OPENING OF THE NEW SESSION OF PARLIAMENT SET FOR TUESDAY, OCTOBER 25, 2022

BASSETERRE, St. Kitts, October 18, 2022 (SKNIS) - The First Sitting (Opening of Parliament) of the St. Kitts and Nevis National Assembly is scheduled for Tuesday, October 25, 2022, at the St. Kitts Marriott Resort Royal Ballroom in Frigate Bay.

The Sitting will be preceded by a Guard of Honour which will take place at 9:30 am in the Grand Plaza.

In accordance with Section 46 (1) of the Constitution of St. Christopher and Nevis, the Governor-General will read the Proclamation summoning the New Session of the National Assembly.

Following the Proclamation, a new Speaker of the House will be elected and subsequently a Deputy Speaker.

Following the administering of the Oath/Affirmation of Allegiance by Members, His Excellency the Governor General Sir S.W. Tapley Seaton will deliver the Throne Speech.



At his first press conference on Monday, October 17, Prime Minister the Honourable Dr. Terrance Drew hinted at the possibility of the new Speaker of the House being a female.

Prime Minister Drew said, "We understand that gender equality is essential for economic prosperity. You can look forward to equal involvement in our government system. As a matter of fact, there is a high possibility that we will have a female Speaker of the House and there is also the prospect of our first female Governor-General. Let's stay tuned for announcements. You can look forward to the new opening of Parliament on Tuesday, 25th October, 2022, and we encourage all to tune in."

The governing St. Kitts and Nevis Labour Party has a majority of six elected representatives in the lawmaking body. The Concerned Citizens Movement (CCM) has three, while both the People's Action Movement (PAM) and the People's Labour Party each have one.

The opening of the new session of the St. Kitts and Nevis National Assembly will be broadcast live on ZIZ Radio, ZIZ TV and via the Facebook and YouTube platforms of the St. Kitts and Nevis Information Service (SKNIS) and ZIZ.

Chairman and Chief Executive Officer Earle Kelly in his remarks said 257 students have benefitted from the programme to date.

“Over the years since 1981, we have invested just around \$6 million... That’s a lot of money by any stretch of the imagination. There are currently two fifty-seven (57) students who are in the programme enjoying the benefits that we offer, and every year we spend approximately

\$100,000 and that’s money we think is well spent but like any other investment we need some returns,â€œhe stated during his remarks.

He then encouraged the students to behave in and out of school and also called on the parents to do their part.

“We are not asking for much. All that we’re asking for is for students the beneficiaries behave themselves in school and out of school. So parents I’m just warning you. This is something I say every year [it bears] repetition... it’s very very important. It’s your responsibility to train your children to manage their affairs

MINISTER MAYNARD REPRESENTS ST. KITTS AND NEVIS AT CWWA 31ST ANNUAL CONFERENCE AND EXHIBITION IN THE BAHAMAS

October, 19, 2022 - Minister of Public Infrastructure and Utilities, Transport, Information and Communications Technology, and Post, Hon. Konris Maynard, and Mr. Cromwell Williams, the Water Manager and Engineer of the St. Kitts Water Services Department are currently representing St. Kitts and Nevis in the Bahamas for the Caribbean Water and Wastewater Association (CWWA) 31st Annual Conference and Exhibition. The Nevis Island Administration (NIA) is represented by Ms. Santonnya Mills, Manager at the Nevis Water Department and Mr. Clyde Maynard, Technical Officer at the Nevis Water Department.

The Hon. Konris Maynard indicated that the attendance for this meeting is a stepping stone “as we deal with the challenges facing us with our water supply and as I prepare to give an update on the way forward to restore the 24-hour supply of Water”.

The honourable minister added, “I will also be participating in the Ministerial High-Level Forum (HLF) which is the only meeting of Caribbean Water Ministers. At this HLF, Ministers have an opportunity to share experiences and ideas for addressing water issues affecting the region and individual countries in pursuit of the UN’s Millennium Development Goals (MDGs). My participation in this conference is funded by the Caribbean Development Bank (CDB).”

At this conference, the St. Kitts and Nevis representatives will be afforded the opportunity to interact with and engage leading industry experts and professionals such as engineers, contractors, policymakers, and regional and international financial institutions, and share experience and ideals in addressing water issues affecting their individual

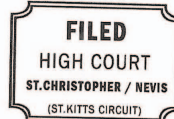
in every respect..."

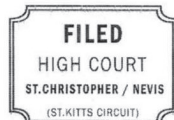

PRIME MINISTER DR. DREW STRESSES THE IMPORTANCE OF REGIONAL INTEGRATION IN HIS MAIDEN OECS AUTHORITY ADDRESS

BASSETERRE, St. Kitts, October 19, 2022, (SKNIS) -

The importance of regional integration was highlighted by Prime Minister of St. Kitts and Nevis, the Honourable Dr. Terrance Drew, today, Wednesday, October 19, in his maiden address to the 72nd Meeting of the OECS (Organization of Eastern Caribbean States) Authority being held in Montserrat. Prime Minister Dr. Drew commended the sub-regional body on the progress it has made over the last 20 years in advancing regional integration among the Member States.

In his well-received presentation to the Authority, Prime Minister Dr. Drew said that it is his belief that all Member States share strong commitments to regional integration, be it on the economic, social or environmental fronts.

“Our regional integration is not only robust but deep in substance and wide in scope touching all the pillars of sustainable development. It is firmly rooted in the revised Treaty of Basseterre, my hometown, the revised Treaty of Chaguaramas and the 2030 Agenda of Sustainable Development at the level of the United Nations,” said the St. Kitts and Nevis Prime Minister.

