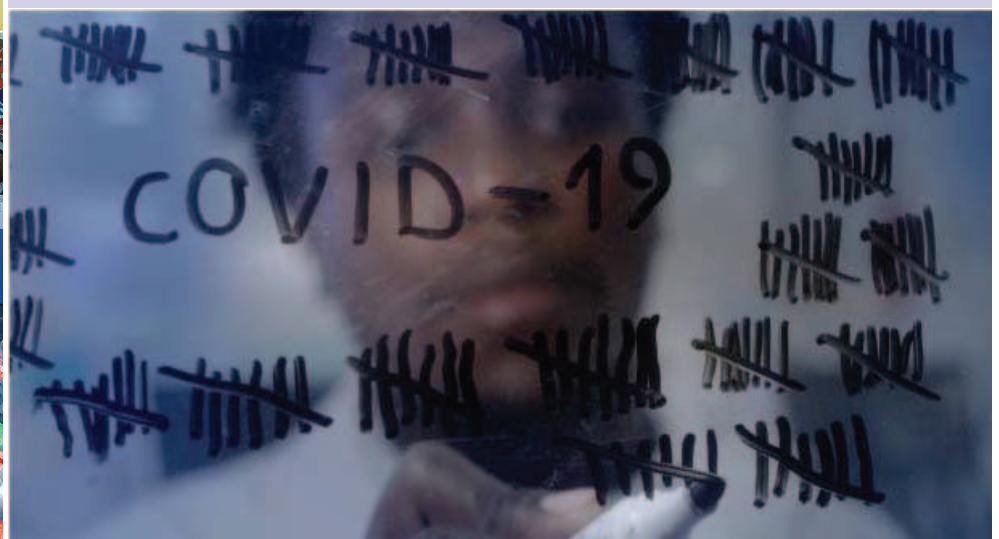

Editorial

"The Poor Can't Take No More"

On Tuesday night last, 1 March, US President Joseph Biden made his first 'State of The Union' address to Congress (a joint sitting of Senate and House). While speaking about the current state of affairs in the US economy he pointed out that employment levels were on the increase, but expressed his fear that big business and other employers would seek to scale back the pay of workers because of certain 'perceived' increases in the costs of production and the provision of services.

In order to realise increases in profits businesses habitually 'cut costs' by reducing the pay of workers, and almost always as a 'first' resort rather than as a 'last' one. They very seldom ever make any downward adjustment in the pay of executives, especially those at the higher end of the pay scales.

Indeed, it has become something of a phenomenon for those at the very top levels of businesses to be 'awarded' scandalous amounts of bonuses at times when their enterprises have underperformed, or even failed.

While acknowledging that there are certain increases in the cost of doing business, manufacturing, wholesale, retailing and otherwise, compounded by the difficulties in the global supply chain occasioned by the COVID-19 pandemic, President Biden appealed with employers and others to refrain from attacking the pay of their employees, as doing so would only lead to serious reversals in their living standards.

In brief, President Biden called upon them to 'reduce costs' rather than reduce 'pay'.

Many will argue that 'pay' is a part of costs, and that is true. However, the point which Mr Biden went on to make is that other costs can always be identified and reduced before attacks are launched on 'pay'.

We call on our government, such as it is, to take a page from Mr Biden's book, and make some efforts at helping the workers of our beloved St Kitts and Nevis.

On several occasions we have drawn to the attention of government the dire economic and financial circumstances by

which the ordinary people of our country are now confronted, but it has fallen on deaf ears.

The almost daily increases in the price of goods at our supermarkets and groceries are causing our people much agony, and, in many cases, sleepless nights. That will eventually lead to serious declines in health.

A very recent case involves an overnight increase in the price of certain commodity from four dollars to eleven dollars. Yes, dear people, this is no mistake, you are reading correctly. And that is only one example.

from ten dollars (\$10) to twenty dollars (\$20), and students in uniform from fifteen dollars (\$15) to twenty-five dollars (\$25).

What, may we ask, is the government doing about any of this?

When they first assumed office, and throughout their first term, they made a big song-and-dance about reducing the cost of living. That has all turned out to be a huge amount of nothingness.

Once again we of The Labour Spokesman call upon the government to have compassion, and show some concern for our people, especially those who not well off.

Task Force Official Advises Individuals Not To Abuse New Quarantine Changes

BASSETERRE, St.Kitts (Friday 4th March 2022)- Chairman of the COVID-19 National Task Force Abdias Samuel is calling on quarantined individuals not to abuse the ease of restrictions under a shorter period and without paid security officers on guard.

