BASSETERRE, St. Kitts (Friday 28th June 2024) - The 26th edition of the annual St. Kitts Music Festival began last night (Thursday 27th June 2024) with a bang at Warner Park Stadium in Basseterre, drawing scores of music lovers to the venue in setting the stage for a weekend of music and celebration.

Dubbed locally as the ‘Jump Up Night’, the opening night featured a high-energy mix of soca and dancehall, creating a festive atmosphere with fans waving rags and flags. The diverse blend of genres showcased the talents of homegrown, regional, and international performers, captivating the audience from start to finish.

Medical Doctor Encourages Safe Partying

BASSETERRE, St.Kitts (Wednesday 26th June 2024)- Medical doctor Dr. Natalie Osborne is urging festival-goers to prioritize safety, particularly when it comes to alcohol consumption and driving.

During an episode of ‘SKN Today’ aired live on Tuesday 25th June 2024 on Freedom FM, Dr. Osborne shared important advice on how to enjoy the festival responsibly.

Dr. Osborne emphasized the importance of having a designated driver if drinking: “If you have somebody who’s going to be the designated driver, somebody who’s going to collect you after these shows, so we do not have these [accidents]. And I’m actually on call this week; I have to protect myself.”

Host Sharon Rattan, a well-known educator, highlighted the severe consequences of drunk driving, noting that such accidents can be fatal and lead to significant physical impairments, such as paralysis and severe head trauma.

“We want to make sure that we avoid that,” Rattan said. “Ultimately, all of our discussions here are going to be to encourage and inform our public so that we make better decisions.”

In light of the festive occasion, Rattan stressed the need for responsible drinking, especially during this high-energy week.

Dr. Osborne provided further guidance on alcohol consumption: “Some persons recommend, standard, initially that you have one glass for a female and two glasses per man, per day. .. that was a past guidance suggests that it may not be having any adverse effects and actually have some benefits. But we know now that no amount of alcohol is essentially safe... So any kind of alcohol, even moderate drinking, can have some effects on the brain.”

She elaborated on the short-term effects of alcohol: “Initially

when you have your first glass of wine or your cocktail, whatever that may be, you may feel a bit relaxed and drowsy and a sense of euphoria and giddiness. Your mood changes, your inhibition is lowered. You would get up on the dance floor and you never would do that. And so you’re stuck. You start dancing and being more provocative because your inhibition has been affected.”

Dr. Osborne also warned about the potential physical effects as drinking continues, such as slurred speech, nausea, vomiting, diarrhea, headaches, and loss of coordination. “You start stumbling. And then you start dancing. You say, ‘Oh, I’m okay.’ But you’re not really. And so you will have trouble focusing, making decisions of course, and this puts people in very difficult positions.”

Ministry of Tourism to Conduct an Economic Impact Assessment of The Annual St. Kitts Music Festival To Ensure Its Sustainability

BASSETERRE, St. Kitts, June 27, 2024 (SKNIS) - Following the staging of the 26th edition this year, the Ministry of Tourism intends to undertake a comprehensive Economic Impact Assessment of the annual St. Kitts Music Festival to determine whether necessary changes are needed to ensure its sustainability. This will include an in-depth look at the current three-night model.



Minister with responsibility for the music festival, the Honourable Marsha Henderson, said such an assessment is critically needed if the product is to remain competitive and attractive to patrons, given the different other festivities in neighbouring islands.

“The festivals in the region have different models and so for us to be able to compete we have to look to see whether this model is in fact sustainable. If you look at the amounts we spend on the music festival it’s almost like \$10 million and so we need to see if this is sustainable when we consider the Economic Impact Assessment and how we can continue to change the model to make sure that the festival is sustainable as well,” Minister Henderson said during her appearance on the June 26, 2024, edition of the radio and television programme, InFocus.

It is anticipated that this crucial assessment will be completed by October 2024, in line with the commencement of the Government’s annual Budgetary process.

