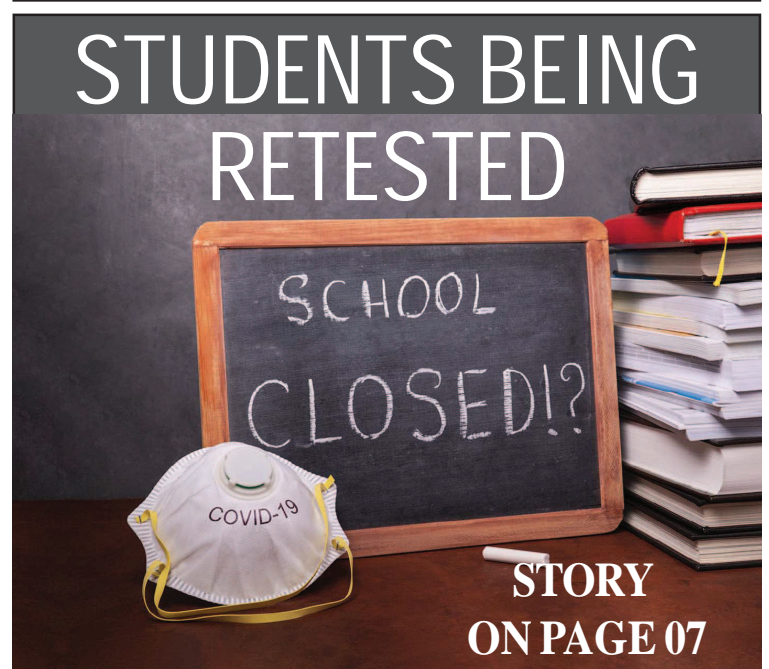

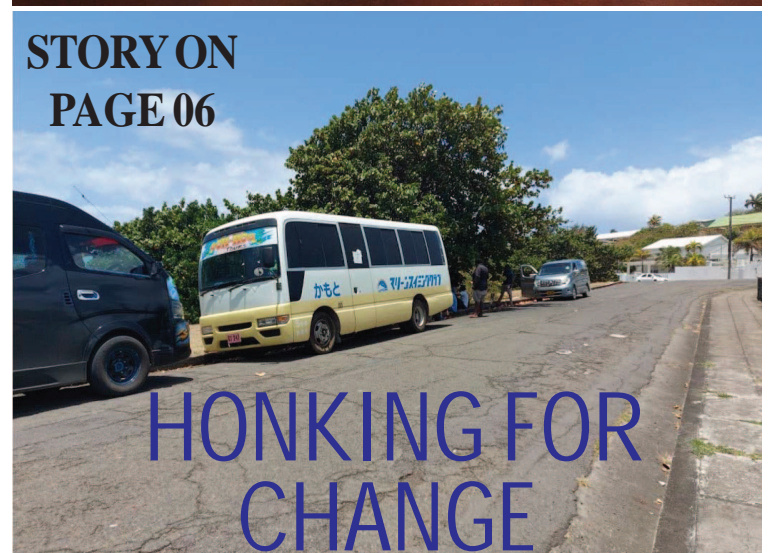

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## Editorial

# It Is A Matter Of Trust

Rather suddenly it seems that the COVID-19 situation here in St Kitts and Nevis has become a matter of truly grave concern. The number of affected persons appears to have taken a steep upward trajectory, increasing on a daily basis. The contacts are also growing and spreading likewise, at least those that are known at this time.

Just as suddenly, it seems, all the talk about reliability, good governance, great leadership, promises kept, and such like, have become fully exposed for the emptiness which they have always been.

The business of equipping and motivating people to stimulate lawlessness and all kinds of criminal behaviour did serve to destabilise the place. It did play a major part in helping some to get their corrupt hands on the reins of political power in this country.

And while the pressure from the business sector increases every day, those who all along thought that they were 'well connected' have been treated to such strong doses of reality that they find themselves bewildered and unsure of what their next actions should be.

Deceptive antics, mamaguy, acts of chicanery, and all forms of corruption do seem to work, but only for a time. Eventually reality sets in, and most of those who fell for the cons have begun to wizen-up. And boy, oh boy, when they do, most become angry, really angry!

# Dr. Drew Says PM Harris Still Playing Pandemic Politics

## ... Gives Recommendation For Vaccination Outreach

**BASSETERRE, St.Kitts (Wednesday 2nd June 2021)**- Medical practitioner and Chairman of the opposition St. Kitts-Nevis Labour Party (SKNLP) Dr. Terrance Drew is of the view that Prime Minister Dr. Timothy Harris of the Team Unity government “continues to play politics with COVID-19.”



He made the disclosure while speaking on ‘Issues’ programme aired on FreedomFM on Tuesday 1st June 2021 in making a continued call for an all of society approach and also offered a recommendation that the government and businesses use scientifically proven methods of communicating and convincing people on the topic of vaccination instead of forcing people.

Dr. Drew commented on the early onset of the novel coronavirus in St.Kitts and Nevis in 2020 when he was “bashed” and “pulled through the mud” in an outreach to assist the government.

He labelled the government’s response to the SKNLP as having “maligned and sidelined us.”

According to Dr. Drew: “That should show people that the government was not serious ever about the whole of society approach. Had they brought us in, that would have helped. Why? Because even outside of politics, wherever people can come together as

one, have a united front and move together when that is genuine and done properly it would have an effect, and the effect would be a positive effect to influence people and bring people together. So it doesn’t have to be a political movement; any movement at all but once the movement is united it can cause positive response in those who you are seeking to reach so it would have been much better.”

He talked about how he along with former Prime Minister and SKNLP leader Dr. Denzil Douglas could have been helping initially.

“Dr. Douglas dealt with the AIDS pandemic. Dr. Douglas is a medical doctor, bonafide and well-respected medical doctor. He could have brought experience to bear on the response of all of this.”

He added: “I myself, I am a medical doctor trained in internal medicine, very few of us here (in St.Kitts-Nevis). I could have added my part but instead of doing that, they sought to extract whatever political advantage they could have extracted and as a result we are in the position we are in...”

Fast forward to present times, Dr. Drew expressed: “And guess what the Prime Minister has not changed. He continues to play politics with COVID-19. Now he is playing politics with the vaccines and when the people were not going [to get vaccinated], he blamed Dr. Douglas. Can you imagine that?, and blamed Dr. Douglas as the reason why people aren’t going.”

The medical doctor emphasized that the pandemic “has nothing to do with politics, and that is why we continue to call for the all of society approach.”

Dr. Drew pointed out that people’s decision not to take the vaccine is not because of politics.

He recalled that while making an appearance at another radio station recently, a caller said “I’m a big Unity and I’m not taking the vaccine”.

“..and she was saying to me and to us and all those who were listening that

her decision is not premise on any political affiliation but because of her own conviction as to why she should not take the vaccine.”

On the topic of vaccine hesitancy, he then stated that in such situations “People like her (the caller) should not be pushed out of a job or be forced out of a job... should not be maligned and called all sorts of names. That is a person who you should call in, give her a forum where she can have all of her doubts, her fears listened to and responded to. That is the approach.”