Prime Minister Dr. Drew reflected on the initial signing of the Treaty of Basseterre on June 18, 1981, that gave birth to the Organisation of Eastern Caribbean States (OECS) with seven Eastern Caribbean states as full members, namely, Antigua and Barbuda, Commonwealth of Dominica, Grenada, Montserrat, St. Kitts and Nevis, Saint Lucia, and St. Vincent and the Grenadines. The British Virgin Islands, Anguilla, Martinique and Guadeloupe are associate members of the OECS.

Forty-one years later, Prime Minister Dr. Drew said the OECS has now “evolved into an Economic Union, thereby deepening the level of integration, incorporating the free movement of all nationals of the Member States who signed the Protocol. This improved iteration of the OECS is embodied in the Revised Treaty of Basseterre.”

Dr. Drew added, “My invitation to us to take a walk down memory lane was not intended to evoke feelings of nostalgia or to pat ourselves on our backs for the strides we have taken along this fearless path of regional integration. I would rather invite us to explore the possibilities of expanding the scope of our movement. I am encouraged by the body of work that has been taken by the OECS Commission and the individual Member States to take the process forward by implementing the provisions of the Revised Treaty of Basseterre.”

The opening ceremony of the 72nd Meeting of the OECS Authority was held under the auspices of the OECS Chairman, the Honourable

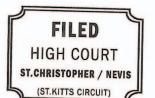

Frontline Workers Honorarium

Basseterre, St. Kitts and Nevis, October 19, 2022: The Cabinet of Ministers has approved the payment of an honorarium of EC\$2,000.00 for each of the frontline workers for the services provided to their fellow citizens and residents during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Frontline Workers are essential workers who have been working throughout the COVID-19 pandemic and who have been called to meet the basic needs of the people of the Federation and all inbound and outbound travelers to and from the Federation along the corridor of containment.

The Government has outlined the institutions whose staff may qualify to benefit from the one-time payment of the honorarium. The qualifying institutions include:

- **Customs and Excise Department, Ministry of Finance:** particularly Customs officers based at the R.L.B. International Airport and all seaports in the Federation and those who worked as part of the Fusion Center.

- **Ministry of National Security:**
 - o St. Kitts and Nevis Immigration Department - all Immigration Officers based at the airports and all seaports in the Federation and those who worked as part of the Fusion Center.

- o **Royal St. Christopher and Nevis Police Force** - Police Officers who maintained law and order during the COVID-19 pandemic response and those who helped to enforce the Statutory Rules and Orders/protocol during 2020-2022.

BASSETERRE, St.Kitts (Wednesday 19th October 2022)- Winston 'Zack' Nisbett, Keeper of Zack's Historical-Cultural Library and Museum (located at Buckley's Estate) is currently making book donations to students at primary schools involved in cultural troupe development so as to encourage the importance of reading for personal and academic growth.

In an exclusive interview with this media house on Tuesday 18th October 2022, Nisbett, a cultural preservationist nicknamed 'De Doctor of Culture' informed that the recipients of the items are those particular students and by extension the classrooms of grades one and two. Joshua Obadiah Williams Primary in Molinueux, Violet Petty Primary in Lodge Village and St. Paul's Primary have been among the recipient schools.

"Since last year I've been doing this. I decided to contribute to the primary schools which I assist in terms of the cultural

development like the David and Goliath and Mummies troupes. Last school term, I gave a huge collection of books to the David and Goliaths in the groups at the Joshua Obadiah Williams Primary.

That troupe was sponsored by Fraites & Sons Bakery. Prior to that, I gave some books to the Violet Petty Primary. Not only just the children but the entire classroom because even though the other students are not participating in the cultural troupes, I make sure to give all of them at least one book. The reason for doing this, it just got in me to demonstrate the giving ability to the children in terms of education because reading, I always indicate to them, is essential and one of the persons I like to emulate is the late Robert Bradshaw-one of national heroes and the first one," he commented.

Nisbett continued: "Sir Robert academically had no

sort of certificates that were required for overseas as one would have termed, and so he would have been versed in reading and through his reading abilities, he was able to accomplish the Ministry of Finance in the West Indies Federation not only that but he became the Premier of St.Kitts and that is a big thing for an ordinary citizen who got two seven-standard certificates; that's all he had but his reading comprehension skills gave him the impetus to advance himself. He was a top orator and his articulation and everything was superb. Reading is what helped; he was versed on any topic."

"My library has a plethora of books and I thought it would be so nice to assist the children in reading because I've been around them even the musical group, the string band. Some of the children you want to help them not just in the dramatic area but you want to help them in the development of their education well-being because I find that some of them have some challenges in reading in most of the schools that I go to. For others [other schools], I will give as well as it comes to bear."

Nisbett shared that he intends on doing ongoing book donations.

"I will contribute all the time to them because my library has a plethora of books from all eras; my personal books, books that were given to me by distinguished personalities when I got into this field and also still books are coming from persons from the ECCB [Eastern Caribbean Central Bank], sometimes and friends who have books and want to donate them and so I in turn contribute them to others mostly to the children who need that type of support in helping them to read because sometime when they have skits to rehearse some of them have difficulties following and so it's only fair if they practice reading and improve themselves, and I always encourage them to take up any bit of paper and read because that is how-as I have indicated- Bradshaw and other were able to elevate themselves."

'De Doctor of Culture' spoke further about his interest in helping the youths and encourage others concerned including teachers to encourage the children in reading.

