Editorial

A Time For Reflection

On Monday 19 September we should be observing the thirty-ninth anniversary of our independence.

We have deliberately used the word 'observing' and not 'celebrating'. We have done so for a good reason.

While we note the significance of the occasion we feel compelled to wonder at the manner in which we were eventually 'taken there', by a group which had no mandate to do so, none whatsoever. For a fact independence was something which they had always opposed.

The arrangements devised by the 'no mandate' group resulted in a minority faction of the nation being accorded control of the majority, which has only resulted, time and again, in deepening distrust and increasing animus.

It is truly ironic that the minority which has been accorded those advantages is one which has always demonstrated a preference for 'leaving the family'.

The entire exercise is one which has caused the majority enormous pains, shame, and deep anguish.

The resulting constitution is one riddled with anomalies and loopholes which favour the minority faction. Indeed, it is an instrument which favours the perpetuation of strife.

And yet, such is the manner in which it was crafted that, going on forty years, there could not have been any serious attempt to amend it.

It should be remembered that during the era of Associated Statehood we proudly sought to develop a national ethos. Since September 1983 all the talk has been about federal this, and federal that. Certain elements have shown absolutely NO interest in nation building.

It is now going on forty years that we have been wandering in the 'constitutional dessert'.

Dear people of St Kitts and Nevis, we do need to reflect on where we are now.

New Attorney General Talks Marijuana Laws Do's and Don'ts In SKN

BASSETERRE, ST.KITTS (Monday 12th September 2022)-The newly-appointed Attorney General Garth Wilkin has pointed to the current provisions of the law which speak to the Rastafarian community and other adults while advising that it not a 'free de herb' situation as he gave insight about what is still illegal and ticketable offenses at this time while the government reviews legislation.

In revealing details about the last promise made Cabinet, he publicly reported during an appearance on the Freedom FM's 'Issues' programme aired on Thursday 8th September 2022 with host Jamiella McPHail that: "...I have already written to the Commissioner of Police instructing the police force to respect the current cannabis related laws and the constitutional rights declared in the May 2019 decision made in the High Court of Ras Sankofa Maccabee and the Commissioner of police and the Attorney General so that has been done."

He spoke about Cabinet having recently decided to review the laws decriminalising possession and cultivation of certain quantities of marijuana in the federation.

"What the Cabinet decided on which was included in the post Cabinet release [dated 30th August] was that we're going to review the laws decriminalizing possession and cultivation of certain quantities of marijuana in the federation. We're going to initiate the long anticipated marijuana industry to create entrepreneurs, economic activity and to diversify the Federation's tourism product."

Additionally, he spoke about the government's plans to remove criminal records for minor marijuana offences of the past.

"We're going to table legislation to permit the court to expunge the criminal records of persons convicted in the past. Yes, because if you decide to move forward with a marijuana industry, the persons who were punished for minor marijuana offenses in the past must then get their records clear because we're righting wrongs even past wrongs. So you have to look at it in a holistic way; you can't just say we're going to create that industry, meaning we're going to make money and create jobs and economic activity from an industry and then the persons who have minor marijuana offenses in the past still can't get a job because they have a criminal record so it goes hand in hand."

"We're going to review that we're gonna ensure that there's a right sweet spot as to what a minor marijuana offense is because of course you don't want to clear the records of persons who were convicted of serious marijuana offenses because the law was the law at that time but we are saying as a government that this is our policy moving forward and we're going to rectify past wrongs," he said also.

As explained by the AG: "What is happening at the Attorney General chambers at this time is that I have a file of all of the current cannabis related laws and our team at the Attorney General Chambers is going to review the laws and then what we're going to do is to move to Cabinet for a holistic approach moving forward and that's high priority on our legislative agenda, if not first priority, because we promised the people that you're going to deliver it. So when parliament is started, we're going to move to get that sorted, we're going to get the commission that was formed under the cannabis act with marijuana regulation and so forth, we're going to get that formalized."

He highlighted that a committee "existed... a lot of people don't know that but they didn't have the regulations typical of a lot of things that were promised in the past."

One of the most fundamental of the decision is that "Rastafarianism was recognised in St.Kitts and Nevis as a religion and if you are a Rastafarian, you are entitled to the religious rights of the constitution. The second one, the question was put as to how the law was prior to the Ras Sankofa case was that if you

were in possession of cannabis (marijuana) and related parts of the tree and so forth. So possession was illegal and cultivation growing was illegal so the challenge was, was this constitutional..."

Wilkin continued: "So what the court decided was that that blanket against possession and cultivation is unconstitutional because it breaches freedom of conscience and religion for Rastafarians. So the court said that those two laws are unconstitutional if they do not carve out a way for Rastafarians to cultivate and possess (smoke) marijuana for religious use by adults as part of their religion...so if you're a Rastafarian, you have the right to religion and the right to freedom of conscience to smoke marijuana in private or in your religious circle."

According to him: "People think it's 'free de herb' but it's not 'free de herb'. It is in certain circumstances, you can smoke and possess...The same thing applies to adults who

smoke in a private place and also to adults who cultivate in a private place."

The AG, however, also highlighted that: "It is illegal still to smoke marijuana in a public place because all constitutional rights are subject to public rights. Smoking marijuana in public is not just, it also has health implications so what the previous parliament did was they then created an amendment to the Drug Act to bring it into conformity with the decision of the Ras Sankofa case which still bans smoking in public places whether the police is enforcing it or not, it is a little different as to what the law is... for you can be arrested if you smoke in a public place. Separate to smoking, if you are in possession, it is a ticketable offense."

Zack Invites Public To Travel Through Time At His Annual Independence Exhibition

BASSETERRE, St.Kitts (Wednesday 14th September 2022)- “You can’t just come there and leave in five or ten minutes. The least you can spend in there is two to three hours so that you can absorb what we have.”

So said well-known Cultural Preservationist Winston ‘Zack’ Nisbett about his annual Independence Exhibition to be showcased at the Zack’s Historical-Cultural Library and Museum located at Buckley’s Estate in Basseterre from Friday 16th (National Heroes Day) to Friday 30th September 2022 under the theme ‘Independence Awareness.’