He accused the government of “acting aggressively” and “like a dictatorship” as it relates to the national vaccination programme and stated “That is not the attitude to have. Do not force people.”

Dr. Drew went on to encourage the government to “Use scientifically proven methods of communicating and convincing people and so I disagree with this approach to force people directly and indirectly... there is a scientific democratic approach that can achieve the same end.”

“I want the businesses who think they have to force their people to take the vaccine that there is a scientific way of getting your people to go where you think they should go,” he also noted.

# Workers In Quarantine Or Isolation Order Asked To Request Official Letters For Employers, Social Security Claims

**BASSETERRE, St.Kitts (Friday 4th June 2021)**-Workers who are in quarantine or isolation are being asked to submit a request for an official letter to be sent to their employers which can also be used for their social security claims.

Chief Medical Officer Dr. Hazel Laws provided such information when she spoke at an emergency COVID-19 briefing of the National Emergency Operation Center (NEOC) COVID-19 Daily Briefing on Tuesday 1st June 2021.

Such workers include parents of children who are in self quarantine.

Requests can be made through headmasters of schools or by calling the COVID-19 hotline via 311.

"The 311 operators, they are receiving a number of calls regarding the Quarantine and Isolation Order. So the individuals who are in isolation, meaning the positive cases and those who are in self quarantine at a government or COVID-19 certified facility and those individuals, those family members are in self quarantine, they are requesting that official letter that certifies that they were placed in isolation or quarantine in order for them to submit same to their employers, and this letter can also be used for their social security claims."

Dr. Laws continued: "So we're asking you to submit your requests through the headmaster of either the six high schools, that is, if your child or your ward is placed in self quarantine. However, if you're in not any way related to the school

system we're asking you to submit your requests through the 311 operator such that your letter is prepared so that you can submit same to your employer and it can be utilized for your social security claim."

A recent notice issued on 26th May from the Department of Labour appealed to all employers to be considerate and empathetic towards workers who have been ordered by the health authorities to enter quarantine.

Employers have been asked to preserve the employment of the individuals affected and where possible continue to pay wages, salaries in full or up to at least 35% as quarantine workers may be able to claim sickness benefits in accordance with schedule 8 part 3 section 9: 2 of the Social Security Act.



# West Line Bus Drivers Hold Meeting About No Consultation For Capacity Seating

**BASSETERRE, St.Kitts (Friday 4th June 2021)**- West Line bus operators recently took a break off road for a meeting to discuss their views on not being included to decide on one of the newest COVID-19 safety measures which asks passenger bus operators to work with a 50% seating capacity.

This reporter visited the outdoorsy area in the vicinity Cenotaph at Fortlands on Friday 28th May 2021 and met more than seven bus operators gathered before the start of the meeting; some of whom were seen eating their lunch.

In attendance at the joint meeting were members of the West Line Bus Association and the Sugar City Bus Association operators.

Speaking with President of the West Line Bus Association Nicholson 'Rambo' Webster following the meeting, he shared that there "was no kind of consultation" with the bus fraternity. Hence, a meeting was called so as to put together a proposal to the government in an effort to address the challenges, financial and otherwise, linked to their line of work.

Areas discussed were seating capacity, additional fuel burning, subsidy as well as reduced import duties.

Webster is of the view that a decision of that nature which affects bus fraternity should have seen the governmental agencies consulting the bus associations before a decision was made.

"This is not the first time that the buses are working under this type of arrangement," he expressed in pointing out the bus drivers have been working amidst the COVID-19 pandemic.

One of the issues with the requested 50% seating capacity, according to him, has to do with the configuration of the buses since all of them are not the same. He also talked about the variation relating travelling distances in providing an example of six passengers stopping at a shorter distance and just one passenger travelling

longer.

"This is not working and it doesn't make any sense either," he stated.

Commenting on what needs to happen in addressing the concerns of bus drivers, Webster touched on the relevant authorities approaching the bus associations and "having a sit down and have a discussion on the way forward."

When questioned about some members of the public thinking they took a strike that day, he pointed out that the meeting was called that day.

Also, when quizzed about the concerns of some passengers about a suspected increase in bus fare, Webster noted that bus drivers 'can't just get up and change noting that the Transportation Board will have to determine such.

Prime Minister Dr. Timothy Harris, in a live address to the nation on Tuesday 25th May 2021 listed ten (10) of measures to be undertaken "In order to contain the spread of the deadly virus."

Number two on that list was: "The number of passengers on public transportation (buses, ferries etc.) will be reduced to 50 percent of established capacity. This is to facilitate physical distancing and a resultant reduction in the risk of transmission of the virus."





# Schools Close Beyond Two Weeks During Retesting, Contact Tracing Period

**BASSETERRE, St.Kitts (Friday 4th June 2021)**- Schools in the Federation are expected to remain closed beyond the two weeks initially targeted as COVID-19 retesting of students and contact tracing exercises continue on St.Kitts.

Prime Minister Dr. Timothy Harris, during an address to the nation on Tuesday 25th May 2021, announced the closure of schools for two weeks in the first instance to facilitate contact tracing, testing and other necessary precautions consistent with the COVI-19 Prevention and Control Act.

Minister of Education Jonel Powell in speaking at the Prime Minister's press conference on Thursday 3rd June 2021 indicated that community spread is the reason behind the extended closure.

He said his ministry has taken the decision not to resume schools for the purposes of face to face instructions for the remainder of the school year.

"This is as a result of-as I said- the community spread and the fact that we as a ministry do not think that the risk is worth it to open schools in light of everything that is happening, bearing in mind that we would be closing schools naturally at the end of this month."

Powell said primary school students will not have end of term examinations.

"The result of this is that for primary school children, the curriculum reform that we have undergoing for some time now has allowed for continual assessment of those children throughout the academic year, and so they will not have any end of term or end of year examinations. Their performances will be based on the continual assessment that has taken place over the course of the year."

The Education Minister then addressed what will happen at high school level.

"In relation to secondary schools, the last week, we would have naturally begun examinations concerning some of those students and so those students who would have been preparing prior to that even the last two weeks of closure through the online modality will still be able to write their common examinations."

He said the ministry will indicate to parents and students the modality in which they would have that opportunity.

The Education Minister said fifth form students will be prioritized.

"We will also be prioritizing our fifth form students who are about to write the CXC examinations. A recent release from CXC would have indicated that those examinations have been pushed back in relation to their start date to the 28th of June, and so we



He said the early childhood centres will remain closed until further notice.

"This again is as a result of the community spread of the COVID-19 virus and we are awaiting the results of further testing that has taken place and the advice of the Ministry of Health."

Meanwhile, speaking at the National Emergency Operation Center (NEOC) COVID-19 Daily Briefing on Tuesday 1st June 2021, Chief Medical Officer Dr. Hazel Laws gave an update regarding the end of quarantine (14 days) testing for students of the schools involved in the contact tracing exercise.