"My job is to help them and ensure that they understand the basic words and how to execute them. If they take time with children and encourage them, they will come out on top, and that's all it takes just give them the books and encourage them and as time goes on, they will improve themselves. I have a duty, and you see money ain't all; every little counts and when you do good, it comes back to you. I feel good doing that and the more books I get, the more I will be giving out."

According to Nisbett: "Some teachers at other schools are questioning 'Well how come he [Nisbett] ain't bring none by my school' but I will choose the right time to get around to other schools."



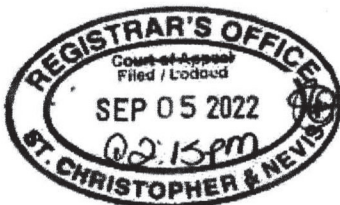

International Domestic Workers Federation Official Applauds Caribbean Conference Hosted In Jamaica

BASSETERRE, St.Kitts (Monday 17th October 2022)- General Secretary of the International Domestic Workers Federation (IDWF) Elizabeth Tang of Japan spoke highly about the experience at the recently concluded regional conference of domestic worker leaders in the Caribbean which was hosted in Jamaica.

Speaking at a closing session held on Tuesday 11th October 20, 2022, at a host venue- the Grand Bahia Principe hotel in St. Ann, she commented: "This is my first trip to the Caribbean and I have learnt so much from you and I want to thank you really because you are so committed that you have said many times over and over again that you will go back [to your respective countries] and organize; create domestic workers organisations [and] create domestic workers sections. I say thank you because when you grow, the IDWF grows because IDFW is what? IDWF is you, it's domestic workers everywhere in the Caribbean and just now you have said these beautiful things that will remain in my heart..."

Notably, a domestic worker is described a person who works in the homes of others for pay. Furthermore, Jamaica is one of the first countries of the region to have ratified the International Labour Organisation (ILO) C189 which covers various areas on decent work for domestic workers.

Tang referred to a remark from a participating domestic worker Nicole Williams of Jamaica who said "I now have a voice" coming out of the experience of the conference.

According to IDWF official Tang "just imagine if each and every one of the domestic workers in the region is saying this 'Now I have a voice' then we are really powerful, then we really have the power. So, the IDWF will be with you so this the beginning of the journey and we will continue to be with you and we will see how we grow and we will provide the necessary support..."

Tang explained that support includes helping to grow voice through other platforms.

Meanwhile, Chairperson of the Caribbean Domestic Workers Network and well as IDWF Executive Member, Shirley Pryce (a former domestic worker) who is also the President of the Jamaican Household Workers Union (JHWU) shared her thoughts on the need for regional movement and coming together while speaking at the opening session held on Friday 7th October at the Spanish Court Hotel in Kingston.

She pointed out that conference was planned since 2019 but plans were thrown off due to the COVID-19 pandemic and other challenges in the following years.

Commenting on the significance for a conference of that nature to be hosted, Pryce stated: "I know that we are fighting for the right reason [and that is] domestic workers' rights and we are fighting for decent work because decent work is everybody's business... it's for me, it's for you, it's for all of us so we're fighting

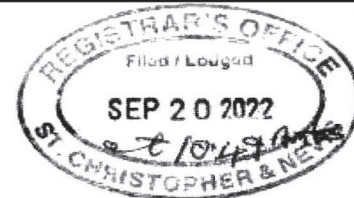





West Indies T20I Series in Pakistan postponed to 2024

Wednesday, 19 October 2022 - ST. JOHN’S, Antigua - Cricket West Indies (CWI) and the Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) have agreed to postpone the three-match T20 International (T20I) series that was due to take place in January 2023 in Pakistan to the first quarter of 2024.

The decision has been made considering 2024 is an ICC Men’s T20 World Cup year, with the event due to be hosted in the West Indies

and USA in June 2024 and the shortest format matches will therefore help both the sides to prepare for the tournament.

The three-match T20I series in Pakistan scheduled for January 2023 was not part of the recently announced 2023-2027 ICC Future Tours Programme. The West Indies played their ICC Men’s Cricket World Cup Super League matches against Pakistan in Multan in May 2022, while the December 2021 series comprised three T20Is in Karachi.

for decent work.”

She added: “We know we have a lot of work but we’ll be collaborating together, working together, fighting together and winning together!”

In her presentation, she called for Caribbean togetherness on championing the cause for domestic workers.

“Today, I just want to say to us as Caribbean, we’re here to organize and reenergize because we have started our Caribbean Domestic Workers Network in 2013... but now we’re here to pick up ourselves and start all over again and we have the support of WEIGO and the IDWF.”

Pryce added: “Now we’re standing and we’re standing tall. We’re going to be showing up together we’re gonna stop whispering and start shouting for our rights so we just want us all to just rise up, stand up and to shake up... and this is what we’re doing now!...”

“Shake up and start a fresh! We can do it right?!” she asked for which she got the crowd response “Yes!”

“We can do it!” Pryce further admonished. Additionally, spoke about information sharing during the course of the conference saying “So we can learn from each other. We want to be strong like Latin America. We want to be strong like Africa!”

General Secretary of the St.Kitts-Nevis Trades and Labour Union, Precious Mills attended the conference.

Other participating countries included Guyana, St.Lucia, Grenada, Antigua and Barbuda, Barbados, Trinidad and Tobago.

Antigua and Barbuda, Grenada and Guyana are among countries that had ratified C189 by September 2022.