Interviewed by this reporter on Tuesday 13th September, he shared: “The focus of the exhibition ‘Independence Awareness’ is for people to get to know where they came from and as to where they’re going; the real depth of where we came independence. Before we had the statehood and all that, we had colonialism and so it shows in stages the whole system as it played out itself over the years and the persons who made it possible for that to happen.”

Nisbett added: “That is basically what it is about from the historical aspect, the cultural aspect and the political aspect but history would reveal how it all began in terms of the legislation and so on; those things we have material based on that and the books that were written from that time up until now most of them.”

The ‘Doctor of Culture’ pointed out that information about influential figures such as Robert Bradshaw, C. A. Paul Southwell, Joseph Nathaniel France (three national heroes), James Mathew Sebastian and F. T Williams would be featured also.

According to him, the exhibition would highlight the significance of statehood.

“There is the entire development through pictures...a lot of pictures indicating what transpired during that time from the initial stage when we were St.Kitts-Nevis and Anguilla and we split ties into St.Kitts-Nevis and we progressed throughout.

“So I’m inviting everybody to come because it is something that you really want to know about; very important and educational.

It gives you the scope that you can depend yourself in any argument because of what you would have observed and you would have learnt from The Zack’s historical Library and Museum, and that is the place where the uprising took place. You have everything in a nutshell there. You can ask

questions. You can’t just come there and leave in five or ten minutes. The least you can spend in there in two to three hours so that you can absorb what we have,” he expressed.

Individuals and groups including schools are being invited to visit the ‘Independence awareness exhibition’ which is slated to regular begin at 9:00 am to 10:00 pm accordingly.

Non-National Killed In Alleged Hit And Run ...Police Looking For Suspect

BASSETERRE, St.Kitts (Wednesday 14th September 2022)-A non-national recently lost his life in an alleged hit and run traffic accident.

Information gathered indicates that the deceased is a male who originally hailed from Guyana, and who was a long time resident of the St. Peter's community. He is believed to be in his 40s or 50s.

The deadly incident took place on Friday 9th September 2022 sometime after 10:00PM along the island main road in the New Road area.

Upon arrival at the scene, this media house gathered from individuals at the scene that the deceased was getting ready to leave a particular hangout spot and that he had crossed the road to urinate when the deadly incident took place. It is unclear whether he was going across the street or returning when he was struck.

Workers from the Liamuiga Funeral Home collected the man's body from the scene. Police personnel were seen performing their duties including taking forensic evidence.

Meanwhile, the Police Public Relations Department on Wednesday 14th September released a wanted poster for a 27-year-old man named Marlin Novas accused "for the offence of causing death by dangerous driving."

His address is given as Fort Thomas Road, Mcknight, and his birthplace the Dominican Republic Additionally, he is described to have a fair complexion with black hair, brown eyes and a medium built.

Police are asking anyone who sees or knows of Novas' whereabouts is asked to contact the Stapleton Police station by dialing 465-2418 or the nearest police station or call the crime hotline at 707.

All information shared will be treated as confidential, police say.

Both Ambassadors will assume their new roles from this month, September 2022.

Prime Minister Dr. Drew and his Cabinet colleagues extend their profound gratitude to both former Excellencies Jasmine Huggins who served as St. Kitts and Nevis Ambassador to the Republic of China (Taiwan) and Ian Liburd, who was Permanent Representative to the United Nations for their contributions and years of service to the country.

Her Excellency Ms. Nerys Chiverton is a career diplomat, who has served over ten years as a senior official and foreign policy advisor in the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the Government of St. Kitts and Nevis. She holds a Bachelor's Degree in Political Science and Law and Society from York University, Toronto, Ontario, and a Master of Arts Degree in Advance International Studies from the Diplomatic Academy of Vienna.

His Excellency Mr. Donya L. Francis is a Communications Specialist and a Trained English Teacher. He holds a Bachelor's Degree from Ming Chuan University International College in Journalism and Mass Communication, and a Master's Degree From Taipei Medical University in Global Health and Development. Ambassador Francis spent a total of six years in Taiwan, where he took the opportunity to learn and immersed himself in the culture and language.

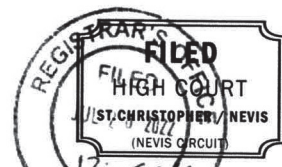

RICHARDS CHARGED FOR CAUSING DEATH BY DANGEROUS DRIVING

Basseterre, St. Kitts, September 14, 2022 (RSCNPF): Thirty-nine-year-old Dion Richards of Lower Monkey Hill has been charged for causing the death of Lynette Nanton (26 years old) of College Street Ghaut.

Following an autopsy on Nanton's body on August 26, 2022, it was concluded that her death was due to multiple organ damages due to severe craniofacial trauma due to the consequence of a motorbike accident.

Nanton was a passenger on a motor scooter that was involved in a traffic accident on August 08, 2022 which occurred along the island Main Road in Brighton, Cayon. It involved motor scooter PB4254 which is owned and was ridden by Jahvan Morton of Monkey Hill and motor scooter PA7176 which is owned and was ridden by Dion Richards also of Monkey Hill. Circumstances are that both vehicles were traveling from Cayon to Ottleys. Richards attempted to overtake PB4254, which was carrying passenger Nanton. At the same time a motor truck was traveling in the opposite direction and PA7176 collided with PB4254. As a result, Morton lost control and he and Nanton fell to the ground.

Morton sustained injuries to his feet and Nanton received injuries to various parts of her body. She was transported to the JNF Hospital where she succumbed to her injuries on August 22, 2022.

On August 17, 2022, Richards was charged for the offence of Dangerous Driving. He was then charged on September 12, 2022 for the offence of Causing Death by Dangerous Driving.

Daytime Eating May Benefit Mental Health

Beating the blues with food? A new study adds evidence that meal timing may affect mental health, including levels of depression - and anxiety-related mood.