She pointed out that the end of quarantine period requires two tests with one at the beginning of quarantine and then final at the end of that period.

The Public Health Team was slated to visit the Sandy Point Primary on Thursday 3rd June at 9AM to test primary students of grade 1 and 2. Students' households placed in self quarantine along with teachers were expected to get their second test also.

Charles E. Mills Secondary (formerly Sandy Point) was scheduled to be tested at 2:30PM that day. Seven Day Adventist Primary was slated for Wednesday 2nd June at 4PM.

Furthermore, upcoming revisits for the end of quarantine testing are Washington Archibald- Friday 4th June at 7am, Basseterre High School at 12noon that day followed by Tyrell Williams Primary on Saturday 5th June at 10am.

Once negative test results are returned, the individuals would be discharged from quarantine accordingly.

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# ITF calls for regional cooperation to save jobs, tackle rising poverty and to lead economic recovery in the Caribbean

**RIO DE JANEIRO, June 2, 2021** /PRNewswire-HISPANIC PR WIRE/ — The economic impact of COVID-19 is having a devastating effect on the global tourism industry, especially in the Caribbean which could see an escalation of poverty for workers. Unions affiliated to the International Transport Workers' Federation (ITF) from across the Caribbean held a virtual summit today to raise awareness of the ongoing impact of COVID-19 on jobs and communities in the region.

The ITF and its 18 affiliated unions are calling on governments and employers to cooperate with trade unions to develop and implement a regional recovery plan that:

- \* Prioritises employment security
- \* Guarantees free, universal access to vaccines
- \* Re-establishes safe travel corridors

Globally the tourism industry accounts for over 300 million

jobs. Travel restrictions have had a devastating effect on economies reliant on tourists. Many countries in the Caribbean rely heavily on tourism as an essential pillar of their economies and major contributor to GDP, in turn generating much needed employment in the region.

Tourism generates over \$59 billion per year for the region. An estimated \$26.4 billion has been lost due to the ongoing impact of the pandemic. Estimates also suggest that over 1.2 million jobs have been lost.

Not only have the job losses hit hard, but also the spending power of workers has been significantly reduced leading to the risk of widespread poverty and a stagnation of economic growth. Long-term development and recovery plans in the region are critical.

ITF General Secretary, Stephen Cotton said that: "The Caribbean is too important to ignore, and we have a duty to

protect the infrastructure and livelihoods of those workers who make visiting so appealing to millions of tourists each year. We need a tripartite plan from governments, employers and unions for recovery. Listening to the concerns of our leaders today, it's clear that we need action now. Investment in developing regional transport infrastructure is a good place to start".

ITF Tourism Chair, David Messiah added: "My concern is that women and young

workers are bearing a disproportionate number of job losses. These are the very groups of workers so critical to eradicating poverty in the Caribbean and needed in the industry's recovery. Our regional partners must work with us to re-establish safe travel corridors and assist in access to vaccines. We need a coordinated approach across the Caribbean and should not rely on individual nation states as this only adds to the confusion. We must develop a unified approach that pools our resources together."

ITF Regional Secretary, Edgar Diaz said "It is vitally important that workers do not feel forced to have the vaccination, education and engagement is key if we are to encourage participation. That's why establishing a tripartite approach is fundamental to success and not fear and intimidation of individual workers."

Trade union Leaders from Antigua and Barbuda, Barbados, Bermuda, Dominican Republic, Guyana, Grenada, Jamaica, Suriname, St Lucia, Trinidad took part in the summit.

#### Opinion

The summary separate financial statements, which comprise the summary separate statement of financial position as of June 30, 2020, the summary separate statement of comprehensive income, summary separate statement of changes in shareholders' equity and summary separate statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and the related note, are derived from the audited separate financial statements of **St. Kitts-Nevis-Anguilla National Bank Limited** (the "Bank") for the year ended June 30, 2020. We expressed a qualified opinion in our report dated December 23, 2020.

In our opinion, the accompanying summary separate financial statements are consistent, in all material respects, with the audited separate financial statements, on the basis described in Note 1. However, the summary separate financial statements are misstated to the equivalent extent as the audited separate financial statements of **St. Kitts-Nevis-Anguilla National Bank Limited** for the year ended June 30, 2020.

#### Summary Separate Financial Statements

The summary separate financial statements do not contain all the disclosures required by International Financial Reporting Standards. Reading the summary separate financial statements and the auditor's report thereon, therefore, is not a substitute for reading the audited separate financial statements and the auditor's report thereon.

#### The Audited Separate Financial Statements and Our Report Thereon

We expressed a qualified audit opinion on the audited separate financial statements in our report dated December 23, 2020. The basis for our qualified audit opinion was that originated debts on the Bank's separate statement of financial position includes certain long term notes issued by a third party, ABI Bank Limited (in receivership) ("ABIB"), amounting to \$36,242,620, which have matured and remain outstanding. The loans were to be fully repaid by cash flows from loans ABIB made to the Government of Antigua and Barbuda. However, on November 27, 2015, ABIB was placed in receivership. No provision for potential losses has been made in the separate financial statements in respect of these notes.

We were unable to obtain sufficient appropriate audit evidence or satisfy ourselves by alternative methods, as to the recoverability of the \$36,242,620 due to the Bank. Consequently, we were unable to determine whether any adjustment to this amount was necessary in the separate financial statements.

Our report also includes the communication of key audit matters. Key audit matters are those matters that in our professional judgement, were of most significance in our audit of the separate financial statements of the current period.

#### Management's Responsibility for the Summary Separate Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation of the summary separate financial statements on the basis described in Note 1.

#### Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on whether the summary separate financial statements are consistent, in all material respects, with the audited separate financial statements based on our procedures, which were conducted in accordance with International Standard on Auditing (ISA) 810 (Revised), *Engagements to Report on Summary Financial Statements*.