Minister Henderson added, “The Economic Impact Assessment, all of the other meetings that we are going to do, we intend to do some retreat and observations of other festivals and see how we can tweak ours to make sure that this festival is sustainable.”

The assessment will be led by Crest Analytics, working alongside the relevant stakeholders here in St. Kitts and Nevis. The minister also assured that public feedback will play an important role in their decision-making as well.

Irrespective of the outcome of the planned assessment, Minister Henderson commented that the St. Kitts Music Festival remains an important investment for the Federation, and one that has always accomplished what it was established to do-market the destination to the world.

“Last year for example, we received so much publicity out of the music festival, not just from the artistes but also from the media houses, people got to know about St. Kitts from all the good reviews,” the minister said, noting that the patrons who visit for the music festival are treated to the full cultural experience that the destination is renowned for.

TEMPORARY CONCESSIONS ON SCHOOL SUPPLIES



Exemption from Import Duty, Value Added Tax (VAT), and Customs Service Charge (CSC) will be granted from July 1, 2024 to September 30, 2024.

Temporary Tax Relief On School Supplies

Basseterre, Saint Kitts and Nevis, June 25, 2024 [Press Secretary, PMO] - The Federal Cabinet of Ministers has approved a temporary tax relief on school supplies from July 1, 2024, to September 30, 2024. During this period, no taxes will be charged on eligible school supplies.

Honourable Prime Minister Dr. Terrance Drew stated, "This

initiative aims to support families and students by making essential school supplies more affordable. We are committed to investing in our children's education and easing the financial burden on parents."

From July 1, 2024, to September 30, 2024, exemptions from Import Duty, Value Added Tax (VAT), and Customs Service Charge (CSC) will be applied to a wide range of school supplies. This includes items such as the cloth for school uniforms, textbooks, and calculators.

This tax relief is available to all commercial and non-commercial importers, ensuring that everyone can benefit from this initiative.

LIAT (1974) LIMITED AIRCRAFT SALE

Earlier this year, LIAT (1974) Limited ceased operating after entering administration in 2020. The company's shareholders - the governments of Antigua and Barbuda, Barbados, Dominica, and St. Vincent and the Grenadines - agreed to the sale of LIAT's three aircraft to the Government of Antigua and Barbuda.

An Aircraft Sale Agreement, for the sale of the three aircraft over which the Caribbean Development Bank (CDB) holds mortgages, has been executed between the Administrator for LIAT (1974) (as the seller) and the Government of Antigua and Barbuda (as the buyer).

CDB is not a party to the sale agreement. CDB's only role is to provide the necessary consent for the sale, which it has done.

Under the sale arrangement agreed to by the shareholder Governments, the Governments' approved that money from the sale should be proportionately allocated towards paying outstanding balances on the CDB loans that were initially made to the shareholder Governments to support LIAT (1974) Limited's operations. The decision about the use of the sale proceeds rests with the shareholder Governments.

CDB is not involved in the financing or any aspect of the operations of LIAT 2020.

The Bank continues to take a strong interest in the development of regional transportation and remains a strong advocate for the development of the Caribbean's transportation networks and infrastructure.

Census shows a 7.4 percent increase in the population on Nevis

NIA CHARLESTOWN NEVIS (June 26, 2024)- Director of the Department of Statistics and Economic Planning on Nevis Mrs. Dorriel Tross-Phillip has revealed that according to the 2021-2022 Population and Housing Census, the population of Nevis has increased by 7.4 percent over the past 10 years.

"Nevis population count for the 2021-2022 Population and Housing Census is 13,182 persons. This represents 26 percent of the total population of the Federation, which is 51,320.

"Nevis registered a 7.4 percent increase in population, moving from 12,277 in 2011 to 13,182 in 2021. This represents an increase of 905 people. The overall population consists of 6,762 females and 6,420 males."

According to Mrs. Tross-Phillip, the census informs of changes in the size and characteristics of the population and of the housing stock.