Investigators from Brigham and Women's Hospital, a founding

member of the Mass General Brigham health care system, designed a study that simulated night work and then tested the effects of daytime and nighttime eating versus daytime eating only.

The team found that, among participants in the daytime and nighttime eating group, depression-like mood levels increased by 26% and anxiety-like mood levels by 16%. Participants in the daytime-only eating group did not experience this increase, suggesting that meal timing may influence mood vulnerability.

Results are published in the Proceedings Of The National Academy Of Sciences.

"Our findings provide evidence for the timing of food intake as a novel strategy to potentially minimize mood vulnerability in individuals experiencing circadian misalignment, such as people engaged in shift work, experiencing jet lag, or suffering from circadian rhythm disorders," said co-

corresponding author Dr Frank A J L Scheer, PhD, Director of the Medical Chronobiology Program in the Brigham's Division of Sleep and Circadian Disorders. "Future studies in shift workers and clinical populations are required to firmly establish if changes in meal timing can prevent their increased mood vulnerability. Until then, our study brings a new 'player' to the table: the timing of food intake matters for our mood."

Shift workers account for up to 20% of the workforce in industrial societies and are directly responsible for many hospital services, factory work, and other essential services. Shift workers often experience a misalignment between their central circadian clock in the brain and daily behaviors, such as sleep/wake and fasting/eating cycles.

Importantly, they also have a 25 to 40% higher risk of depression and anxiety.

"Shift workers - as well as individuals experiencing circadian disruption, including jet lag - may benefit from our meal timing intervention," said co-corresponding author Dr Sarah L Chellappa, MD, PhD, who completed work on this project while at The Brigham. Chellappa is now in the Department of Nuclear Medicine, University of Cologne, Germany. "Our findings open the door for a novel sleep/circadian behavioral strategy that might also benefit individuals experiencing mental health disorders. Our study adds to a growing body of evidence finding that strategies that optimize sleep and circadian rhythms may help promote mental health."

To conduct the study, Scheer, Chellappa, and colleagues enrolled 19 participants (12 men and 7 women) for a randomized controlled study. Participants underwent a Forced Desynchrony protocol in dim light for four 28-hour "days," such that by the fourth "day" their behavioral cycles were inverted by 12 hours, simulating night work and causing circadian misalignment. Participants were randomly assigned to one of two meal timing groups: the Daytime and Nighttime Meal Control Group, which had meals according to a 28-hour cycle (resulting in eating both during the night and day, which is typical among night workers), and the Daytime-Only Meal Intervention Group, which had meals on a 24-hour cycle (resulting in eating only during the day). The team assessed depression- and anxiety-like mood levels every hour.

The team found that meal timing significantly affected the participants' mood levels. During the simulated night shift (day 4), those in the Daytime and Nighttime Meal Control Group had increased depression-like mood levels and anxiety-like mood levels, compared to baseline (day 1).

In contrast, there were no changes in mood in the Daytime Meal Intervention Group during the simulated night shift. Participants with a greater degree of circadian misalignment experienced more depression- and anxiety-like mood.

"Meal timing is emerging as an important aspect of nutrition that may influence physical health," said Chellappa. "But the causal role of the timing of food intake on mental health remains to be tested. Future studies are required to establish if changes in meal timing can help individuals experiencing depressive and anxiety/anxiety-related disorders."



Taipei Mayor Tears Into Taiwan's Masking Guidelines

TAIPEI (Taiwan News) - Taipei Mayor Ko Wen-je's recently tore into Taiwan's masking rules, saying that only two other countries in the world, China and North Korea, are still forcibly enforcing masking policies like Taiwan's, which prompted Central Epidemic Command Center (CECC) head Victor Wang to defend the policy on Wednesday 14 September.

Ko routinely makes various remarks, Wang said at Wednesday's routine COVID-19 briefing, citing the mayor as saying, "it's ridiculous to wear masks," and "the country had done a poor job preventing the epidemic" when the numbers of daily confirmed COVID-19 cases rose.

Wang added that wearing masks has been the most effective and simplest way of preventing the spread of the epidemic, and

as domestic BA.5 cases are peaking, he hoped that the public would follow the CECC's mask-wearing rule.

The mayor had earlier said that the central government's epidemic prevention guidelines were not clear. He cited the masking guidelines that prohibit people from going around a table to toast at dinner parties but allow them to toast while sitting. Ambiguous rules have

caused people to be at a loss as to what to do, Ko added.

Wang rebutted the mayor's accusation, saying that the CECC's guidelines have been very clear from the beginning, and have not been changed recently. With regard to the toasting guidelines, he said that people take their masks off while eating, but they should wear them while getting up for other purposes. The rationale is to decrease the opportunities for transmission, which has been explained many times, he added.

In the future, when the epidemic wanes, various prevention measures will be adjusted, including masking guidelines, according to the CECC head.

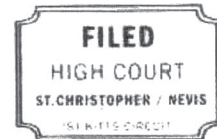

Nevis hoteliers and restaurateurs updated on recycling project as it enters second phase

CHARLESTOWN, NEVIS, September 12, 2021 (MMS-SKN) — The three-year St. Kitts and Nevis Solid Waste Management and Recycling Project, which has been operational since July 29, 2021 is gearing to enter its second phase of operation, the Bin Placement Programme, and has been seeking co-operators among hoteliers and restaurateurs on Nevis.

Project Manager, Ms Joyce Chang, on Friday September 9 held a meeting with some of the intended co-operators in the tourism industry at the St. Paul's Anglican Church Hall in Charlestown where she updated them on the progress of the project, which was officially launched on Friday March 4 this year.

The meeting was also attended by officials from the Nevis Tourism Authority, whose Chief Executive Officer, Mr Devon Liburd, was represented by his Executive Assistant, Ms Kimberley Grant, who called the meeting to order and welcomed the participants.