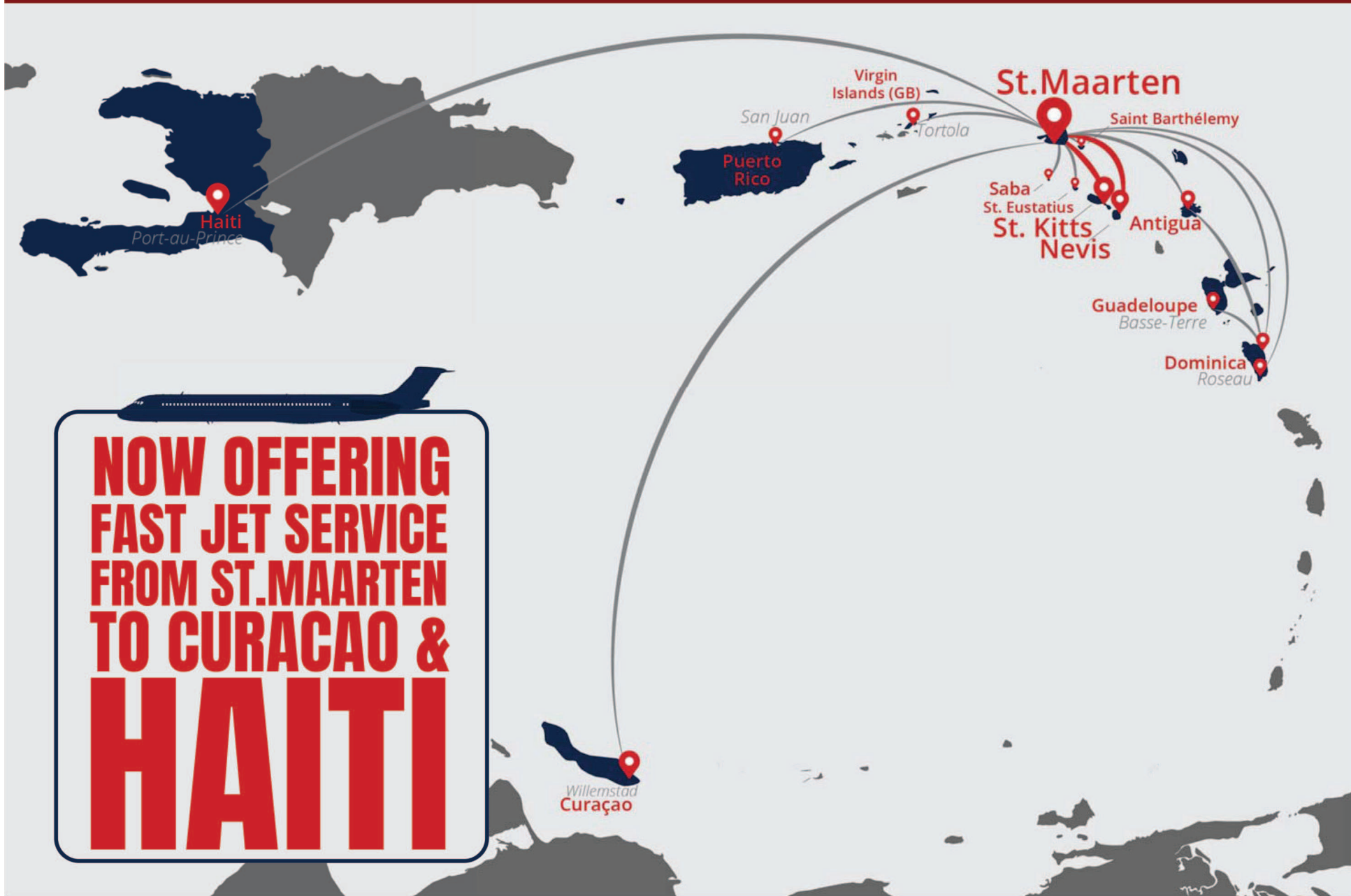

# US Spy Plane Flies Into China's Air Defence Zone

TAIPEI (Taiwan News) A US Air Force reconnaissance aircraft has flown directly into the East China Sea area of China's

air defense identification zone (ADIZ).

Chinese think tank South China Sea Strategic Situation Probing Initiative tweeted that a US Air Force RC-135U aircraft had entered China's ADIZ Thursday morning (3 June).

The plane took off from Kadena base in Okinawa, Japan, and flew into the East China Sea before heading west towards China. It then turned south and flew as far as Fujian Province before returning to the base along the same flight path.

Multiple American military planes have conducted missions

in the region in the past two days. On Wednesday (2 June) a US Navy P-8A maritime patrol aircraft flew southward along the median line of the Taiwan Strait, The Liberty Times reported.

The same day two US Marine Corps V-22 tiltrotor planes and two MC-130 special operations command aircraft were spotted in the Bashi Channel between Taiwan and The Philippines. Southwest of the channel two RC-130 reconnaissance planes, a KC-135 tanker aircraft, and a P-8A patrol plane, were detected.

The RC-135U is a reconnaissance aircraft manned by a minimum of 21 crewmembers that is capable of locating and identifying military ground, ocean, or air-based radar signals, as well as collecting data for further analysis.

making sure reparations, which are inherently aimed at specific groups, don't create more division by leaving out others who may have suffered harm in different ways.

## Estimating harm

The first step then is to rigorously take account of the harms inflicted. That can be extremely difficult. Even where the historic record is unambiguous and agreed upon, there is rarely the data available to accurately assess the harms people have suffered.

To compound the issue, some harms are so difficult to assess for in the first place - for example, the emotional distress experienced by descendants - or so widespread - such as the pervasive legacy of racism in society - as to be uncountable. In the absence of data-based estimates, there is greater scope for subjectivity to sway the debate and hinder attempts to arrive at acceptable compensation.

Even where the data does allow accurate estimation of the causal impact of historic harms, the next question is how much money is required to compensate for them. This question is also very difficult to answer.

Canvassing public opinion is an option, but behavioural scientists often find people's answers are incoherent. In public opinion experiments, the conclusion reached by legal scholar Cass Sunstein and psychologist and economics Nobel Laureate Daniel Kahneman, is that people answer these questions by reporting their general attitudes rather than their considered evaluations of the specific situations.

So far the problems outlined have been technical: how to measure harm on a money scale. Now the substantial problems begin. How to divide the compensation across groups? There is a human tendency to overestimate one's own burden relative to others".

Ask two partners in a relationship what percentage of housework they do and, for the majority of couples, the answers will add up to a total that exceeds 100%. That violation of statistics occurs in a case where there is nothing at stake. Imagine how fraught things get when the stakes include large sums of money and issues of identity and victimhood. In this sense, any attempt simply to "compensate" for specific atrocities looks likely to provoke resentments among groups that have been differently harmed.

But there are other approaches. This month France launches a "memories and truth" commission to shed light on its acts during the Algerian war. If reparations are part of the process, philosopher Leif Wenar advocates that they should serve the function of improving future relations rather than of compensating for past wrongs.

The climate crisis offers former colonial powers an opportunity to make a positive contribution in this regard. Everyone agrees that global carbon emissions must reduce but the big question remains: who has to reduce their production and consumption? The countries that are most developed today got that way because they exploited the Earth's resources and people in the past. A reasonable way to proceed is for developed countries to make sacrifices and give less-developed countries their turn.

# Reparations For Slavery And Colonial Abuses - How Behavioural Science Can Help

Germany has agreed to pay Namibia more than Euro 1 billion (£940 million) in reparations for committing genocide during the colonial occupation of the country a century ago. It's a landmark deal that will create a 30-year programme of investment in infrastructure, healthcare and training programmes in Namibia.

But it wasn't easy reaching this agreement. Negotiations have been ongoing since 2015. Last year, Germany offered Namibia Euro10 million (£8.6 million) but the Namibian authorities rejected it.

And while the latest deal may set a precedent for the victims and descendants of victims of historic abuses seeking reparations payments - calls for which have grown in the last year in response to the Black Lives Matter movement - there are still many obstacles.

Alongside how to reach such agreements, one of the biggest questions is how to agree reparations in a way that helps heal society rather than causes further division. Behavioural science is a discipline that has made a study of how identity and emotion relate to money, so I believe the field has insights for the reparations

issue.