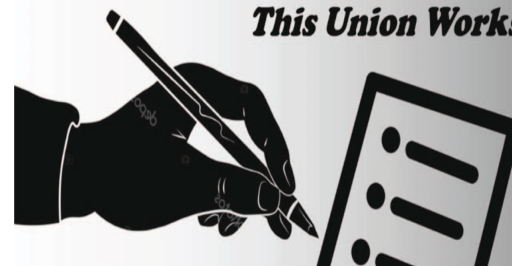

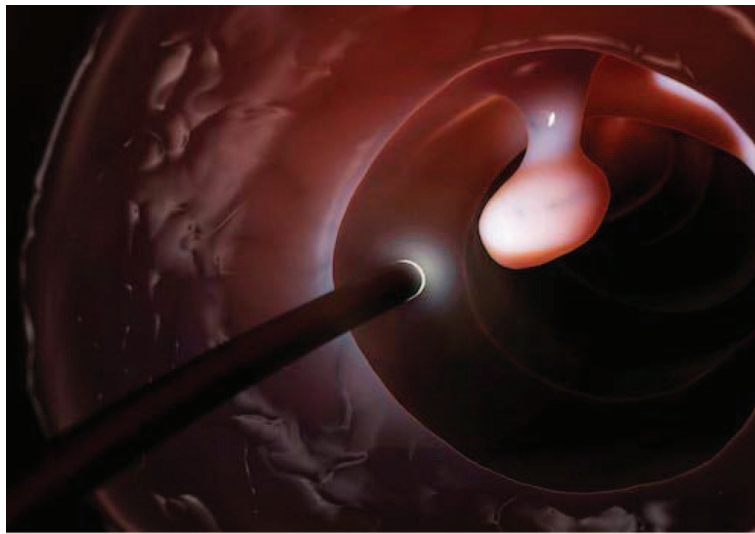

Colonoscopy Is Still The Most Recommended Screening For Colorectal Cancer (Despite Conflicting Headlines And Flawed Interpretations Of A New Study)

A recently published study in a high-profile medical journal appeared to call into question the efficacy of colonoscopy, a proven and widely utilized strategy for the screening and prevention of colorectal cancer.

News headlines were striking: ‘Disappointing results on colonoscopy benefits’; ‘New study suggests benefits of colonoscopies may be overestimated’; ‘In gold-standard trial, invitation to colonoscopy reduced cancer incidence but not death.’

Such news coverage has ignited controversy and created some confusion about the study and its implications, leading people to question whether the results suggest that re-evaluation of the utility and need for a colonoscopy is warranted.

As a cancer research scientist with over 20 years of experience studying colorectal cancer screening and prevention, I am confident that colonoscopy remains one of the most critical and effective tools to screen for, detect and prevent this prevalent and lethal form of cancer.

Colorectal cancer is the fourth-most prevalent and second-leading cause of cancer deaths in The US. The American Cancer Society estimates that there will be 151,000 new cases of colorectal cancer diagnosed in 2022 and nearly 53,000 deaths. Screening has contributed markedly to a decline in colorectal cancer cases and deaths over the past several decades.

Current US Preventive Services Taskforce guidelines

recommend that people with average risk begin screening for colorectal cancer at the age of 45. This recommendation was lowered from age 50 in 2021 due to the recent increase in colorectal cancer disease prevalence among young adults.

Although there are numerous ways to screen for colon cancer, a colonoscopy remains the most comprehensive way to test.

Unpacking the new study

Several investigations have shown that colonoscopy screening is highly effective in the detection and removal of precancerous polyps before they progress to cancer.

That is why media coverage of the new study published in The New England Journal of Medicine prompted confusion and concern among health care experts and the public. Many of these news reports mistakenly interpreted the study as showing that colonoscopies have a small effect on the incidence of colorectal cancer and are ineffective at reducing deaths. Such misinterpretations could have grave consequences with regard to efforts aimed at screening and preventing a form of cancer that affects the health and well-being of so many.

In the study, a team of European researchers performed a randomized clinical trial that examined the risk of colorectal cancer and death in healthy men and women between the ages of 55 and 64. Study participants, who were recruited from population registries in Norway, Sweden, Poland and The Netherlands, were either invited to undergo a colonoscopy or were not invited and received usual care.

After approximately 10 years, the research team gathered information on colorectal cancer incidence and deaths among 28,220 in the invited group and 56,365 in the uninvited group. They found that those in the invited group had a mere 18% decrease in the number of cases of colorectal cancer relative to those in the uninvited group. They also found that there was no significant reduction in deaths in the invited group. This seemingly disappointing result drove many of the more misleading headlines in the media.

But there is a critical caveat in all this that bears explaining. Only 42% of the participants who were invited to receive a colonoscopy did so. This

percentage ranged from 33% among those from Poland, from where most of the participants were recruited, to 60.7% among those from Norway.

When the researchers determined the benefit among those who actually underwent a colonoscopy, they found that the incidence of colorectal cancer decreased by 31% and deaths decreased by 50% - results that are much closer to those expected from other studies.

Another shortcoming of the study is the time between recruitment and screening of the participants. Colorectal cancer is typically slow to develop, taking 10 or more years to progress from precancerous polyps to cancer. Thus, the 10-year window used in the study may be too short to measure the full impact of colonoscopy screening. The authors recognize this and indicate that they will be doing an analysis at 15 years.

These and other issues have been clearly outlined in responses to the study by several medical and advocacy groups comprised of experts with long-standing experience in colorectal cancer and its screening. These include the National Colorectal Cancer Roundtable, the Colorectal Cancer Alliance, The American Cancer Society and The American Society For Gastrointestinal Endoscopy, among others.