"The population is divided among the five parishes on Nevis- St. Paul with 1,888, which represents 14.3 percent of total population; St. John's with 4,416, which represents 33.5 percent of total population; St. George's with 2,323, which represents 17.6 percent of total population; St. James' with 2,290, which represents 17.4 percent of total population; and St. Thomas with 2,265, which represents 17.2 percent of total population."

Meantime, the household count on Nevis also increased from 4,627 in 2011 to 5,534 in 2021- an increase of 19.6 percent.

The largest increase in the number of households on Nevis was recorded in the parish of St. James with a 28 percent increase, moving from 881 households in 2011 to 1,125 households in 2022. St. John was a close second with an increase from 1,369 households in 2011 to 1,724 households in 2021-2022, which represents an increase of 26 percent. St. Thomas registered a significant 18 percent increase in the number of households with 983 households in 2021-2022, compared to 834 in 2011.

The census was scheduled to be completed in 2011 but due to the Covid-19 pandemic the time for collecting and compiling the information was extended.

The Population and Housing Census also informs of social and economic policies in gender, youth, the elderly, persons with disabilities, and other special population groups in assessing the quality of housing and housing stock. 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Driver Charged with Murder Three Days After Fatal Traffic Incident

BASSETTERRE, St. Kitts (Monday 24th June 2024)- Akeem Whyte, a 31-year-old resident of Taylor's Housing has been formally charged with murder three days after a traffic incident that resulted in the death of 31-year-old James Morton from Lower Monkey Hill, St. Peter's.

The tragic incident occurred on June 18, 2024, on George Street in Newtown, St. Kitts.

Preliminary investigations reveal that Morton was struck by a vehicle while he was on George Street. Following the incident, Morton was rushed to the Joseph N. France General Hospital by Emergency Medical Services (EMS) with severe head injuries.

He was warded in the Intensive Care Unit (ICU) in critical condition but succumbed to his injuries on June 19, 2024.

The Royal St. Christopher and Nevis Police Force (RSCNPF) issued a press release on Thursday, June 20, stating that it was actively investigating the tragic traffic incident that led to Morton's untimely passing.

Authorities apprehended Akeem Whyte at the scene of the accident on June 18, 2024. Following an initial investigation, Whyte was charged with murder on June 21, 2024, at the Basseterre Police Station.

Taipei, Taiwan, June 22, 2024 (SKNIS): Following his arrival in Taiwan on Saturday, June 22, 2024, Prime Minister the Honourable Dr. Terrance Drew and members of his delegation journeyed to the Embassy of St. Kitts and Nevis to meet with nationals living and studying on the island. The event provided an

opportunity for meaningful discussions and engagement between the delegation and the nationals.

The delegation includes Mrs. Diani Prince-Drew; Premier of Nevis, the Honourable Mark Brantley; Senior Minister and Minister of Foreign Affairs, Rt. Honourable Dr. Denzil Douglas; Cabinet Secretary Dr. Marcus Natta; Permanent Secretary in the Prime Minister's Office, Naeemah Hazelle; Dr. Frank Laws, Special Envoy for Healthcare; and Director of the St. Kitts and Nevis Information Service (SKNIS), Sherema Matthew.

The Caribbean countries which offer Citizenship By Investment Programmes are moving with alacrity to implement the Memorandum of Agreement (MOA). - The signatories of the MOA are: Antigua and Barbuda, Commonwealth of Dominica, Grenada, St. Kitts and Nevis and Saint Lucia.

The MOA which was published in March 2024 aims to ensure mutual cooperation, information sharing and adherence to common standards of best practice, and regulatory oversight.

With effect from July 01, 2024, all countries have agreed that

the minimum price for any CBI options shall be US\$200,000. - This means the minimum sum that will be paid into any government fund, government project or private development project of, or in participating countries shall be US\$200,000.