Namibia's rejection of Germany's initial offer will come as no surprise to those familiar with the ultimatum game. In this experimental economics game, there are two players, G and N. G is arbitrarily given some money, say £10. N receives nothing. G must select how much, if any, of the cash to share with N. N can accept G's offer or reject it. If N rejects then neither G nor N receive anything - both go home empty handed.

Economic theory offers a prediction: G offers N some tiny amount of wealth because N would be made materially better off by taking even a paltry sum of money rather than refusing it. That prediction has been refuted time and again and across cultures. In reality, N typically rejects the offer if it is only a small proportion of the initial endowment. The common sense that explains this result is reflected in everyday language when we talk of an offer as being "insultingly low".

A minimum criterion for reparations is that they avoid being insultingly low by adequately recognising the harm caused. But there is also a balance to be struck in

# IICA Rabbit Rearing Project beneficiaries to attend workshop on agriculture, health and food safety

**BASSETERRE, ST. KITTS, June 1, 2021 (MMS-SKN)**

— Six months after 65 householders on St. Kitts received a pair of rabbits courtesy of the Inter-American Institute for Cooperation on Agriculture (IICA) Rabbit Rearing Project, the regional agency, which has been monitoring the rabbit farmers, is planning to hold a workshop on ‘Agriculture, Health and Food Safety’, and the slaughtering of rabbits in conjunction with the Department of Agriculture.

Technical Specialist, St. Kitts and Nevis IICA Delegation, Ms Sharon Jones has been visiting some of the 65 backyard farmers who, in October last year as part of a week of activities marking World Food Day 2020 received the rabbits to boost food security at the household level, and in the long term could provide another source of income.

Among the farmers visited to find out how they have been managing the rabbits included Ms Kimoy Phillip of LaGuerrite Village. According to Ms Jones, “It was pleasant in that we had one person, Ms Phillips, who not only received the rabbits but was already breeding them and they had multiplied. She now has six rabbits, and they are healthy, and in good condition.”

Ms Phillip, who praised the IICA Rabbit Rearing Project for working with local farmers, said her intention is to increase the number of rabbits and would also wish to see other people come on board and rear rabbits, not for pets but for food, “so we can feed ourselves, the country and maybe even put some of the rabbit at the market and see how we get them shipped out to various countries as an export.”

Also visited was Mr Feldon Challenger of Shadwell who had received two rabbits but had not started breeding them as they were still young. He teamed up with a seasoned rabbit farmer,

Mr Melville Mardenborough who apart from passing on knowledge to him.

“Then we met a young boy, Master Craig Jeffers, a student at the Basseterre High School, who though he had not received the rabbits from the project, he was doing very well,” noted Ms Jones. “And not only that - he had his own little kitchen garden where he was recycling some of the material from his kitchen garden into feeding the rabbits, so that was very good. He is a young chap, so he really needs to be encouraged.”

Others visited were Ms Florence Dolly Tweede of Humming Bird Development, and Mrs Isis Phipps of New Road. Ms Jones who was accompanied by Unit Head at the Livestock Production of the Department of Agriculture, Mr Miguel Flemming, on the field to visit the farmers noted that they will visit the other recipients to ensure the rabbits are in good condition, from where they will then move on to the next step.

“Once we have decided that the rabbits are in good condition, all the recipients would be invited to a workshop on Agriculture, Health and Food Safety and the slaughtering of rabbits,” said Ms Jones. “This is to ensure that they adhere to the public health codes because most of them are in their backyard in residential areas. Also, we want to ensure that

the households adhere to the health protocols when they slaughter the rabbits and can determine if the rabbits are in good health to consume the meat.”

All the recipients are expected to attend that workshop, which according to Ms Jones is very important. They will then be invited to another workshop which will be in cage making so that when they multiply their rabbits, they can have cages for the offspring. Farmers who would not have attended the workshop on Agriculture, Health and Food Safety will not be invited to the cage making workshop.

“We will keep monitoring the householders through the course of the year just to ensure that they are doing well,” stated Ms Jones. “I think the goal at the end of the year is that the Ministry of Agriculture wants to have a rabbit festival where the householders can participate.”

## Three Factors Exacerbate Suicidal Behavior In Bullied Teens

James Cook University researchers have found three lifestyle factors that predispose bullied adolescents to plan or attempt

suicide.

Dr Yaqoot Fatima from James Cook University and The University of Queensland was part of a team that analyzed data from a survey of more than 280,000 students aged 13 to 17 from 90 countries.

She said suicide is the third leading cause of death among adolescents.

“Compared to adolescents who were not bullied, adolescents who experienced bullying have more than twice the odds of thinking about and planning suicide, and close to three times greater odds of attempting it,” said lead author Mr Md Mehedi Hasan from the University of Queensland.

Dr Fatima said more than 30 percent of the students surveyed had been bullied and more than 10 percent of these had attempted suicide.

“Reducing adolescent suicide through bullying prevention strategies requires an understanding of the

intermediate factors involved in this relationship, in particular the mechanisms and pathways through which bullying relates to suicidal behavior,” she said.

The researchers said there were a number of factors linking bullying and suicide, but three were significant.

“The strongest links between bullying and suicidal behaviors were loneliness, sleep disturbances, and alcohol consumption.

“Nearly one-fifth of the total association between bullying and suicidal ideation was linked to loneliness. Sleep disturbances and alcohol consumption were the link between bullying and suicidal behaviors in 4 to 9 percent of cases,” said Dr Fatima.

She said the three factors may reinforce each other, with alcohol consumption linked to sleep disruption and loneliness, bullies targeting lonely people, and loneliness a common end result of chronic peer bullying as victims become isolated.

“This study suggests targeted policies and early implementation of strategies focusing on addressing loneliness, sleep disturbance and alcohol consumption can reduce the risk of adverse suicidal behaviors among adolescents.

“It highlights the importance of screening adolescents for these intermediate factors and designing community-wide policies and programs that promote social engagement, good sleep health and less alcohol consumption,” said Dr Fatima.

## Taiwan Says In Vaccine Talks With Pfizer And J&J

Taiwan is in talks with COVID-19 vaccine makers like Pfizer and Johnson and Johnson for more supplies, its foreign minister said on Thursday while expressing appreciation to Japan for considering donating much needed shots.

Taiwan has been a model for how to control the pandemic, but a recent spike in domestic infections has increased the need to inoculate people faster.

During a video call with international media in Japan, Foreign Minister Joseph Wu repeated complaints that China, which claims the island as its own territory, has hampered efforts to secure more vaccines, and kept Taiwan excluded from the World Health Organisation.

So far Taiwan has received only the Moderna Inc and AstraZeneca Plc vaccines. But Wu said his government was “negotiating with individual companies like Pfizer” and J&J, while expressing confidence in its domestic vaccine rollout.

“When and if our own vaccines are rolled out toward the end of July, I think this will become the most important supply for the vaccine demand here in Taiwan,” Wu said. Johnson & Johnson was not immediately available for comment.