All of the responses emphasize that, despite the tone of much of the media coverage, nothing in the study changes the recognized reliability or efficacy of colonoscopy screening. At best, the findings confirm that for many, a simple invitation to screening does not necessarily promote participation in screening.

Colonoscopy remains the ‘gold standard’

During a colonoscopy, a long flexible tube is inserted into the rectum and moved through the colon to allow the direct viewing, identification, imaging and removal of abnormal tissues such as precancerous polyps that could progress into colorectal cancer. As such, for quite some time, colonoscopies have been considered the “gold standard” for colorectal cancer screening and prevention, and still are.

However, there are several features of the procedure that can deter people from choosing it. It is invasive, and there is risk - though small - of complications. In addition, for the procedure to be effective, the colon must be cleared of any stool, requiring a protocol that many find distasteful and uncomfortable. Finally, it can be expensive, creating barriers for those who lack adequate insurance coverage.

Though not as sensitive as a colonoscopy, there are a number of non-invasive alternatives for colorectal cancer screening that are currently available and recommended by The US Preventive Services Task Force for people with normal risk levels. Such alternatives include stool tests such as high-sensitivity guaiac faecal occult blood tests, faecal immunochemical tests and multi-target stool DNA tests.

These methods vary in effectiveness, and each has advantages and disadvantages. The option of choice is based upon patient preference, determined with input from the medical provider. But those at higher risk, such as having a family history of colorectal cancer, certain symptoms such as blood in the stool or a history of polyps are advised to get screened by a colonoscopy.

Importantly, non-invasive screening tests do not on their own prevent the disease. Rather, they raise the possibility that a benign polyp or tumour may exist, and must therefore be followed up with a colonoscopy to confirm the presence of, and remove, any abnormal lesions.

New directions for cancer screening

Most recently, researchers have made significant progress in the development of liquid biopsies, which involve the profiling of informative biomarkers in fluids such as blood. This type of profiling identifies signals for detecting and monitoring numerous cancers, including colorectal cancer.

There is particular enthusiasm in the scientific and medical communities around liquid biopsies that can aid in multi-cancer early detection. This approach offers great potential in the early detection of colorectal cancer as well as numerous other cancers for which there are currently no effective screening methods.

Multi-cancer early detection tests are under development by (cont'd on page 19)

US Eyeing Joint Manufacture Of Weapons With Taiwan

Taiwan could either produce weapons locally or US could make arms with Taiwan-made parts.

TAIPEI (Taiwan News) - The Biden administration is reportedly in talks with Taipei on jointly producing US weapons in order to speed the country's acquisition of armaments amid what Secretary of State Antony Blinken described as a "much faster timeline" for China's plans to seize Taiwan.

During a talk at Stanford University on Monday (17 October), US Secretary of State Antony Blinken said Beijing has made the "fundamental decision that the status quo is no longer acceptable." According to Blinken, China is now pursuing "reunification on a much faster timeline."

Nikkei Asia on Wednesday (19 October), cited a source familiar with the matter as stating that discussions have begun on the co-

production of US weaponry with Taiwan. According to the source, this could either take the form of US contractors supplying Taiwanese firms with

their technology, or American manufacturers making them in The US with components made in Taiwan.

Another source was quoted as saying that the decision process is "going to take some time to really shake out" and will probably run well into 2023. Previously The US had been reluctant to share technology with Taiwan fearing it could be leaked to Chinese spies, but production has taken a new sense of urgency as the US military now believes that China will have the ability to conquer Taiwan by 2027.

When asked to confirm the Nikkei report, US State Department Principal Deputy Spokesperson Vedant Patel said at a press conference on Wednesday that he did not have any specific details to relay on the matter, "But what I would say broadly is that The US is looking at all options on the table to ensure that the rapid transfer of defense capabilities to Taiwan can take place as swiftly as possible." He added that in keeping with the Taiwan Relations Act The US has provided "various services and defense articles for Taiwan's security, and the swift provision of these technologies and these services we believe are essential to Taiwan's security."

A spokesperson from Taiwan's Ministry of National Defense (MND) told the news agency that the country will "make a request to The US to expedite arms deliveries to Taiwan." When asked by Taiwan News to comment on the report, a representative said that the ministry has not yet issued an official statement on the matter.

Under the current system, it can take as long as a decade after an arms sale to Taiwan is approved for The US to fulfill the order. However, given Beijing's accelerated timeline and the increased demand for weapons from Ukraine, the Biden administration is reportedly weighing other options.

Producing the weapons systems in Taiwan could motivate Taipei to allocate more of its budget for defense, given the fact that much of the money would go to local suppliers, David Sacks, a research fellow at The US Council on Foreign Relations told the news agency. In addition, a source stated that The White House is also contacting allies about the possibility of providing armaments and components to Taiwan as well.

Since The US severed diplomatic relations with Taiwan in 1979, Taiwan has gradually built up its own defense industry, with two major defense firms, The National Chung-Shan Institute of Science and Technology, and The Aerospace Industrial Development Corporation, at least half a dozen shipyards, and three major shipbuilders, and 200 small and medium businesses. Taiwan is able to produce fighter jets, trainer aircraft, UAVs, small arms and ammunition, armored vehicles, surface ships, and is even working on developing its own submarine, expected to be completed in 2025.



Explainer: What's Driving Haiti's Humanitarian Crisis?

18 October (Reuters) - Haiti is facing a humanitarian crisis, with shortages of food, fuel and water causing catastrophic hunger, and the government pleading for military assistance from abroad.

What is causing the crisis?

The trigger for the current crisis is the blockade of a key fuel terminal by armed gangs that began in September.