The signatories to the MOA make it abundantly clear that discounting of the agreed minimum price is illegal.

Market actors, Marketing

Agents, Local Agents and or Developers who have evidence of any attempt at, or instances of discounting should report same promptly to the CBI Unit, Investment Migration Agency or Financial Intelligence Units of the participating countries.

In respect of a regional regulatory body, participating Governments will soon appoint an Interim Regulatory Commission pending the enactment of enabling legislation for the regional regulator. The 7-member Interim Regulatory Commission will be drawn from each of the participating countries (5), the OECS Commission and the Eastern Caribbean Central Bank. The functions of the regional regulator will include to:

- * Develop, issue and enforce regional standards for CBI Programmes.
- * Monitor compliance of legislation, regulations and standards.
- * Monitor compliance with international agreements.
- * Investigate complaints.
- * Facilitate information sharing and engagements with regional and international stakeholders.

Work streams have been developed and assigned for all articles of the MOA. - The CBI countries will provide periodic updates on the implementation of the MOA.

Workforce Equity & Recognition of Unpaid Care Work Necessary for Optimising Caribbean Labour Force

BRIDGETOWN, Barbados: A reassessment of the valuation of unpaid care and greater inclusion of and engagement with underrepresented groups including women, youth, the disabled, and indigenous persons, are urgent imperatives for optimising the Caribbean's labour force which could be imperilled by the Region's rapid pace of population ageing.

The dilemma was highlighted during "Employment Equity: Promoting Inclusion in Caribbean Labour Markets," a recent forum organised by the Caribbean Development Bank (CDB). The event turned the spotlight on longstanding inequalities affecting vulnerable groups in the Region's labour market while broadening the discourse on policies to promote more equitable participation. Discussions encompassed a wide range of issues, including education and training, gender equality, digitalisation, and good governance.

CDB Statistician, Mr. Dindial Ramrattan, joint coordinator of a Labour Market Differentials study commissioned by the Bank, presented critical findings on disparities in the job market based on gender, age, disability, and indigeneity. "There are more men than women participating in the regional labour force, but we must recontextualise how we measure labour force participation - unpaid care work to support families is vital and should be included in economic evaluations," he stated.

Mr. Ramrattan also cited the Caribbean's demographic challenges, noting that while the Region is home to some of the fastest-aging societies in the developing world, it is also affected by high youth unemployment. "As our working populations narrow, we must address how we achieve suitable labour market

adjustments. We need to focus on training and engaging disconnected communities, including Indigenous groups and persons with disabilities, to optimise our existing labour force," he advised.

Dr. Halima DeShong, Head of the Institute for Gender and Development Studies at The University of the West Indies (UWI), also spoke of the significance of unpaid care work and the structural

assumptions that underpin Caribbean economies. "As we think about equity, justice and equality in employment, we have to link it to larger structural and historical conditions," she said. "If we treat the labour market only as the public paid labour market, then we're missing the unpaid care labour that underwrites economies. We have to find a reasonable way of being intentional in our creation of policies and actions."

The Senior UWI Lecturer also highlighted the importance of considering intersectional inequities. "We need to make sure that when we're talking about women, that includes talking about women with disabilities; when we are talking about youth, we are talking about rural youth; when we're talking about Indigenous People, we are talking about differently located Indigenous people."

The necessity of levelling the playing field for access to opportunities was also stressed by Mr. Oscar Calvo-Gonzalez, Regional Director for Economics, Finance, and Investment for the LAC Region at the World Bank. "This requires that first, we need to work on the human capital. We need to build on the skills of everyone, and we also need to work on what we call agency, or voice, which is the ability to actually make use of opportunities," he emphasised.

Mr. Vincent Dale, Director General for Labour Market, Education, and Socioeconomic Wellbeing at Statistics Canada, shared from his experience working on diversity and inclusion issues in a Canadian context. He discussed the government's Disaggregated Data Action Plan, which is oriented around collecting statistics at the lowest possible level; carrying out intersectional analysis of those statistics; and driving the connection between statistics and decision-making.