Responding to Reuters request for comment, Pfizer said: “As Taiwan is outside the scope of Pfizer’s COVID-19 vaccine collaboration agreement with BioNTech, we will have to refer you to BioNTech for any questions on this matter.”

BioNTech did not immediately respond to a request for comment. Wu did confirm, however, that the German government has helped with talks underway between Taiwan and BioNTech SE, after a deal fell through earlier this year.

Taiwan had blamed China for blocking that deal. Beijing, which has offered to supply Chinese-made vaccines as well as BioNTech shots, via the German firm’s Chinese partner Shanghai Fosun Pharmaceutical Group Co Ltd, has denied that accusation.

Wu also cited Japanese Foreign Minister Toshimitsu Motegi

as saying that Japan is “seriously and positively” considering donating vaccines to Taiwan. “Taiwan and Japan are always very good partners. And in times of difficulties, we always try to reach out to each other,” Wu said.

Japan plans to donate about 1.2 million AstraZeneca vaccines to Taiwan, public broadcaster NHK reported.

About 3% of Taiwan’s 23.5 million people have been inoculated, and the government has been scrambling to ensure the millions of vaccines it has ordered arrive on time amid global shortages.

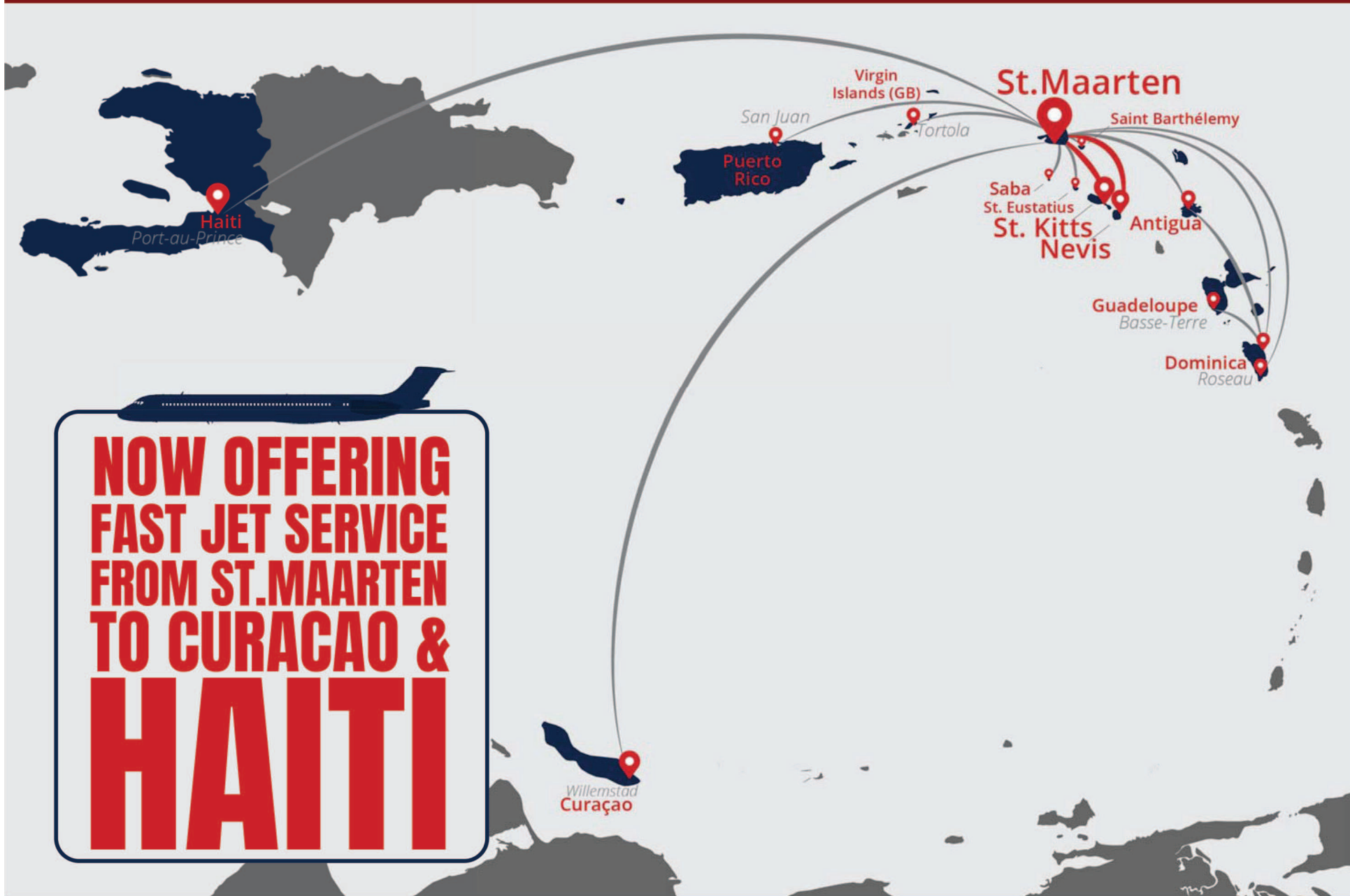

# US Spy Plane Flies Into China's Air Defence Zone

TAIPEI (Taiwan News) A US Air Force reconnaissance aircraft has flown directly into the East China Sea area of China's

air defense identification zone (ADIZ).

Chinese think tank South China Sea Strategic Situation Probing Initiative tweeted that a US Air Force RC-135U aircraft had entered China's ADIZ Thursday morning (3 June).

The plane took off from Kadena base in Okinawa, Japan, and flew into the East China Sea before heading west towards China. It then turned south and flew as far as Fujian Province before returning to the base along the same flight path.

Multiple American military planes have conducted missions

in the region in the past two days. On Wednesday (2 June) a US Navy P-8A maritime patrol aircraft flew southward along the median line of the Taiwan Strait, The Liberty Times reported.

The same day two US Marine Corps V-22 tiltrotor planes and two MC-130 special operations command aircraft were spotted in the Bashi Channel between Taiwan and The Philippines. Southwest of the channel two RC-130 reconnaissance planes, a KC-135 tanker aircraft, and a P-8A patrol plane, were detected.

The RC-135U is a reconnaissance aircraft manned by a minimum of 21 crewmembers that is capable of locating and identifying military ground, ocean, or air-based radar signals, as well as collecting data for further analysis.

making sure reparations, which are inherently aimed at specific groups, don't create more division by leaving out others who may have suffered harm in different ways.

## Estimating harm

The first step then is to rigorously take account of the harms inflicted. That can be extremely difficult. Even where the historic record is unambiguous and agreed upon, there is rarely the data available to accurately assess the harms people have suffered.

To compound the issue, some harms are so difficult to assess for in the first place - for example, the emotional distress experienced by descendants - or so widespread - such as the pervasive legacy of racism in society - as to be uncountable. In the absence of data-based estimates, there is greater scope for subjectivity to sway the debate and hinder attempts to arrive at acceptable compensation.

Even where the data does allow accurate estimation of the causal impact of historic harms, the next question is how much money is required to compensate for them. This question is also very difficult to answer.