“Yes, there will not be a monitoring system. So we will not put any bracelet on you, we’re not going to put anyone to hunt you down. However, here is the reality: The penalties are still in existence if you break quarantine.”

He was at the time addressing one of the new measures put in place as it relates to one of three Cabinet-approval changes to our health and travel protocols which became effective March 1st 2022.

The change will now see a reduction in quarantine for unvaccinated nationals asking that they complete a period seven days as reduced instead of nine.

“Therefore, I am appealing to all individuals not to abuse this easing of this particular restrictions. We saw it as a particular burden on you the unvaccinated inbound traveler and we thought it best to give it consideration and have the Cabinet agree to the removal of this protocol. So again, you need to exercise that persona responsibility because if you are seen and you break the quarantine then you will be taken before the court to face your penalty or your crime,” Samuel further stated.

According to him: “Some persons were calling about having to pay for security while they were home; that’s inbound travelers to St.Kitts and Nevis so in consideration and approval of Cabinet so this has been removed.”

In sharing an example about

the quarantine system involving the unvaccinated travelling nationals said, Samuel stated: “Abdias Samuel... travelling from Miami and wants to return home to St.Kitts unvaccinated so therefore passenger ‘A’ Abdias Samuel arrives after

completing and getting the approval on the KNA travel platform arrives In the Federation of St.Kitts and Nevis. He’s flagged and processed. He will be sent to do his seven-day quarantine and he will have to utilize the COVID-19 certified taxi for now. He goes home, spends his seven-day quarantine as the new reduced quarantine vaccination period. On day seven, the Ministry of Health. They would contact you and let you know when your day seven test will be ready.”

Meanwhile, in giving the Health Situation Report, the Chief Medical Officer Dr.

Hazel Laws talked about the three approved changes to the health and travel protocols.

The other two changes outlined by Dr. Laws are no quarantine for persons coming in with a certain five types of vaccines as well as persons in the Federation who are planning short trips to neighbouring islands.

She said there will be no quarantine for persons coming in with any of the five vaccines namely- Abdala, Sobrena 2, Sobrena Plus, Medigen Vaccine and Sputnik V.

As indicated by her, these vaccines have not yet received WHO emergency use listing.

“Individuals who are coming from Cuba, Taiwan or coming in with any of the three vaccines available in Cuba, the Medigen vaccine available in Taiwan or the Sputnik V vaccine, they will be allowed to come in and they will not have to serve a quarantine period,” Dr. Laws said.

Having spoken about the reduction in quarantine period for unvaccinated nationals, she commented “please note that this

reduced quarantine period can be completed at home without the paid security facility.”

She highlighted that the third change refers to persons in the Federation who are planning short trips to neighbouring islands.

“When I say short trips, I mean in terms they would leave St. Kitts and return to St. Kitts or Nevis within a 24-hour period. So in other words, they are not overnighing. So such individuals who leave the Federation and travel to a neighbouring island for less than 24 hours can return by completing the entry form [<https://www.knatravelform.com>]. They are also required to submit a negative COVID-19 test done prior to departure. So for example, if you're going to St. Maarten and an antigen test is required to go to St. Maarten, you can upload that negative test onto the platform and you can get approval to return on that test. However, travellers will be tested for COVID-19 upon arrival back to at the RLB or Vance Amory airport, or if you're coming in by sea, you can access testing through any of the laboratories on island,” the CMO explained.

These travelers, she said, will be flagged for 24-hour quarantine until their negative result is returned.

Dr. Laws also stated that the other health and travel protocols remain the same.

Additionally, she said all visitors to the Federation must be vaccinated and all inbound travellers must still submit a negative PCR test done within 72 hours of arrival.

Music Festival, Sugar Mas Get Green light For 2022 Mass Events Happenings

BASSETERRE, St.Kitts (Friday 4th March 2022)-Both the annual St.Kitts Music Festival and Sugar Mas have gotten approval for 2022 hosting in light of relax restrictions for mass events.

Chairman of the COVID-19 National Task Force Abdias Samuel, while speaking at the NEOC briefing held on Wednesday 2nd March revealed that Cabinet has approved the hosting of St.Kitts Music Festival in June, which comes after a two-year pause due to the pandemic.