“We have invested in machines to help St. Kitts and Nevis to set up a recycling facility, one for each island,” said Project Manager Ms Chang of the US\$1m project which is funded by the Taiwan International Cooperation and Development Fund (ICDF). “We have invested in machines which include two compression balers, one breaker, one forklift, and one truck.”

In Nevis the project works with the Nevis Solid Waste Management Authority (NSWMA) and according to Ms Chang, they have already finished the structure noting that her team had visited the facility the previous day (Thursday September 8) to do machine training. Also in attendance at the meeting was NSWMA's Manager, Mr Andrew Hendrickson.

The Project Manager explained that after the recyclables are baled, they would end up being exported overseas for processing, to make sure that the waste will be treated well. Accompanying her was Project Technician Mr Geofhani Gumbs, and they were assisted by Project's Promotional Officer Ms Zaida McCall, and Project Intern Mr Haower Chiang.

Encouraging more people to bring out their recyclables, Ms Chang pointed out that there are four collection locations in Nevis, which are alternated on every second and fourth Fridays of the month. Two of the four locations are alternated every second month.

This year's remaining collection schedule for Nevis is: Friday September 23 at Xpetrol in the St. James Parish; Friday October 14 at Big Six in Gingerland; Friday October 28 at the Old Artisan Village in Charlestown; Friday November 11 at the Delta Petroleum next to Ole House Cafe; Friday November 25, at Xpetrol; Friday December 9 at Big Six; and Friday December 23 at the Old Artisan Village.

“We would like to encourage more people to join with us, and firstly we are thinking we can cooperate with some groups like the hoteliers and restaurateurs,” stated Ms Chang. “In our next phase we will place bins at some locations so as to allow us to collect more bottles and cans. If it works smoothly, it can be done by the end of this year.”

According to the Project Technician, Mr Geofhani Gumbs, the Bin Placement Programme will see bins placed at schools, hotels, restaurants, community centres, churches, and local retail business owners in an effort to establish recycling channels.

The participants were informed by Mr Gumbs that the recyclables currently include plastic bottles, metal cans and aluminium drinking cans. When brought to the collection bins, the items must be clean and in good condition, and must be separated. He requested them to ensure that general waste is not included among the recyclables, and recommended that they assign individuals who will be willing to monitor the bins frequently.

“This is a wonderful collaboration and it is giving the Solid Waste Management Authority in Nevis the opportunity to jump-start the plastic recycling project, which has been long overdue,” observed Manager Mr Andrew Hendrickson. “We count it a privilege to be on board and collaborating because the little spark that is lit, we are hoping to fan the flame and let it go into something big and more significant.”

Ms Kimberly Grant, the Executive Assistant to the Chief Executive Officer of the Nevis Tourism Authority, noted that the initiative can be a very important one as there is a need for sustainability in the country. She noted that the project is very

50 million people worldwide in modern slavery

GENEVA (ILO News) - Fifty million people were living in modern slavery in 2021, according to the latest Global Estimates of Modern Slavery. Of these people, 28 million were in forced labour and 22 million were trapped in forced marriage.

The number of people in modern slavery has risen significantly in the last five years. 10 million more people were in modern slavery in 2021 compared to 2016 global estimates. Women and children remain disproportionately vulnerable.

Modern slavery occurs in almost every country in the world, and cuts across ethnic, cultural and religious lines. More than half (52 per cent) of all forced labour and a quarter of all forced marriages can be found in upper-middle income or high-income countries.

Forced labour

Most cases of forced labour (86 per cent) are found in the private sector. Forced labour in sectors other than commercial sexual exploitation accounts for 63 per cent of all forced labour, while forced commercial sexual exploitation represents 23 per cent of all forced labour. Almost four out of five of those in forced commercial sexual exploitation are women or girls.

State-imposed forced labour accounts for 14 per cent of people in forced labour.

Almost one in eight of all those in forced labour are children (3.3 million). More than half of these are in commercial sexual exploitation.

Forced marriage

An estimated 22 million people were living in forced marriage on any given day in 2021. This indicates an increase of 6.6 million since the 2016 global estimates.

The true incidence of forced marriage, particularly involving children aged 16 and younger, is likely far greater than current estimates can capture; these are based on a narrow definition and do not include all child marriages. Child marriages are considered to be forced because a child cannot legally give consent to marry.

Forced marriage is closely linked to long-established patriarchal attitudes and practices and is highly context specific. The overwhelming majority of forced marriages (more than 85 per cent) was driven by family pressure. Although two-thirds (65 per cent) of forced marriages are found in Asia and the Pacific, when regional population size is considered, the prevalence is highest in the Arab States, with 4.8 people out of every 1,000 in the region in forced marriage.

Migrants particularly vulnerable to forced labour

Migrant workers are more than three times more likely to be in forced labour than non-migrant adult workers. While labour migration has a largely positive effect on individuals, households,

communities and societies, this finding demonstrates how migrants are particularly vulnerable to forced labour and trafficking, whether because of irregular or poorly governed migration, or unfair and unethical recruitment practices.

“It is shocking that the situation of modern slavery is not improving. Nothing can justify the persistence of this fundamental abuse of human rights,” said ILO Director-General, Guy Ryder. “We know what needs to be done, and we know it can be done. Effective national policies and regulation are fundamental. But governments cannot do this alone. International standards provide a sound basis, and an all-hands-on-deck approach is needed. Trade unions, employers’ organizations, civil society and ordinary people all have critical roles to play.”

Antonio Vitorino, IOM Director-General, said: “This report underscores the urgency of ensuring that all migration is safe, orderly, and regular. Reducing the vulnerability of migrants to forced labour and trafficking in persons depends first and foremost on national policy and legal frameworks that respect, protect, and fulfil the human rights and fundamental freedoms of all migrants - and potential migrants - at all stages of the migration process, regardless of their migration status. The whole of society must work together to reverse these shocking trends, including through implementation of the Global Compact on Migration.”

Grace Forrest, Founding Director of Walk Free, said: “Modern slavery is the antithesis of sustainable development. Yet, in 2022, it continues to underpin our global economy. It is a man-made problem, connected to both historical slavery and persisting structural inequality. In a time of compounding crises, genuine political will is the key to ending these human rights abuses.”

