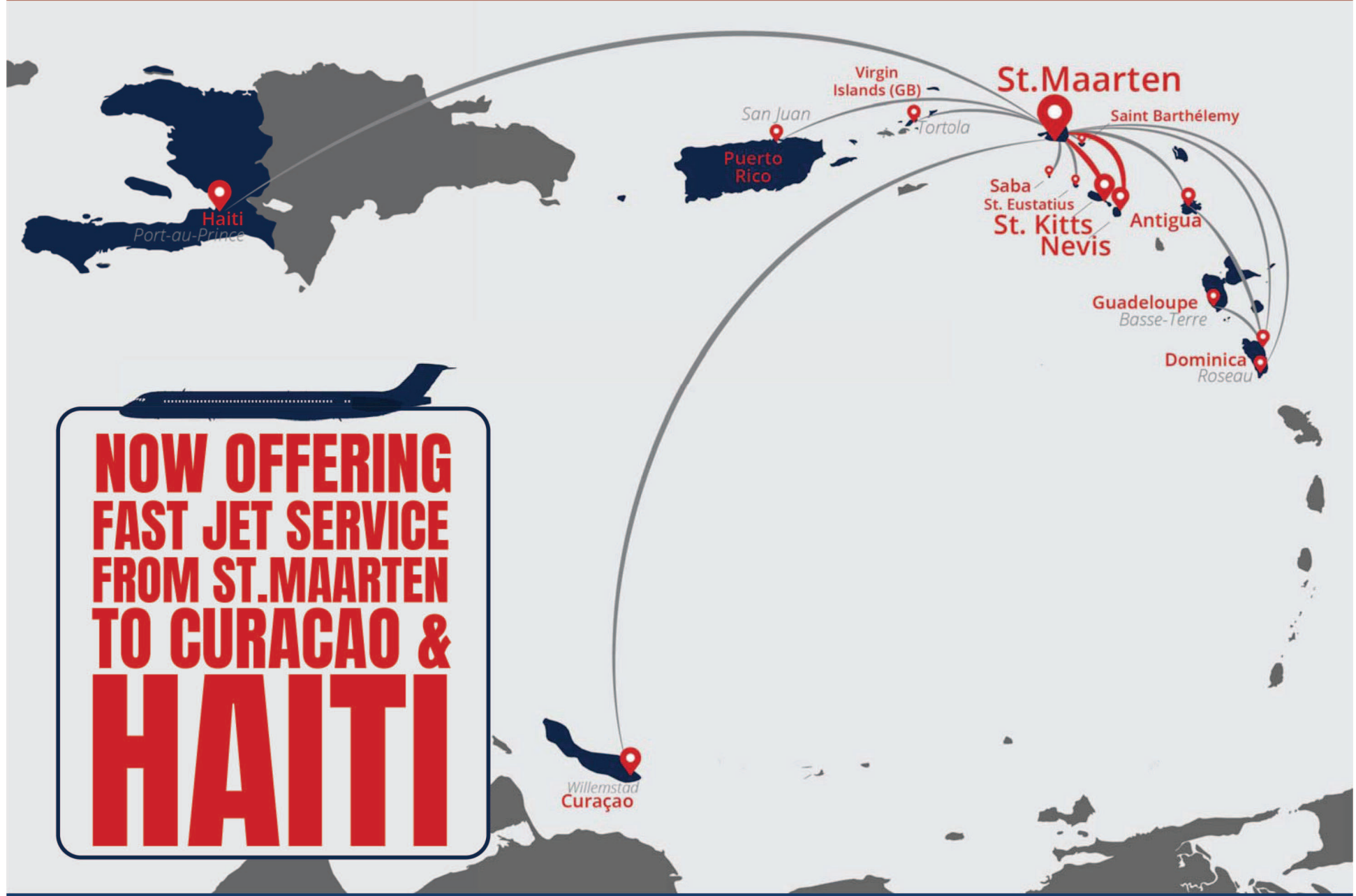