In relation to the Sugar Mas (St.Kitts-Nevis National Carnival), Minister of Culture with responsibility for Carnival Jonel Powell gave confirmation while giving remarks at the Sugar Mas 50 Prize Giving ceremony held on Saturday 26th February at the Marriott Dome in Frigate Bay.

Carnival, amidst the pandemic, has seen virtual and scaled backed adjustments due to the restrictions on mass events and vaccination entry policy.

Samuel shared that the Chairman of the St.Kitts Music Festival Damion Hobson presented statics and proposals adding that the festival is proposed to start from the 23rd to 25th June 2022 form the hours of 7PM to 2AM thereabout.

"They have requested approximately 4000- 6000 patrons for each night; that's the Thursday night, Friday night and Saturday night and the venue for this year's potential hosting of the St.Kitts Music Festival will be at the Kim Collins Stadium. I am pleased to announcement to you that the Cabinet has approved the hosting of St.Kitts Music Festival in June of 2022," he outlined.

Powell, followed up on remarks by Carnival Chairperson Shannon Hawley pertaining to the possibility of Sugar Mas 51 after she would have indicated lightheartedly "don't quote me."

"I want to endorse something our Chair lady said. It's coming back. Maybe that should be the phrase for Sugar Mas 51... 'The Road is coming back'. The full



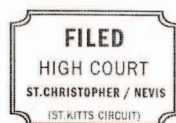
force of our St.Kitts-Nevis [National] Carnival Sugar Mas is coming back for Sugar Mas 51 in 2022, and I'm gonna go out on a limb and say that you're all invited back to participate with us and to do so in the new home of carnival come Sugar Mas 51..." Powell expressed.

The Carnival Minister congratulated participants and in particular the winners saying "you did a fantastic job; I know that you are really going to represent St.Kitts-Nevis at higher stages...bigger stages elsewhere. Thank you for the dedication and hard work..."

He also thanked the Carnival team for "elevating Sugar Mas."

In reflected on the efforts into the staging of Sugar Mas 50, he had this to say: "A lot of person questioned should we have Carnival 50, should we have carnival...but we needed carnival not just that feel good experience at a difficult time in our history but to pump some much needed energy back into our entertainment sector in particular; a sector that has been hit probably the most and that deserves our support and so I was happy to be able to ensure that we had our Sugar Mas 50 so that some entertainers were able to get much needed work, so that stakeholders our young people were able to really benefit from jobs at a difficult time..."



Doctor Of Culture Zack Nisbett Remembers Drowning Victim 'Bonzo' As Helpful Tower of Strength

BASSETERRE, St.Kitts (Friday 4th March 2022)-Well-known Cultural Preservationist Winston 'Zack' Nisbett has described the late 50-year-old Kenneth 'Bonzo' Percival of McKnight as someone who was dedicated, trustworthy and always ready to lend a helping hand.

In an exclusive sit-down interview with this media house on Tuesday 1st March 2022, Nisbett recalled the qualities of the past volunteer of the annual Basil Henderson Easter Monday Aquatic Sports Meet (traditionally held at the Basseterre Ferry Terminal) of which Nisbett is the event organiser.

Police are investigating an incident at the Ferry Terminal in Basseterre after responding to a report that a man had drowned. That report, according to a police statement, was received close to 4 p.m. on Saturday 26th February involving Percival who dived into the sea from the pier at the ferry terminal to retrieve the propeller of a motor vessel that had fallen off.

"Bonzo's death came as shock to me when I heard of it because

to me Bonzo has left a void in community development and its enhancement both in his honesty and his creativity," Nisbett expressed.

He continued: "Bonzo is someone who you can trust-honest, dedicated and always willing to assist someone regardless of his circumstances. He always there to lend a helping hand. I can attest with him assisting us at the Ferry Terminal in terms of the Basil Henderson Aquatic Sports Meet for the past two to three consecutive years when we had our functions. He would come around and he would assist Mr. Christopher Roberts with the greasing of both poles, the ham-fetch one extending horizontally over the sea and the vertical one with the prize money on top of it. They would go up on the ladder and take their time and grease it."

According to Nisbett Percival took his role a volunteer "very seriously."

"He would come down very early and if the beach needed to be cleaned, he would come and assist me, and he's always

there when we're putting in the pole somehow, he is right there on the spot always there to help and pin down the pole. He always wants to know what happening next. When the prize gifts are there, he was like a watchdog around the gifts; making sure that nobody steals anything. You couldn't take up a pin while Bonzo is around. He took his role very seriously... a dependable person and trustworthy," he noted.