That has led to shortages of gasoline and diesel, and halted most transport, in turn creating shortages of basic goods, including clean water.

Who are the gangs leading the blockade?

The blockade is being led by a coalition of gangs called G9, which controls areas in and around the capital Port-au-Prince. The group's leader, Jimmy 'Barbecue' Cherizier, is a former police officer who has been the target of sanctions by The US Treasury Department for his role in a 2018 massacre.

He and other gang leaders are considered the de facto authority in areas, including Cite Soleil, a poor coastal town that has suffered brutal outbreaks of gang violence this year. It was also where the first cases were reported in an outbreak of cholera in October.

What do the gangs want?

The G9 on 12 September 2022 dug trenches outside the main entrance of the Varreux fuel terminal, to protest an announcement by Prime Minister Ariel Henry that the government was cutting fuel subsidies.

Barbecue, who said higher fuel costs would harm the Haitian people, appeared in October in an online video at the entrance to the terminal demanding that Henry resign.

Why are the gangs so powerful?

Haitian gangs have expanded their control over the country's territory since the 2021 assassination of President Jovenel Moise.

The killing, which involved Colombian mercenaries, created a political power vacuum. Henry has governed on an interim basis since, even though the constitution calls for both a president and prime minister.

Haiti was already in political crisis before the assassination, having failed to hold scheduled elections in 2019.

It no longer has a functioning parliament because the terms of lawmakers have expired, but few believe an election can be held under the current circumstances.

What has been the impact of the blockade?

The fuel shortages have halted most economic activities.

Hospitals have either shut their doors or curtailed their operations because they cannot power diesel generators, which are necessary to maintain stable electricity in Haiti because the power grid is unreliable.

The United Nations says Haiti is witnessing catastrophic hunger, with more than 4 million Haitians facing acute food insecurity.

Civil unrest is on the rise, and anti-government protests have at times devolved into looting. Haitians report increased incidence of gun battles in residential areas that are waged between rival gangs or with police.

The gangs are using sexual violence, including against children and the elderly, in order to instill fear in the local population, The United Nations said.

How has the international community reacted?

UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres has proposed a "rapid action force" to confront the gangs and re-open the terminal, while The United States and Mexico have proposed a security mission that would be led by an unnamed "partner country."

That came after Haiti asked for international military assistance.

Allies including Canada and The United States have promised to provide security assistance to Haiti, but have not offered to send troops. The Bahamas has said it would send troops if asked to do so.

Most countries appear wary of military involvement. A UN stabilisation force that operated in Haiti between 2004 and 2017 faced intense criticism, including over its role in a deadly cholera outbreak.

UK's Liz Truss Quits After Turmoil Obliterated Her Authority

LONDON (AP) - British Prime Minister Liz Truss quit on Thursday - bowing to the inevitable after a tumultuous term in which her policies triggered turmoil in financial markets and a rebellion in her party that obliterated her authority.

Making a hastily scheduled statement outside her 10 Downing Street office, Truss acknowledged that "I cannot deliver the mandate on which I was elected by the Conservative Party."

She is the third Conservative prime minister to resign since 2019, and leaves a divided party seeking a leader who can unify its warring factions. Truss, who said she will remain in office until a replacement is chosen, has been prime minister for just 45 days.

Bitterly divided Conservative Party lawmakers have just a few days to agree on a successor, or face yet another leadership contest. Potential contenders include former Treasury chief Rishi Sunak, who lost to Truss in the last leadership contest, House of Commons leader Penny Mordaunt, Defense Secretary Ben Wallace - and Boris Johnson, the former prime minister ousted in July over a series of ethics scandals.

Truss bowed out just a day after vowing to stay in power,

saying she was "a fighter and not a quitter." But she couldn't hold on any longer after a senior minister quit her government with a barrage of criticism and a vote in the House of Commons descended into chaos and acrimony just days after she was forced to abandon many of her economic policies.

Markets breathed a sigh of relief, and the pound rose about 1% to above \$1.13 after Truss' resignation.

A growing number of lawmakers had called for Truss to resign after weeks of turmoil sparked by her 23 September economic plan, which included a raft of tax cuts that spooked financial markets that investors worried Britain couldn't afford.

That tumult resulted in the replacement of Truss' Treasury chief, multiple policy U-turns and a breakdown of discipline in the governing Conservative Party.

Where the party goes from here is not clear.

"Nobody has a route plan. It's all sort of hand-to-hand fighting on a day-to-day basis," Conservative lawmaker Simon Hoare told the BBC on Thursday before Truss resigned.

She quit after a meeting with Graham Brady, a senior Conservative lawmaker who oversees leadership challenges. Brady was tasked with assessing whether the prime minister still has the support of Tory members of Parliament.

But by that point, the chorus of voices calling for her ouster was growing.

"It's time for the prime minister to go," Conservative lawmaker Miriam Cates said. Another, Steve Double, said of Truss: "She isn't up to the job, sadly." Legislator Ruth Edwards said "it is not responsible for the party to

allow her to remain in power."

Truss' downfall was so rapid that Brady was unable to spell out exactly how the selection of a new leader would unfold, and whether the party's 172,000 members, or only its 357 lawmakers, would get a say.

Brady said he was "deeply conscious of the imperative in the national interest of resolving this clearly and quickly," and the new leader would be in place by 28 October 2022.

Whoever succeeds Truss will be the country's third prime minister this year alone. A national election doesn't have to be held until 2024, but opposition parties demanded one be held now, saying the government lacks democratic legitimacy.