He also discussed the recent development of a Quality-of-Life Framework, which recognises that policymaking should be driven not only by economic indicators, but also by aspects of socio-economic wellbeing. "What that has meant within the Labour Market Information Programme is much greater emphasis on not just the quantity of employment, but the quality of employment," he said: "which includes aspects like job security and access to training and development in the workplace."

"Employment Equity: Promoting Inclusion in Caribbean Labour Markets", was one of several knowledge-sharing seminars included on the agenda of the CDB's recently concluded 54th Annual Meeting which was held from June 17 - 20, 2024 in Ottawa, Canada. Similar events explored the impact of the Caribbean's cultural industries on Development and the need to improve regional logistics to accelerate trade and drive economic growth.

Deaths mount as Pakistan swelters in heatwave

As the temperatures rose in southern Pakistan, so did the body count.

The Edhi ambulance service says it usually takes around 30 to 40 people to the Karachi city morgue daily.

But over the last six days, it has collected some 568 bodies - 141 of them on Tuesday alone.

It is too early to say exactly what the cause of death was in every case.

However, the rising numbers of dead came as temperatures in Karachi soared above 40C (104F), with the high humidity making it feel as hot as 49C, reports said.

People have been heading to hospitals seeking help.

Civil Hospital Karachi admitted 267 people with heatstroke between Sunday and Wednesday, said Dr Imran Sarwar Sheikh, head of the emergency department. Twelve of them died.

“Most of the people who we saw coming into the hospital were in their 60s or 70s, although there were some around 45 and even a couple in their 20s,” Dr Sheikh told the BBC.

Symptoms including vomiting, diarrhoea and a high fever.

“Many of those we saw had been working outside. We’ve told them to make sure they drink plenty of water and wear light clothes in these high temperatures.”

The high temperatures - described as a “partial heatwave” by one meteorologist - began at the weekend.

Heatwave centres and camps were set up to try to provide relief to the public.

Pictures show children playing in fountains as they tried to cool off.

“Look at me! My clothes are totally drenched in sweat,” Mohammad Imran told Reuters news agency as he struggled to keep cool on Monday.

Not all those who needed help made it to hospital.

Wasim Ahmed knew he wasn’t feeling well when he arrived home.

The 56-year-old security guard had just finished a 12 hour overnight shift outside. Even then, he had found the temperatures too much.

“He came through the door and said I can’t deal with this hot weather,” Adnan Zafar, Wasim’s cousin, told the BBC. “He asked for a glass of water. Soon after he finished it, he collapsed.”

By the time Wasim’s family got him to hospital, the medics said he had already died of a suspected heart attack.

He had an existing heart condition, Adnan says, but he hadn’t suffered in the heat before.

Karachi’s struggle to cope with the high temperatures is, some fear, being made worse by regular power cuts which cut off the fans and air conditioning many rely on to keep cool.

Muhammad Amin was among those who was suffering with loadshedding - where the electricity supply was cut off; a common practice across Pakistan by the electricity board to try to preserve supply.

His relative says their flat experienced consistent constant power cuts.

According to his family, Muhammad who was in his 40s suddenly became sick, then died.

Cause of death has not been established, but his family suspect it was heat-related.

According to Dawn newspaper, almost 30 people have been found dead by emergency services on the city’s streets.

Many are suspected drug addicts, Police Surgeon Summaiya Syed told the newspaper. They did not, however, have any signs of injury.

Karachi is not the only part of Pakistan that is struggling to cope.

Last month, the province of Sindh - of which Karachi is the capital - recorded an almost record-breaking temperature of 52.2C, according to Reuters.

Pakistan’s neighbours have been suffering from extreme,

deadly temperatures in recent weeks as well.