Ending modern slavery

The report proposes a number of recommended actions which, taken together and swiftly, would mark significant progress towards ending modern slavery. They include: improving and enforcing laws and labour inspections; ending state-imposed forced labour; stronger measures to combat forced labour and trafficking in business and supply chains; extending social protection, and strengthening legal protections, including raising the legal age of marriage to 18 without exception. Other measures include addressing the increased risk of trafficking and forced labour for migrant workers, promoting fair and ethical recruitment, and greater support for women, girls and vulnerable individuals.

promising as recyclable materials can now be recycled and reused in an efficient sustainable manner.

Director of Purchasing at the Four Seasons Resort, Mr Clint Smith, noted that the recycling project is a great initiative which he hoped would take the country to another level. He

recommended that the project should not stop at plastics and metal cans, but should go into glass and paper, and have the entire organisation and community getting involved.

“Cleanliness is not next to godliness, but it is godliness,” said host Father Cleverton Beckford of the St. Paul’s Anglican Church. “We as people of God we are stewards

right here to take care and to manage God’s affairs as the environment is given to us by God to manage, and to take care. We must protect the environment, not only for our sake but those who come after us will find us faithful.”

Hotelier Mr Anthony Bowen, General Manager of Hamilton Beach Villas and Spa, Nelson’s Spring in Nevis, pointed out that he has worked in every island from Jamaica to Trinidad with the exception of the United States Virgin Islands, and he had found Nevis to be a charming and clean island where one does not see a lot of garbage. But while there is a big sense of pride, people need “to cut down the source of all the garbage first, and try to minimise that before we worry how we will recycle it.”

How Queen Elizabeth II Made The British Monarchy Into A Global Brand

Queen Elizabeth II was not just a monarch, she represented a global brand. And for the past seven decades, this brand has to some extent defined and promoted the British nation around the world.

Brands are important corporate (or in this case national) assets that can burnish a company's profile and meaningfully differentiate it from other businesses. And while royal court officials and family members may not describe it as such, scrutinising the British monarchy through a branding lens can add meaningful perspective to why it has endured and remains meaningful and important to so many people.

The British monarchy consists of various strands of branding: the institution (the crown), the commonwealth realms (including Australia and Canada, among others), the royal family and its individual members. Queen Elizabeth has arguably brought all of these strands into one global package that is like a corporate brand in a number of ways.

First, the symbols of monarchy: the crown, the royal cypher (or the monogram of the reigning royal, which for Queen Elizabeth II was 'EIIR' for Elizabeth II Regina) and royal coat of arms are powerful brand symbols that are akin to trademarks. In fact, the monarchy even lends out its brand prestige to endorse other company brands by granting Royal Warrants of Appointment.

At present, some 800 entities - from fishmongers to well-known products such as Heinz ketchup - have the right to mark their products with the Royal Arms and "By appointment to Her Majesty the Queen" (now His Majesty the King, of course), which implies a product is fit for a monarch. Other organisations are granted the use of the royal prefix such as the Royal Opera House in London. For permission to use "Royal" in a name, organisations must apply to the Cabinet Office in England and Northern Ireland, or the government in Wales and Scotland.

The royal brand is also associated with considerable financial value, with some estimates putting the capital value of the UK monarchy as a business at £67.5 billion.

Of course, the UK has one of the world's last grand monarchies and this, along with its antiquity, attracts

considerable global interest. The geographic reach of the British monarchy is also significant.

The king or queens position as head of state of 15 Commonwealth realms covers 100 million people. They are also head of the Commonwealth, which grew from seven to 54 countries consisting of 2.5 billion people during Queen Elizabeth's reign as many of the countries of the former British empire gained their independence.

Notably, one in three people aged between 15 and 29 years old currently live in Commonwealth countries. With King Charles now becoming the Commonwealth's symbolic head, awareness of the British monarchy should continue among these populations.

Further, over the past seven decades, Queen Elizabeth has arguably been one of the world's most familiar female icons. Her image has adorned coins, banknotes, stamps and portraiture the world over. Importantly, however, it was the Queen's inimitable brand values that also helped to sustain this international interest.

The Queen's brand promise

At its heart, a brand connotes a set of expectations, often called a brand promise. Such a promise needs to be authentic, consistent and valued by consumers and other stakeholders. Traditionally, monarchs have made promises when making accession declarations and taking coronation oaths.

A speech made in South Africa in 1947 by the then Princess Elizabeth emphasised "a life of service", and this became the key tenor of her reign. In one passage she said:

"I declare before you all that my whole life whether it be long or short shall be devoted to your service and the service of our great imperial family to which we all belong."

Queen Elizabeth II clearly understood the marketing concept that "the customer is king". She seemed to realise that, as the head of a constitutional monarchy, it was more appropriate to speak of "a people with a Queen" rather than "a Queen with a people". Moreover, while legal ownership of monarchy resides in the monarchy, its emotional ownership is vested in the people. Tellingly, in her jubilee letter penned earlier this year, the Queen ended with the words "Your Servant, Elizabeth R".

All of this has enabled the British monarchy, which has roots dating back over a thousand years, to become an excellent example of a corporate heritage brand. This is a brand whose core characteristics have endured, spanning generations.

To maintain this kind of brand success, a modern-day constitutional monarch must meet five criteria - the "five Rs" of the royal branding mix I developed as part of my research into monarchies in The UK and Scandinavia.

The monarch needs to be: royal (having a special status, as defined by the state), regal (behaving in a manner befitting a monarch, including the use of royal

ceremonies), relevant (being meaningful to country), respected (having the approval of the people) and responsive (accommodating change).

Maintaining the royal brand

Queen Elizabeth II met all five criteria and this is why she is a perfect example of a constitutional monarch. We are unlikely to see her type again. But some additional principles can guide King Charles III in maintaining the British monarchy's brand.