"The Conservative Party has shown it no longer has a mandate to govern," said Labour Party leader Keir Starmer. "We must have a chance at a fresh start. We need a general election - now."

Conservative lawmakers' anger grew after a Wednesday evening vote over fracking for shale gas produced chaotic scenes in Parliament, with party whips accused of using heavy-handed tactics to gain votes.

Chris Bryant, a lawmaker from the opposition Labour Party, said he "saw members being physically manhandled... and being bullied." Conservative officials denied there was manhandling.

Truss' downfall was also hastened by the resignation on Wednesday of Home Secretary Suella Braverman. She lambasted Truss in her resignation letter, saying she had "concerns about the direction of this government."

Newspapers that usually support the Conservatives were vitriolic. An editorial in the

Daily Mail was headlined: "The wheels have come off the Tory clown car."

The dramatic series of events began after Truss and her Treasury chief, Kwasi Kwarteng, unveiled an economic plan with 45 billion pounds (US\$50 billion) in unfunded tax cuts that resulted in a hammering of the value of the pound and increased the cost of UK government borrowing. The Bank of England was forced to intervene to prevent the crisis from spreading to the wider economy and putting pension funds at risk.

Truss fired Kwarteng, and his replacement, Hunt, scrapped almost all of Truss' tax cuts, along with her flagship energy policy and her promise of no public spending cuts. He said the government will need to save billions of pounds and there are "many difficult decisions" to be made before he sets out a medium-term fiscal plan on 31 October.

Speaking to lawmakers for the first time since the U-turn, Truss apologized Wednesday and admitted she had made mistakes during her six weeks in office, but insisted that by changing course she had "taken responsibility and made the right decisions in the interest of the country's economic stability."

Still, Truss said she would not resign - a resolve that was short-lived. Her departure on Thursday sparked jubilation for the tabloid Daily Star, which has set up a livestream featuring a photo of the prime minister beside a head of lettuce to see which would last longer.

"This lettuce outlasted Liz Truss!" it proclaimed Thursday.

many companies and are not yet approved by The Food and Drug Administration. Several are currently available by prescription as laboratory-developed tests.

As with all non-invasive tests, liquid biopsies must be appropriately followed up to verify, remove and/or treat any identified lesions. Extensive research on liquid biopsies is ongoing, and results suggest that a new generation of highly sensitive, readily available and patient-friendly modes of cancer screening will

emerge in the next few years.

Over the past several decades, screening has contributed significantly to a marked reduction in the incidence and mortality of colorectal cancer. Given the aging of the population, as well as the recent rise in colorectal cancer among young adults, detecting the disease sensitively and in its earliest stages is more

important than ever.

THE INVALUABLE CONTRIBUTIONS MADE BY THE ELDERLIES OF THE FEDERATION! PART (1)

“When the month of the elderly comes around in October, there should be radio and television programme highlighting the contribution those elderlies have made to the advancement of the Federation, lest the younger generation feel that their present standard of living was always the way it was. TREMENDOUS Sacrifices were made by preceding generations, so that the younger generation could now enjoy 400 what they are presently enjoying. If the true history be told, greater appreciation would be shown for what they have today and pay tribute to the sacrifices made yesterday?” - Kennedy Earle Clarke:

When the proclamation of the abolition of slavery was announced in 1835, the slave masters who had us working for them for free and reaping humongous profits all those years, demanded compensation for the loss of their slaves, whom they deemed their property. While they haggled for compensation for three years (1835-1838) we were supposed to be freed, but continued working for them with chains on our hands and shackles on our feet. Having been satisfactorily compensated in 1838, the chains and the shackles fell off, but we still had to turn around and work for our former slave masters under the same slave-like conditions and under their terms, for we did not possess any bargaining power!

The only thing free were our hands and feet, but we were still slaves, working under the same slave-like conditions sunrise to sunset. In the 1804 Haitian Revolution, the French slave masters demanded from the Victorious Revolutionaries that they be compensated for the slaves who were working for free all those years, but joined the Revolution to free themselves from the same slavery. The Revolutionaries were threatened with invasion and the other capitalist countries threatened not to trade with them, if they did not compensate the French slave masters? What a crooked world we live in?

They, who worked the slaves for free for some 400 years, reaping huge profits from their toil and misery, were compensated, but now the freed slaves are demanding reparations for their enslavement all those 400 years, it is too great a topic to be discussed? This dehumanizing, exploitative, oppressive capitalist system: In what way, in what form, can this unjust economic system

be used to really and truly liberate the Black Race? Will somebody please to point out to me how this Mission Impossible could be made possible? If a white man steps on my small toe, I am going to push him off, because I am feeling pain and, if a Black brother steps on my small toe, I am not going to grin and bear it?

I am uncomfortably feeling pain and discomfort and I am going to shove him off, because pain is pain and oppression is oppression. The capitalist system reeks of oppression, degradation, exploitation, squalour and, be it white or Black oppression, it is all the same, because that is the nature of the system called capitalism, which could never liberate my people!!

History is a subject which forces us to take a look back into the past, for, if there was no past, there could never be a present and a future. Yet, so many of us are mortally ashamed and afraid to even glance back at where we came from, we are so hell bent on giving the false impression that we are, who we are not and we expect people to take us wholly and solely for the fakes we pretend to be. People have to respect and accept Kennedy Earle Clarke for who he is, because the song, “The Great

Pretender,” was never his favourite. It was the hymn, “Just as I am without one plea,” that has always been his favourite. When others accept and respect you for whom you are, you can act your natural self. You don’t have to be afraid of any unwarranted exposure!