Canvassing public opinion is an option, but behavioural scientists often find people's answers are incoherent. In public opinion experiments, the conclusion reached by legal scholar Cass Sunstein and psychologist and economics Nobel Laureate Daniel Kahneman, is that people answer these questions by reporting their general attitudes rather than their considered evaluations of the specific situations.

So far the problems outlined have been technical: how to measure harm on a money scale. Now the substantial problems begin. How to divide the compensation across groups? There is a human tendency to overestimate one's own burden relative to others".

Ask two partners in a relationship what percentage of housework they do and, for the majority of couples, the answers will add up to a total that exceeds 100%. That violation of statistics occurs in a case where there is nothing at stake. Imagine how fraught things get when the stakes include large sums of money and issues of identity and victimhood. In this sense, any attempt simply to "compensate" for specific atrocities looks likely to provoke resentments among groups that have been differently harmed.

But there are other approaches. This month France launches a "memories and truth" commission to shed light on its acts during the Algerian war. If reparations are part of the process, philosopher Leif Wenar advocates that they should serve the function of improving future relations rather than of compensating for past wrongs.

The climate crisis offers former colonial powers an opportunity to make a positive contribution in this regard. Everyone agrees that global carbon emissions must reduce but the big question remains: who has to reduce their production and consumption? The countries that are most developed today got that way because they exploited the Earth's resources and people in the past. A reasonable way to proceed is for developed countries to make sacrifices and give less-developed countries their turn.

# Reparations For Slavery And Colonial Abuses - How Behavioural Science Can Help

Germany has agreed to pay Namibia more than Euro 1 billion (£940 million) in reparations for committing genocide during the colonial occupation of the country a century ago. It's a landmark deal that will create a 30-year programme of investment in infrastructure, healthcare and training programmes in Namibia.

But it wasn't easy reaching this agreement. Negotiations have been ongoing since 2015. Last year, Germany offered Namibia Euro10 million (£8.6 million) but the Namibian authorities rejected it.

And while the latest deal may set a precedent for the victims and descendants of victims of historic abuses seeking reparations payments - calls for which have grown in the last year in response to the Black Lives Matter movement - there are still many obstacles.

Alongside how to reach such agreements, one of the biggest questions is how to agree reparations in a way that helps heal society rather than causes further division. Behavioural science is a discipline that has made a study of how identity and emotion relate to money, so I believe the field has insights for the reparations

issue.

Namibia's rejection of Germany's initial offer will come as no surprise to those familiar with the ultimatum game. In this experimental economics game, there are two players, G and N. G is arbitrarily given some money, say £10. N receives nothing. G must select how much, if any, of the cash to share with N. N can accept G's offer or reject it. If N rejects then neither G nor N receive anything - both go home empty handed.

Economic theory offers a prediction: G offers N some tiny amount of wealth because N would be made materially better off by taking even a paltry sum of money rather than refusing it. That prediction has been refuted time and again and across cultures. In reality, N typically rejects the offer if it is only a small proportion of the initial endowment. The common sense that explains this result is reflected in everyday language when we talk of an offer as being "insultingly low".

A minimum criterion for reparations is that they avoid being insultingly low by adequately recognising the harm caused. But there is also a balance to be struck in

# IICA Rabbit Rearing Project beneficiaries to attend workshop on agriculture, health and food safety

**BASSETERRE, ST. KITTS, June 1, 2021 (MMS-SKN)**

— Six months after 65 householders on St. Kitts received a pair of rabbits courtesy of the Inter-American Institute for Cooperation on Agriculture (IICA) Rabbit Rearing Project, the regional agency, which has been monitoring the rabbit farmers, is planning to hold a workshop on ‘Agriculture, Health and Food Safety’, and the slaughtering of rabbits in conjunction with the Department of Agriculture.

Technical Specialist, St. Kitts and Nevis IICA Delegation, Ms Sharon Jones has been visiting some of the 65 backyard farmers who, in October last year as part of a week of activities marking World Food Day 2020 received the rabbits to boost food security at the household level, and in the long term could provide another source of income.

Among the farmers visited to find out how they have been managing the rabbits included Ms Kimoy Phillip of LaGuerrite Village. According to Ms Jones, “It was pleasant in that we had one person, Ms Phillips, who not only received the rabbits but was already breeding them and they had multiplied. She now has six rabbits, and they are healthy, and in good condition.”

Ms Phillip, who praised the IICA Rabbit Rearing Project for working with local farmers, said her intention is to increase the number of rabbits and would also wish to see other people come on board and rear rabbits, not for pets but for food, “so we can feed ourselves, the country and maybe even put some of the rabbit at the market and see how we get them shipped out to various countries as an export.”

Also visited was Mr Feldon Challenger of Shadwell who had received two rabbits but had not started breeding them as they were still young. He teamed up with a seasoned rabbit farmer,

Mr Melville Mardenborough who apart from passing on knowledge to him.

“Then we met a young boy, Master Craig Jeffers, a student at the Basseterre High School, who though he had not received the rabbits from the project, he was doing very well,” noted Ms Jones. “And not only that - he had his own little kitchen garden where he was recycling some of the material from his kitchen garden into feeding the rabbits, so that was very good. He is a young chap, so he really needs to be encouraged.”

Others visited were Ms Florence Dolly Tweede of Humming Bird Development, and Mrs Isis Phipps of New Road. Ms Jones who was accompanied by Unit Head at the Livestock Production of the Department of Agriculture, Mr Miguel Flemming, on the field to visit the farmers noted that they will visit the other recipients to ensure the rabbits are in good condition, from where they will then move on to the next step.

“Once we have decided that the rabbits are in good condition, all the recipients would be invited to a workshop on Agriculture, Health and Food Safety and the slaughtering of rabbits,” said Ms Jones. “This is to ensure that they adhere to the public health codes because most of them are in their backyard in residential areas. Also, we want to ensure that

the households adhere to the health protocols when they slaughter the rabbits and can determine if the rabbits are in good health to consume the meat.”

All the recipients are expected to attend that workshop, which according to Ms Jones is very important. They will then be invited to another workshop which will be in cage making so that when they multiply their rabbits, they can have cages for the offspring. Farmers who would not have attended the workshop on Agriculture, Health and Food Safety will not be invited to the cage making workshop.

“We will keep monitoring the householders through the course of the year just to ensure that they are doing well,” stated Ms Jones. “I think the goal at the end of the year is that the Ministry of Agriculture wants to have a rabbit festival where the householders can participate.”

# Three Factors Exacerbate Suicidal Behavior In Bullied Teens

James Cook University researchers have found three lifestyle factors that predispose bullied adolescents to plan or attempt

suicide.

Dr Yaqoot Fatima from James Cook University and The University of Queensland was part of a team that analyzed data from a survey of more than 280,000 students aged 13 to 17 from 90 countries.

She said suicide is the third leading cause of death among adolescents.

“Compared to adolescents who were not bullied, adolescents who experienced bullying have more than twice the odds of thinking about and planning suicide, and close to three times greater odds of attempting it,” said lead author Mr Md Mehedi Hasan from the University of Queensland.