The royal branding mix dictates he should be mindful of the dangers of inappropriate individual royal behaviour, play a suitable role in public issues - for example, not showing political preferences in an election or taking a strong public position on a divisive issue - and recognise generational change in values.

Charles should also be devoted to the people by celebrating their achievements and commiserating with them in times of adversity, while illuminating the plight of the ill, dispossessed, vulnerable and marginalised.

Finally, the new King should uphold the dignity, traditions and symbolism of the monarchy and ensure they remain meaningful.

With Queen Elizabeth's death, the UK has not only lost a peerless constitutional monarch, but also one of the country's greatest brand assets.

The new King has significant shoes to fill but, in Queen Elizabeth, he also had a skilled guide.

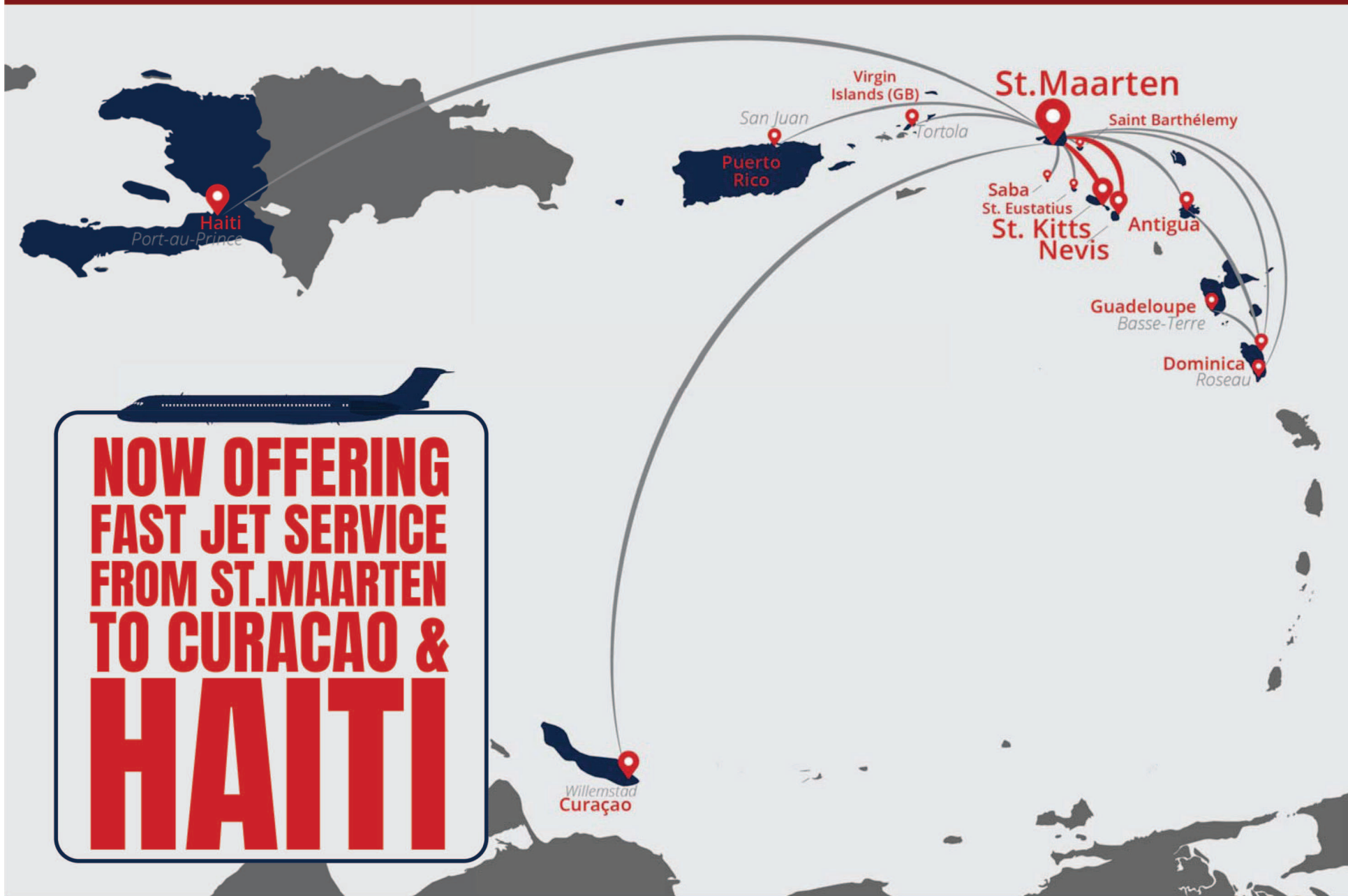

UN Sums Up Climate Science - World Heading In Wrong Direction

The United Nations says weather disasters costing \$200 million a day and irreversible climate catastrophe looming show the world is "heading in the wrong direction."

GENEVA (AP) - With weather disasters costing \$200 million a day, and irreversible climate catastrophe looming, the world is "heading in the wrong direction," The United Nations says in a new report that pulls together the latest science on climate change.

The World Meteorological Organization, in the latest stark warning about global warming, said weather-related disasters have increased fivefold over the last 50 years and are killing 115 per day on average - and the fallout is poised to worsen.

UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres cited the floods in Pakistan, heat waves in Europe, droughts in places such as China, the Horn of Africa, and The United States - and pointed the finger at fossil fuels.

"There is nothing natural about the new scale of these disasters. They are the price of humanity's fossil fuel addiction," he said. "This year's United in Science report shows climate impacts heading into uncharted territories of destruction."

"Yet each year we double-down on this fossil fuel addiction, even as the symptoms get rapidly worse," he added.

The report, drawn from data compiled by several UN agencies and partners, cited a 48% chance that global temperature rise compared to pre-industrial times will reach 1.5 degree Celsius (2.7 Fahrenheit) in the next five years. There's a 93% percent chance that one year in the next five will see record heat.

It comes amid fresh warnings from scientists last week that four climate "tipping points" will likely be triggered if that temperature threshold - set in the 2015 Paris climate accord - is passed.