Asked how Percival became a volunteer for the aquatic sports meet, Nisbett had this to say: "He is just somebody who always want to assist some way or the other, and when you have people of such magnitude, you have to give them credit because he is a dedicated soldier. You don't have to ask him to come. He sees the need and he would put himself to help. I wish more persons would be like that. He is a real community minded citizen and he does it without any remorse when he assists and when the event is finished and we made a little contribution as a token of appreciation to him, he was very thankful with whatever you give him, and we respected that."

He remembered how Percival professionally carried out his duties during a year when many cases of drinks were donated by the Bottling Company which saw him (Percival) making "sure they were given out right along with some medals and he would make sure we sort it out right down to the wire."

"Bonzo will be missed by the entire organisation, the aquatic sports committee and we hope someone would come and step up to the plate and assist like he did," Nisbett added.

In light of the relaxed restrictions on mass events, Nisbett is currently making plans to resume the activity for the 65th annual hosting.

"For the past two we didn't have the function due to the COVID but this year, we intend to use the time to try to revive it."

Nisbett has indicated that the memory of the late Kenneth 'Bonzo' Percival will be honoured at future event(s) noting that "The short stint he had with us, I can tell you, he was a tower of strength."

Meanwhile, more enquiries into the reported drowning according to police reveal that when Percival did not resurface, the St. Kitts and Nevis Coast Guard was called to assist.

Reportedly, an Officer from the Coast Guard discovered Percival's motionless body at the bottom of the sea. Police say personnel from the Forensic Department visited and processed the scene.

SWIFT - Ejecting Russia Is Largely Symbolic - Here's Why

Russia's invasion of Ukraine is horrifying. Western leaders, fearing a broader war, are responding primarily with economic sanctions. A prominent economic sanction has been Russia's exclusion from the international payments messaging system Swift, presented as a powerful means of undermining its economy.

But for a payments expert such as myself, this is something of a myth. Yes, Swift messaging systems are a critical part of international economic activity. They provide extremely secure communications, developed over five decades, dovetailing with the many and varied operations of commercial banks in international transactions. Swift systems would also be a prime target in any cyberwarfare, though thankfully they are well defended.

The reality, however, is that limiting access to Swift is less practically effective than most media coverage supposes. It is an important symbol of global repudiation of Russia's exercise of military force, but not much more.

It is other measures, such as blocking the central bank of the Russian Federation from transacting internationally, which is undermining confidence in the rouble.

To understand the limited practical effect of ejection from Swift, it's worth looking at Iran. The US has applied and periodically reinforced trade prohibitions against Iran ever since 1987. This culminated in Barack Obama's executive order in February 2011 to freeze all the US assets of Iran's government, central bank and financial institutions. Iranian banks were ejected from Swift only later, in March 2012. This was only supplementary to direct restrictions on Iranian businesses and financial intermediaries.

Iranian banks could and did still arrange payments in and out

of Iran, using banks in third countries that were willing to take a margin on these transactions. That was never easy, with the US authorities imposing fines totalling nearly US\$5 billion (Â£3.7 billion) on European banks for providing this service to Iran. Exclusion from Swift did not prevent them from doing this. So what is Swift for exactly?

How Swift works

Swift was founded in 1973 to provide secure messaging for international payments. It is a Belgian member-owned co-operative, with around 11,000 member banks from 200 countries and territories. It provides messaging systems for instructing and then monitoring interbank payments and trade finance, integrated into banks'

processing systems worldwide.

The acronym is apposite, since speed is an important part of payments, but its origins are reflected in the rather archaic full version, Society for Worldwide Interbank Financial Telecommunication. Nowadays, of course, these communications are internet-based.

Today, Swift handles around 40 million payment messages each day. If we assume that without such a messaging system, each payment would take a bank clerk a few hours to process, the saving might be about US\$100 per transaction. This would mean that Swift adds value of around US\$4 billion per day or US\$1 trillion per year to the global economy.

The key point is that Swift does messages and their supporting technology and standards; it has no role in payment execution.

Suppose a London bank wants to send funds to a bank in Moscow. It may use Swift messaging to communicate the payment, but not to execute it. The actual execution can be done in various ways: using roubles held as a pre-existing balance with the bank in Russia; or acquiring roubles from sale of either sterling in the foreign exchange market, or of rouble assets such as Russian government bonds.