Dr Fatima said more than 30 percent of the students surveyed had been bullied and more than 10 percent of these had attempted suicide.

“Reducing adolescent suicide through bullying prevention strategies requires an understanding of the

intermediate factors involved in this relationship, in particular the mechanisms and pathways through which bullying relates to suicidal behavior,” she said.

The researchers said there were a number of factors linking bullying and suicide, but three were significant.

“The strongest links between bullying and suicidal behaviors were loneliness, sleep disturbances, and alcohol consumption.

“Nearly one-fifth of the total association between bullying and suicidal ideation was linked to loneliness. Sleep disturbances and alcohol consumption were the link between bullying and suicidal behaviors in 4 to 9 percent of cases,” said Dr Fatima.

She said the three factors may reinforce each other, with alcohol consumption linked to sleep disruption and loneliness, bullies targeting lonely people, and loneliness a common end result of chronic peer bullying as victims become isolated.

“This study suggests targeted policies and early implementation of strategies focusing on addressing loneliness, sleep disturbance and alcohol consumption can reduce the risk of adverse suicidal behaviors among adolescents.

“It highlights the importance of screening adolescents for these intermediate factors and designing community-wide policies and programs that promote social engagement, good sleep health and less alcohol consumption,” said Dr Fatima.

# Taiwan Says In Vaccine Talks With Pfizer And J&J

Taiwan is in talks with COVID-19 vaccine makers like Pfizer and Johnson and Johnson for more supplies, its foreign minister said on Thursday while expressing appreciation to Japan for considering donating much needed shots.

Taiwan has been a model for how to control the pandemic, but a recent spike in domestic infections has increased the need to inoculate people faster.

During a video call with international media in Japan, Foreign Minister Joseph Wu repeated complaints that China, which claims the island as its own territory, has hampered efforts to secure more vaccines, and kept Taiwan excluded from the World Health Organisation.

So far Taiwan has received only the Moderna Inc and AstraZeneca Plc vaccines. But Wu said his government was “negotiating with individual companies like Pfizer” and J&J, while expressing confidence in its domestic vaccine rollout.

“When and if our own vaccines are rolled out toward the end of July, I think this will become the most important supply for the vaccine demand here in Taiwan,” Wu said. Johnson & Johnson was not immediately available for comment.

Responding to Reuters request for comment, Pfizer said: “As Taiwan is outside the scope of Pfizer’s COVID-19 vaccine collaboration agreement with BioNTech, we will have to refer you to BioNTech for any questions on this matter.”

BioNTech did not immediately respond to a request for comment. Wu did confirm, however, that the German government has helped with talks underway between Taiwan and BioNTech SE, after a deal fell through earlier this year.

Taiwan had blamed China for blocking that deal. Beijing, which has offered to supply Chinese-made vaccines as well as BioNTech shots, via the German firm’s Chinese partner Shanghai Fosun Pharmaceutical Group Co Ltd, has denied that accusation.

Wu also cited Japanese Foreign Minister Toshimitsu Motegi

as saying that Japan is “seriously and positively” considering donating vaccines to Taiwan. “Taiwan and Japan are always very good partners. And in times of difficulties, we always try to reach out to each other,” Wu said.

Japan plans to donate about 1.2 million AstraZeneca vaccines to Taiwan, public broadcaster NHK reported.

About 3% of Taiwan’s 23.5 million people have been inoculated, and the government has been scrambling to ensure the millions of vaccines it has ordered arrive on time amid global shortages.



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# CWI AND CPL CONTINUE EMERGING PLAYERS PATHWAY COLLABORATION

ST JOHN'S, Antigua - Cricket West Indies (CWI) and the Hero Caribbean Premier League (CPL) will continue to offer development opportunities to some of the best young West Indians in the ninth edition of the CPL, which takes place in St Kitts later this year. Since 2019, and for the third consecutive season, twelve (12) players have been drafted, retained or signed into the two mandatory Emerging Player positions in each of the six CPL franchises.

Each CPL franchise will have to field an Emerging Player a minimum of five times during the tournament, ensuring that these players get at least some competitive playing experience and the opportunity to train with some of the best players and coaches from across the Caribbean, and around the world.

The list of 12 retained and drafted players includes recent West Indies Men's Test and T20I debutants Joshua Da Silva and Kevin Sinclair who will feature for the St Kitts & Nevis Patriots and Guyana Amazon Warriors respectively. At relatively young ages, these two players have notably risen through the CWI development ranks in the last 18 months since featuring for the victorious West Indies Emerging team in the 2019 CG Insurance Super50 Cup.

Four of the Emerging Players will be experiencing the CPL for the first time: Joshua James, Kirk McKenzie, Kadeem Alleyne and Leonardo Julien. McKenzie and James were members of the West Indies Under-19 side that featured in the last ICC Under-19 Cricket World Cup, held in South Africa in 2020, who now have a chance to develop their white ball skills with the Jamaica Tallawahs.

CWI's Director of Cricket, Jimmy Adams congratulated the selected players saying: "CWI is extremely happy for the 12 Emerging Players who will participate in this year's CPL tournament. The Emerging Player programme is now a focal point of our elite player pathway and the CPL plays a critical role in exposing these young players to elite players and high level competition. We have no doubt that the experience gained by these young players will be a significant factor in establishing the next generation of international players within this format of the game."

Reflecting on the third year of the CWI and CPL collaboration, CWI's High-Performance Manager Graeme West said: "The Emerging Player Programme underlines the growth and strength of the CWI and CPL partnership. They had team sessions on Friday as well as Saturday morning and afternoon and Head Coach, Phil Simmons is happy to be able to now finetune his squad's preparation in the build-up to the two-match Test Series against South Africa. These matches will be played at the Daren Sammy Cricket Ground for the Sir Vivian Richards Trophy on June 10-14 and June 18-22 and are the final matches in the current cycle of the ICC World Test Championship.

The Proteas are due to arrive on the island on Tuesday, June 1.

The West Indies players will be involved in a "Best v Best" four-day match, at the same venue beginning on Monday, May 31, and the Head Coach sees this as a great opportunity for all involved. Full details on this match will be made available later.

"I am happy that we are

back to full training. We are happy with the preparations up to this point and everyone is fully aware of what is required," Simmons said. "Yes, we had four good Test matches (vs Bangladesh and Sri Lanka), but at the same time, people need to know that their position is not guaranteed unless they continue play well. Guys who are out, need to show that they want to get back in by doing well in these games. So, it is a benefit to every one of us."

Simmons also praised the facilities provided in St. Lucia throughout the camp at the Daren Sammy Cricket Ground, which is overseen by CWI Head Groundsman, Kent Crafton. The West Indies Men are gearing up to begin a busy summer schedule, which includes visits from South Africa, Australia and Pakistan before the Caribbean Premier League begins in late August.

The players and staff were previously forced to train in small groups, as a result of the positive COVID-19 and isolation of fast bowler Marquino Mindley on Friday, May 22. Mindley, who has