Many governments are already trying to address the threat of more severe weather due to climate change, and data show that deaths from natural disasters are down in recent years. Yet the economic cost of climate-induced catastrophes is projected to rise sharply.

The UN report says such "losses and damages" can be limited by timely action to prevent further warming and adapt to the temperature increases that are now inevitable. Questions around compensation for the damage that poor nations suffer as a result

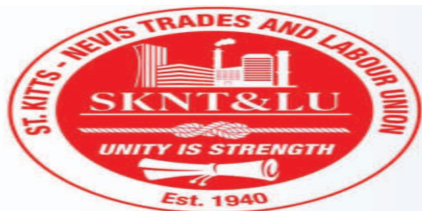

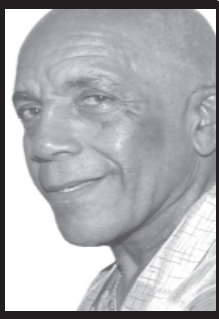

THIRTY-NINE (39) YEARS OF INDEPENDENCE. HAS IT UNITED OR DIVIDED US?

“When a colonial island enters into Independence dis-united as we were in 1983 by men who never in their lifetime believed in it, chaos and botching of the historical event and the drafting of the Constitution, must occur, for there will always be give and take, not in the best interest of the citizens and the island, but what is best for the unbelieving Leaders, taking us into Independence!”

-Kennedy Earle Clarke:

Dear reader, we are celebrating 39 years of Independence which has not bonded us and united us as one people and perhaps this is due to the fact that the traitors to the Independence took us there. Dr. Simeon Daniel, leader of the Nevis Reformation Party, did not believe in Independence. His sole belief was in Secession. Let us take a peek into the cause of SECESSION and who introduced it? St. Kitts and Nevis were both colonies of Great Britain and both began the cultivation of sugar, but St. Kitts possessed the better soil, due to its prehistoric (before the history was written) volcanic eruptions, which produced Black volcanic soil, ideal for the cultivation of sugar cane, while Nevis possessed the clay soil.

Because of the fertility of the soil, every available inch of land, was placed under sugar cane cultivation. Just look at the landscape of St. Kitts and see where the Towns and Villages are situated? Almost in the sea and in areas where it was unprofitable to cultivate sugar cane. There were many Villages which were situated in the ghaut-side and, when the workers became ill and the ambulance was called, the ambulance stayed on the high land and its attendees had to walk with stretchers around the rocks in the ghaut to bring out the patients who lived in trash houses? It was only after the 1935 Buckley's Estate Uprising, the Lord Moyne Commission in 1938, which recommended the formation of Trade Unions and Political Parties which came into existence in 1940. The Trade Unions then fought for Adult Suffrage in 1952 and the alleviation of the deplorable conditions under which the working-class of the land existed?

Let us get back to the topic of Independence. While Dr. Simeon Daniel of the N.R.P in Nevis, wrote one paragraph in its 1975 General Elections Manifesto, “SECESSION AT ALL COST,” The People's Action Movement (PAM) fiercely and thunderously condemned it when Comrade Robert Bradshaw campaigned in the 1975 General Elections that a “YES VOTE,” for The LABOUR

PARTY, was a “YES VOTE” for INDEPENDENCE. The LABOUR PARTY won that General Election overwhelmingly, with all seats. Dr. Kennedy Alphonse Simmonds condemned Independence, claiming that INDEPENDENCE meant that if you possess TWO of anything, the Government will take away ONE. No belief whatsoever in Independence at that time.

In 1977, serious negotiations began taking place about Independence, but this was hampered by the SECESSIONIST MOVEMENT in Nevis and the Anguilla withdrawal from St. Kitts-Nevis by factions there and the Peoples Action Movement, led by Dr. William Billy Herbert. While it was obnoxiously undesirable for St. Kitts-Nevis-Anguilla to gravitate towards Independence under Bradshaw the leader of the LABOUR PARTY which was supported by the masses of the working-class in the land, it was totally alright for St. Kitts-Nevis (Anguilla had withdrew from the three-island colony set up by Great Britain in 1882) to enter into Independence under PAM which was supported by the big businesses in Basseterre and the sugar estate owners who financed the 1967 attempted overthrow of the Bradshaw led Government?

Robert Llewellyn Bradshaw took ill and, after an unsuccessful operation in St. Kitts, he journeyed to London and returned home bedridden. On May 25th, 1978, he succumbed to his illness and was granted a State Funeral, where dignitaries attended, hailing his contribution and dedication to the Working-Class people of the Caribbean. While the PAM factions were rejoicing at his demise, (death) the Caribbean was mourning the loss of a champion of the Working-Class. After Mr. Bradshaw's death, Paul Southwell, who was always chosen as his Deputy at Party Conferences was expected to fill the vacant post, but Lee L. Moore a young ambitious Kittitian Lawyer, believed that, as a born Kittitian, he should assume the Leadership role.

This overambition of Lee L. Moore created division in the ranks of the organization. What even worsened the situation, was the Candidate chosen to replace Comrade Bradshaw, who although a big LABOUR supporter, was not popular with the Electorate, who had instead, chosen Comrade Willie Dore? The voice of the little people, is the voice of God and, in a Working-Class Organization, should be listened to attentively. Dr. Kennedy Simmonds who normally run in East Basseterre # 1 Constituency for PAM, was chosen to run in Central Basseterre, Comrade Bradshaw's Constituency and lost to Comrade Anthony Ribeiro by 7 votes. He appealed the decision and Judge Hewlett from Antigua claimed that the seven votes Dr. Simmonds lost by, he won Comrade Anthony Ribeiro by them.

There were a lot of shenanigans which occurred during that trial. A certain big PAM female, could be seen visiting the Judge at all hours of the night. The Electoral Laws clearly states that the “X” of the voter must be placed inside the squared box, provided on the Ballot Sheet, yet the same Judge Hewlett awarded those VOTES which were placed outside the box and next to Dr. Simmonds' name, to Dr. Simmonds, thus bringing a new interpretation to the Electoral Laws, which were not challenged in the Courts by the Labour Leaders. It was not until the Elections of 2020 and Lawyer Anthony Johnson counted the votes for Dr. Jeffry Hanley that those votes placed outside the squared box, were challenged, thus causing Dr. Hanley to win the #1 East Basseterre Constituency Seat?