None of this depends on Swift. There is no fundamental problem with transferring funds using some other secure

messaging system. Russian banks might, for example, instead arrange payments using the SPFS system, which was established, after the 2014 invasion of Crimea, by the Russian central bank. This is currently used by a handful of international banks in Germany and Switzerland linked to Russian banks.

Or they could use the CIPS network, which was created by the People's Bank of China for the purpose of cross-border payments in renminbi with indirect participants in many countries. They could even use WhatsApp to instruct the necessary transactions.

Payments for Russian energy exports, for example to Gazprom, are even less Swift-dependent.

When operators buy oil or gas from Gazprom, they make payments in either euro or US dollars into bank accounts held by the Russian energy company. So if the intention of sanctions is to block payments for Russian gas, the tool is not Swift; it is sanctions on Gazprom and its banking facilities.

None of this is to say that there will be no economic impact in ejecting Russian banks from Swift. It will affect lower value payments, such as those in small business supply chains, because Swift makes payments processing so cheap and easy.

When you multiply the saving across many thousands of payments, it clearly adds up, but it's nowhere close to a game-changer.

The long haul

The uncomfortable fact remains that economic sanctions, if they are to be more than symbolic, necessarily impose costs on both sides and might have to be imposed for a long time. Russia has spent a decade preparing for the current war and any consequent economic sanctions.

It has invested hugely in its military alongside brutal repression of domestic political discussion to eliminate opposition to war. Its military operations are not dependent on either external financing or external supplies. It has restructured its economy, at substantial cost in terms of standards of living, turning itself from a major food importer to a net food exporter and reorientating much of its trade, for example to India and Egypt.

Financial and economic pressures on the Russian economy are now mounting rapidly. Above all, these will be impacting the Russian middle classes as the rouble crashes and interest rates shoot up. Other more targeted sanctions are hitting wealthy Russian individuals.

It is conceivable that all this could lead to a rapid collapse of the Putin autocracy, but we should not engage in wishful thinking. Wide-ranging economic sanctions on Russia may be needed for a lengthy period of time. Ejection from Swift is a symbol of these efforts, not a powerful economic tool that can constrain Russia's

actions in Ukraine at little cost to ourselves.

Defence Minister Says Taiwan Relies On Own Military For Defence

Chiu Kuo-cheng says Taiwan has never considered foreign military assistance in defence strategy.

TAIPEI (Taiwan News) - Taiwan relies on its own military for defense, Minister of National Defense Chiu Kuo-cheng said during a Legislative Yuan meeting on Wednesday 2 March.

Kuomintang Legislator Lai Shih-pao asked Chiu if he thought, given the US' refusal to send troops to Ukraine, it is likely Washington would not help militarily in a Taiwan Strait conflict, CNA reported.

Chiu said that there are many strategies in the military's playbook on how to defend Taiwan and its outlying islands, but not one of them considers how to fight if the country receives military assistance from abroad. Taiwan focuses on holding repeated drills in its northern, central, southern, and eastern regions, he said.

"The Taiwan military is entirely on its own," Chiu said.

Additionally, Premier Su Tseng-chang said, "We have never said that we will rely on troops sent over by foreign countries."

IICA will open the doors of its internship program to female Ukrainian professionals

In making the announcement, the Director General of IICA explained, "we must put into practice what we publicly advocate: to generate opportunities and decision-making forums in a manner that benefits migrants and women in particular".

San Jose, 1 March 2022 (IICA) - The Director General of the Inter-American Institute for Cooperation on Agriculture (IICA), Manuel Otero, announced on Tuesday that it will open the doors of the agency's professional internship program to female Ukrainian graduates in fields related to agricultural sciences who are refugees.

IICA has a scholarship program for professional internships in agricultural research, development and innovation to support its

work for the benefit of the agriculture sector and rural communities. The Director General of the specialized agency decided to make the program available to young Ukrainian women trained in a country known for its agricultural tradition and for its reputation as a producer of raw materials for food processing.

"We are moved by profoundly humanistic instinct. Hundreds of thousands of people have fled Ukraine over the past few days and we must put into practice what we publicly advocate: to generate opportunities and decision-making forums in a manner that benefits migrants and women in particular", remarked Otero in making the announcement.

"By implementing inclusive actions, we also seek to

strengthen agricultural research and technological development, helping to build up strategic competencies in agricultural research, development and innovation", he added.

The Director General of IICA also urged "other international and national institutions to join this initiative, offering a present and a future to generations that have been displaced and frustrated by conflict".