There was a time when there were no flush toilets; people defecated (bowel movement) on the pastures, on the bay sand, in cane fields; some used a potty and then dumped the content in a bucket placed some where in the yard for that purpose. Some would go near that bucket, ease their bowels, scrape up the contents and place it in that bucket. When that bucket was filled, my grandmother would wake me up at 3 or 4am, and I would accompany her to New Town beach, where she dumped the stuff, clean out the bucket with shrubs growing on the beach and then return home. There was a young man who was always drunk called Peter, who charged 3 pence (6 cents) to dump your bucket for you and he would take three buckets, one balancing on his head and one in either hand.

For cooking, we cooked on three stones in the yard, using either wood or dried sugar cane as fuel. The affluent (well offs) used coal pots and charcoal as fuel. A clay pot was cooked in and the more fortunate used an iron pot with three legs to stand on; there was a piece of wire attached to two hooks on the side of the iron pot, which made it easy to place it on the fire, or to take it off. I forgot to mention that we knew nothing about toilet paper; our toilet paper was castor leaf bush, lizard tree bush, barricader bush or the dry husk of the sugar cane. If construction was taking place nearby, we would gather the cement bags, tear away the soiled cement part and used the clean parts as toilet paper.

What did we know about relish with our breakfast at mornings which consisted of bread and bush tea, or the dried cassava bread and bush tea? If you knocked down a ground dove, took out its entrails and roasted it in the fire hole of the coal pot, then you had relish, but you had to share the delicacy with your brothers and sisters. If you were sent to buy the bread in the morning and they just came out of the oven, you could ask the shopkeeper to run the red butter ladle across those bread and you had bread and butter for breakfast. We had to head water from the lone standpipe in the street and we had to arise 4 and 5 am to fill up the buckets, the tubs, the bath pans, the goblet because our mother washed for the white people in the city.

The reason why we had to arise early to start heading water was that water was locked off every day at 9 am and everybody had to fill up their tubs, path pans, goblets and every available utensil that could hold water, for it was not returning until about 5 or 6 pm. To facilitate the bathing of skin, the Government of the day erected public baths and toilets (boreholes) the baths were alright, but for most times the toilets were unusable because the users did not leave them for other users to enjoy. When the public baths were used, there was a male and female section. There was no use of soap; the water ran over our bodies and what did we know about bath towels? By the time we ran home from the bath, our skins were dried?

Jofra Archer to travel with England Lions to UAE as part of injury comeback

Jofra Archer will travel with the England Lions squad for training in the United Arab Emirates next month as he continues to recover from injury.

Bowler Archer, 27, has not played for England since March 2021 because of back and elbow injuries.

Haseeb Hameed, Dan Lawrence and 18-year-old leg-spinner Rehan Ahmed are in the 15-strong Lions squad.

They will tour between 6 and 27 November and support the men's Test squad before their visit to Pakistan.

The senior side will travel to the UAE on 18 November and play a three-day practice match

against the Lions from 23 November before the first Test a week later.

Test players James Anderson, Jamie Overton, Ollie Robinson, Jack Leach and Will Jacks will head out early to train with the Lions.

Archer is one of three fast bowlers, along with Saqib Mahmood and Brydon Carse, who are touring as part of their rehabilitation from injury.

Since his last appearance, Archer - who has 86 international wickets in 13 Tests, 17 one-day internationals and 12 Twenty20s - has had two operations on an elbow issue and suffered a stress fracture of the lower back.

Bowlers Matthew Potts and Matthew Fisher are the other capped players in an inexperienced Lions squad which also features Surrey wicketkeeper Jamie Smith, Sussex opener Tom Haines and Essex seamer Sam Cook.

Hameed last played for England in their Ashes defeat in Australia last winter while

Lawrence has not featured since the tour to the Caribbean in March.

Highly-rated Ahmed has not been capped at international level but starred in England's run to the Under-19 World Cup final earlier this year and last month took his maiden first-class five-wicket haul and hit his first Test century in the same match for Leicestershire against Derbyshire.

Convicted Killer Of Finch Sister Gets Sentenced

BASSETERRE, St.Kitts (Wednesday 19h October 2022)- Orvis Pogson, the young man convicted for the March 2018 double murder of the Finch sisters from the keys community has been slapped with life in prison sentence.

Killed were 19-year-old Naomi 'Hope' Finch and 20-year-old Jimmyliah 'Sunshine' Finch.

A source at the Police Public Relations Department on Wednesday 19th October 2022 revealed that he have been informed that Orvis Pogson got a sentenced to whole life term.

Pogson of Keys Village, who was 34-years-old at the time was charged for the murder of the sisters on Saturday 3rd March.

The autopsy results indicated that one sister was strangled while the other died from chop wounds with part of her head cut

off.

According to police, the post-mortem examinations conducted by Forensic Pathologist, Dr. Valery Alexandrov on Monday 5th March determined that the death of 19-year-old Naomi Finch was due to "homicidal manual strangulation while her sister, 20-year-old Jimmyliah Finch died from multiple homicidal chop wounds with partial decapitation."

As understood, Pogson was the boyfriend of the younger sister (Naomi)

Reportedly, on the day in question, police responded to a report of a stabbing.

Upon arrival, they found the motionless bodies of the two sisters lying close to the seashore with what appeared to be chop wounds.

The older sister who was member of the St. Kitts-Nevis Defence Force had recently given birth to a baby who was a month old.

The District Medical Officer visited the scene and pronounced both dead.

The double killing sent shockwaves throughout the Federation while many expressed sadness and anger over the incident.