Having been declared the winner in the 1980 Bye Election by Judge Hewlett, Premier Lee L. Moore who assumed the Leadership role of the LABOUR PARTY and GOVERNMENT. in 1979 after the demise of Comrade Southwell at a Conference in St. Lucia, refused to allow Dr. Simmonds to attend Parliament when he failed to hold Parliamentary Sessions, thus causing resentment to build up against him by Kittitians. When the 1980 General Elections were held, LABOUR won 4 Seats and PAM won 3. PAM joined up with the Nevis Reformation Party (NRP) 2 Seats and formed the Government.

For those of us who had to wait seven years to have any chance for anything to happen for us, now that the government is a friendly government, I can understand why some of us want what we want NOW. Even though we know that NOW might be impossible and unreasonable, we don't want to wait because we are afraid that we might wait and lose out.

Considering all the knockabout we got from Team Unity for seven long years, it is not difficult to understand why some supporters of the St. Kitts-Nevis Labour Party might get nervous when they are not hearing anything from anybody who by now should have said something to them. Or when they do hear, they are told to wait.

In all reasonableness, it's only been one month since we won the elections. One month. Sometimes I go into certain government offices and I wonder if I'm at the public market. Those in charge of departments need to assist their staff in appropriate dress, appropriate language, appropriate conversations and appropriate noise levels in the workplace. And it doesn't matter to me the politics of the person rendering that service because all I want is competent and efficient customer service.

The ministers have a lot on their plates and their hands are full. But that's why we voted for them so overwhelmingly because we know they are able. We have every confidence in them that they will do well. We know they will not disappoint us.

One thing we are sure of is that the greed and racketeering that were the trademarks of the Unity government won't be a part of this SKNLP government. Our ministers understand only too well that the voter will not tolerate bad governance for too long. I can bet my last dollar that no one expected Team Unity to last two years after they had given Labour such a licking in 2020.

We must let PM Drew and his cabinet do their work. Reassign, reposition, retire and do whatever else they need to do to ensure that this SKNLP ship sails well. And we must continue to keep all of them in our prayers as we did when we wanted them to win.

West Indies name squad for ICC Men's T20 World Cup

ST JOHN'S, Antigua 'Cricket West Indies' (CWI) Selection Panel today announced the West Indies squad for the upcoming International Cricket Council's (ICC) Men's T20 World Cup. The panel confirmed the fifteen (15) players who represent the West Indies for the eighth ICC T20 World Cup, which will be played in Australia from October 16 to November 13.

The West Indies are the only team to have won the ICC Men's T20 World Cup twice, in Sri Lanka in 2012 and in India in 2016. The West Indies campaign to win an unprecedented third ICC Men's T20 World Cup title starts on October 17, when they take on Scotland in first of three Group B fixtures played at the Bellerive Oval, in Hobart, Tasmania to qualify for the Super 12 phase of the tournament. Nicholas Pooran leads the West Indies in his first World Cup as captain, with Rovman Powell as vice-captain.

Left-hand opening batter Evin Lewis has been recalled for the first time since the 2021 ICC T20 World Cup. Two uncapped players have been selected; right-arm leg-spinner allrounder Yannic Cariah and left-arm batting allrounder Raymon Reifer.

The Most Honourable Dr. Desmond Haynes, CWI's Lead Selector said: "We have selected a mixture of youth and experience to represent the West Indies. In the selection process, we have been cognizant of the ongoing CPL and we have been looking at the players who have been playing very well. I said at the beginning of my tenure that I would be interested in giving players the opportunity and I think I have been consistent in doing that. I believe it is a very good team we have selected, and it is a team that will compete, given that we have to qualify from Round 1 into the Super12s."

Dr. Haynes added: "There are players who did not make the team and I hope they will continue to work hard and perform to their best in the CPL and the upcoming CG United Super50 Cup; because you never know what can happen in case of injuries or any other unforeseen situations where we might need to call up players as replacements."

West Indies will face Zimbabwe on October 19 and then Ireland on October 21 with the top two teams from Group B joining the Super 12s, along with the top two teams from Group A which features Sri Lanka, the United Arab Emirates, the Netherlands and Namibia. The top two teams from each Super12 group will advance to the semi-finals on November 9 and 10.

Before the start of the ICC Men's T20 World Cup, the West Indies will meet home team Australia in a two-match bilateral T20 International (T20I) series on October 5 at the Metricon Stadium on the Gold Coast and on October 7 at the historical Gabba, in Brisbane.

James Anderson and Stuart Broad will be selected for England's 2023 Ashes squad against Australia, says head coach Brendon McCullum.

England's all-time leading Test wicket-takers were controversially dropped for the tour of West Indies in March.

But Anderson, 40, and Broad, 36, impressed on their international return as England won six of their seven Tests this summer.

"Yeah, they'll be here," said McCullum. "Those guys are phenomenal cricketers.

"They are quite incredible humans. They could finish any time they wanted and they'd still be considered greats of the game.

"What they're doing is continuing to build on the legacy they're going to leave for the next generation.

He added: "The time they're giving other people in the dressing-room is phenomenal.

"The time, the effort and the confidence they're giving the other guys is quite remarkable."

Anderson claimed 27 Test wickets at an average of 17.66 for England this summer, while fellow seamer Broad took 29 wickets at 27.17.

Between them the prolific pair have taken 1,233 Test wickets during their distinguished international careers. Anderson leads the way with 667 and Broad with 566.

Anderson is also England's most-capped Test cricketer with 175 appearances for his country.

Meanwhile, England have added former Australia batter Michael Hussey and ex-bowling coach David Saker to their backroom staff for the Twenty20 World Cup.