The decision to open IICA's doors to female Ukrainian professional interns is also part of the international organization's commitment to "to increase the technical cooperation and assistance it provides to the countries of the Americas - many of which are food importers - in an effort to address and mitigate the consequences of the conflict in the region", added Otero.

The Director General of IICA recently warned that the situation in Eastern Europe could have potential negative consequences for global food security and trade in agricultural goods. He recalled that the impact on world peace, and the widespread uncertainty it triggers, disrupts the regular operation of markets and compromises food supply, affecting food prices and key inputs required for food production.

Ukraine, a predominantly agricultural state, is one of the largest global producers and exporters of sunflower, sunflower oil, barley and corn, as well as the European country with the largest percentage of arable land. At the global level, it is also a leading producer of potatoes, rye and wheat, among other products.

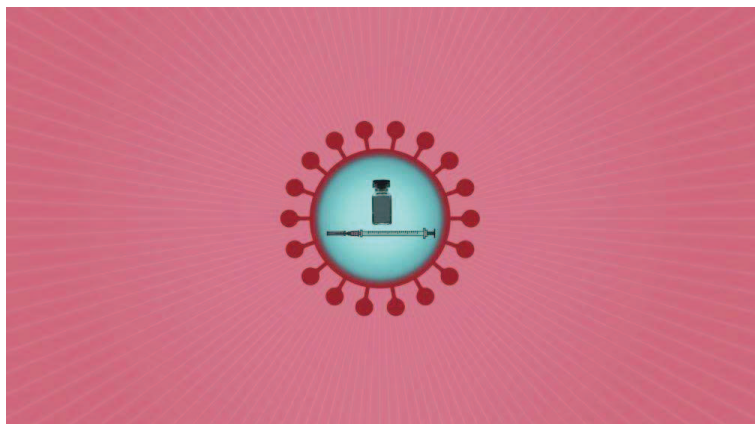

Why Are COVID Vaccination Rates Still Low In Some Countries?

Why are COVID-19 vaccination rates still low in some countries?

Limited supplies remain a problem, but experts say other challenges now include unpredictable deliveries, weak health care systems and vaccine hesitancy.

Most countries with low vaccination rates are in Africa. As of late February, 13 countries in Africa have fully vaccinated less than 5% of their populations, according to Phionah Atuhebwe, an officer for the World Health Organization's regional office for Africa.

Other countries with extremely low vaccination rates include Yemen, Syria, Haiti and Papua New Guinea.

For most of last year developing nations were plagued by a lack of supplies. Rich countries were hoarding doses, and many countries didn't have the facilities to make their own vaccines. COVAX - an initiative to distribute vaccines equally around the world - faltered in delivering shots.

Many rich countries had planned to donate doses once their own populations were vaccinated, but the emergence of the delta and omicron variants spurred booster campaigns that further delayed those plans. Vaccine makers have largely declined to share their formulas or technology, further restricting production.

Other setbacks to vaccinations have also emerged.

"The main problem among countries with low vaccination rates is poor infrastructure to distribute shots," says Dina

Donated vaccines are also sometimes delivered close to their expiration dates, giving health officials little time to distribute them, says Sinhye Ha of Doctors Without Borders.

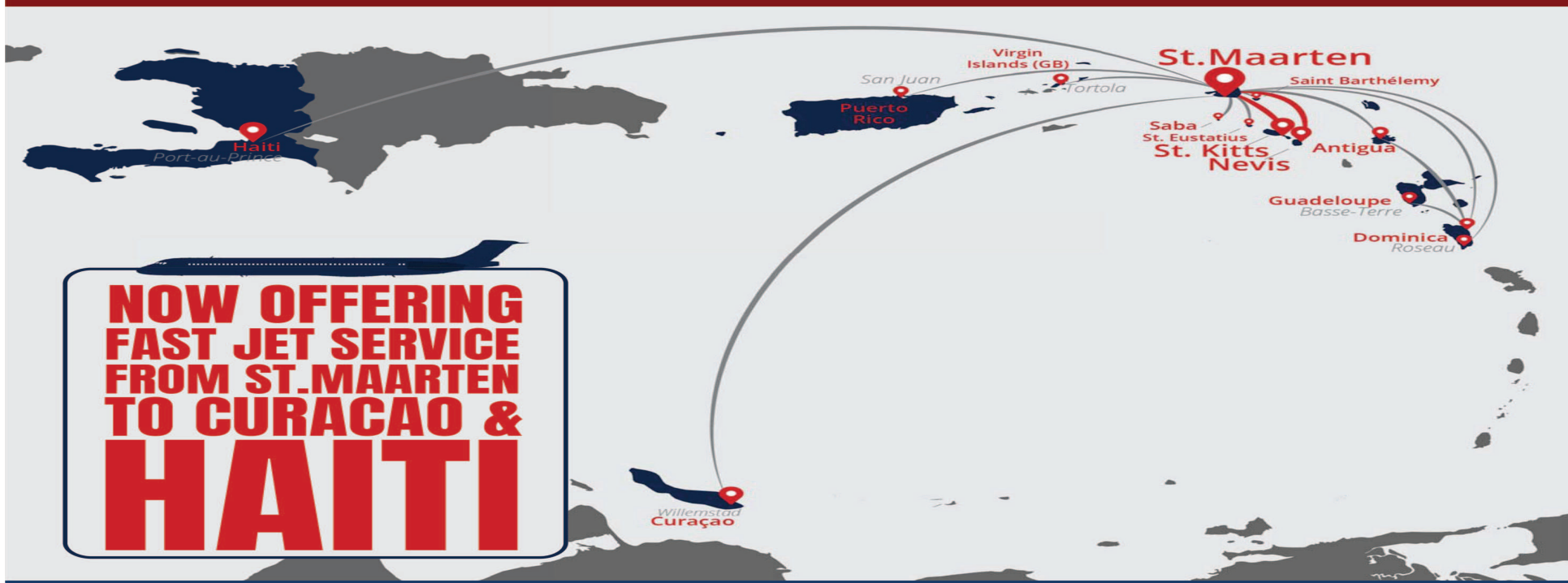

Schools hosting sports meets in preparation for the return of the Inter-Primary School Championship

NIA CHARLESTOWN NEVIS (March 02, 2022)—Public and private schools across Nevis have begun hosting their individual sports meets in preparation for the return of one of the largest events on the island's calendar- the annual Inter-Primary School Championship.

With the exception of St. James' primary, all meets will be held at the Nevis Athletic Stadium.

Hon. Eric Evelyn, Minister of Youth and Sports in the Nevis Island Administration (NIA), expressed his delight that the younger members of the population are resuming athletic competition.

"We certainly welcome the opportunity for our students to be back on the track and to be involved in athletics again and utilize their athletic abilities. Of course it has been a two-year wait and now it's over. We believe that sports is extremely important to our students; we want our students to remain fit, it's not only good for their physical health, it's also good for their mental health and their overall development as children and young adults.

"So we are very happy that we will be seeing sports again and I'm sure all of us- the students, the parents, the teachers and principals- this is a development that we all welcome and the fact that the Mondo Track will be utilized fully for the athletic development of our students."

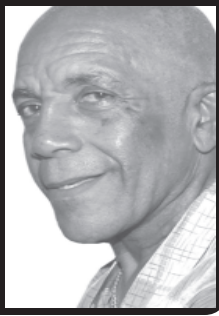

THE DESTRUCTIVE PEOPLE'S ACTION MOVEMENT, (P.A.M.)!! - PART (3)

Dear reader, The People's Action Movement (PAM) which was formed in 1965, contested the 1966 General Elections and lost all seats. Ukraine crisis: Russia to appeal against football ban imposed by Fifa and Uefa

The Russian Football Union said it will go to the Court of Arbitration for Sport (Cas) to appeal against its ban from international competitions after the country's invasion of Ukraine.

On Monday, Russian football clubs and national teams were suspended from all competitions "until further notice" by Fifa and Uefa.

The union said it would file one lawsuit against football's world and European governing bodies, demanding Russia's men's and women's national teams be allowed to compete.

Russia wants its national teams reinstated to play their men's World Cup play-off matches next month and the women's team once again included in this summer's Euro 2022 competition in England.

The union also said it could ask for the suspension of competitions they were originally scheduled to compete in if unsuccessful.

"If Fifa and Uefa refuse such a procedure, a requirement will be put forward for the introduction of interim measures in the form of suspension of Fifa and Uefa decisions, as well as competitions in which Russian teams were supposed to participate," Russian football authorities said.

Russian club Spartak Moscow were also kicked out of the Europa League and their last-16 opponents RB Leipzig will advance to the quarter-finals.

A statement from Russian football authorities said it "believes that Fifa and Uefa did not have a legal basis when deciding on the removal of Russian teams".

"The Russian Football Union was also not given the right to present its position, which violated the fundamental right to defence," the statement continued.

"In addition, when making decisions, Fifa and Uefa did not take into account other possible options for action, except for the complete exclusion of participants from the competition from Russia."

Fifa and Uefa intervened after Russia, supported by Belarus, launched a military invasion of neighbouring Ukraine last Thursday.

Russia says it "will insist on an expedited procedure for considering the case" in an effort to "ensure the possibility of the participation of Russian teams in the next scheduled matches"

The Russian men's team had been scheduled to face Poland in a World Cup play-off semi-final on 24 March.

The union, who say they will seek "compensation for damage", said actions taken against them "violated the fundamental rights of the RFU as a member of Fifa and Uefa"

"The decision to withdraw the national team from qualification for the 2022 World Cup was made under pressure from direct rivals in the play-offs, which violated the principle of sports and the rules of fair play," the RFU said.

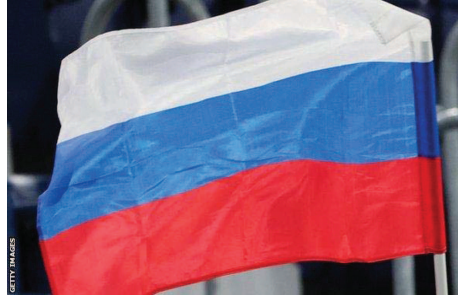
Fifa had previously ruled that Russia must complete their upcoming games in neutral territory, under the title Football Union of Russia, and without their flag and anthem.

However, that announcement had drawn criticism - and several nations, including England, Northern Ireland Scotland and Wales, as well as Poland, the Czech Republic and Sweden, in refusing to play against Russia.

The 2022 Champions League final, originally due to be played in St Petersburg on 28 May, has also been moved to Paris.

Meanwhile, UK culture secretary Nadine Dorries said there was "really strong consensus" for further action against Russia after hosting a virtual summit of ministers from more than 15 countries, which included the US, France, Poland, Canada and South Korea.

"Universal condemnation of Russia and Belarus, and all [were] clearly united in the same aim: ostracising Putin from the sporting stage," she posted on Twitter.



Rod Marsh: Legendary Australia wicketkeeper dies aged 74 after heart attack

Legendary Australia wicketkeeper Rod Marsh has died aged 74 after suffering a heart attack.

Marsh was taken ill last Thursday while travelling to a charity cricket match in Queensland.

He effected 355 dismissals - a world record at the time of his retirement - in 96 Test appearances for Australia from 1970 to 1984.

He also played 92 one-day internationals and served as Australia men's chairman of selectors until 2016.

Marsh is third on Australia's all-time dismissals list behind Adam Gilchrist with 416 and Ian Healy's 395.

Australia Test great Mark Waugh described Marsh as "an absolute icon" of the sport.

Waugh continued: "Had the pleasure of working with Rod for a number of years as a selector and you wouldn't meet a more honest, down to earth, kind hearted person."

Former Australia one-day international David Hussey paid tribute, saying "Rod will be missed".

Hussey wrote on Twitter: "His saying, "cricket is a simple game made complicated" still resonates with me."

Ex-England bowler Chris Tremlett described Marsh as "a great man who helped guide me and many others on the right path in my younger years and taught me what it takes to play international cricket".

First wicketkeeper to score a Test century

Marsh would go on to form a formidable partnership with fast bowler Dennis Lillee, with the pair combining for a record 95 Test dismissals.

However, he had a difficult start to his Test career and was nicknamed "Iron Gloves" during his first series against England in 1970-71.

He came close to a maiden century during that Ashes series, making an unbeaten 92 in Melbourne before captain Bill Lawry declared with Australia nine down.

Marsh did not feel as though he had missed out on a century, saying that he thought Lawry should have declared much earlier.

He later became the first Australian wicketkeeper to score a Test century when he reached triple figures against England in the 1977 Centenary Test.

On the 1981 tour of England, Marsh became the first keeper to claim 100 dismissals in Ashes Tests.

After retiring Marsh commentated on Australian television before taking on a coaching role at the Australian National Academy.

He later took on a similar role with the England and Wales Cricket Board and was a selector for the men's team from 2001 to 2005.

Marsh served as the Australian chairman of selectors from 2014 to 2016, stepping down after Australia were hammered at home by South Africa.