Across the border in India, the capital Delhi has been enduring an “unprecedented”

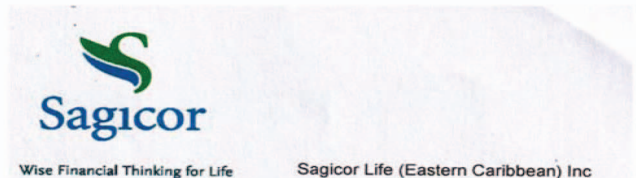

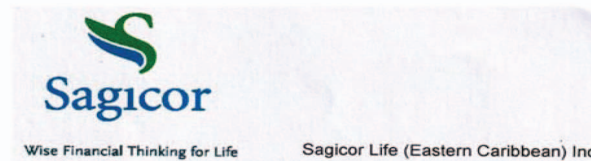

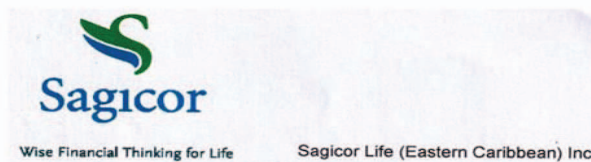

India reviews iPhone factory for 'not hiring married women'

The Indian government has sought a detailed report from Tamil Nadu state following media reports that Apple supplier Foxconn was allegedly rejecting married women for iPhone assembly jobs.

A Reuters investigation alleged that Foxconn had excluded married women from jobs at its main India iPhone plant near Chennai, citing their greater family responsibilities compared to unmarried women.

The federal labour ministry says the law "clearly stipulates

that no discrimination [is] to be made while recruiting men and women workers".

Foxconn said in a statement it "vigorously refutes allegations of employment discrimination based on marital status".

Neither Apple nor the Tamil Nadu state government

responded to requests for comment from Reuters.

The BBC has also reached out to the Tamil Nadu labour department for a response.

Foxconn, the largest supplier of Apple iPhones, set up its first factory in Tamil Nadu in 2017 but has since been aggressively expanding its operations in India.

In 2023, it began assembling the iPhone 15 in the state and earlier this year, Foxconn tied up with Google to make Pixel smartphones in Tamil Nadu.

The company said it does not stand for discrimination in hiring or recruitment.

In a recent round of recruitment, 25% of women hired were married, according

to the company.

It did acknowledge that 20 job ads posted by hiring agencies were removed in 2022 because they "did not meet our standards".

The discriminatory practices detailed in the Reuters investigation allegedly took place in 2023 and 2024.

"When we see an issue we act, including corrective action up to and including termination of the hiring agency," Foxconn added.

Rights activists say the reports about the firm's hiring practices in India are concerning, given that thousands look to its factories for employment opportunities.

Reuters said it spoke to numerous employees and Foxconn hiring agencies for the story.

The report said that hiring agents and Foxconn HR sources "cited family duties, pregnancy and higher absenteeism as reasons why Foxconn did not hire married women at the plant".

This is not the first time the firm has come under scrutiny for its labour practices.

In 2018, a US-based rights group had accused the firm of overworking and underpaying temporary workers at its factory in China that manufactured products for Amazon.

In 2022, its iPhone factory in China saw protests by workers who claimed that they had not been paid certain dues.

heatwave, with daily temperatures crossing 40C (104F) since May, peaking at nearly 50C.

Doctors in the city say they've never seen anything like it before.

For Karachi resident Mohammad Zeshan, it is clear what the problem is.

"This is due to climate change," he told Reuters. "This is happening all around the world. This is happening in Europe. They have faced intense heat but they have taken steps about it.

"But here, it is sad that government has not taken any effective measures."

Experts agree these sorts of extreme weather events are becoming more frequent and intense as a result of climate change.

The heatwave roasting Karachi is expected to last into next week, albeit with slightly lower temperatures forecast.

Weather experts are now turning their attention to the monsoon season, which is expected to arrive early and bring as much as 60% more rain, according to experts who spoke to Dawn.

India crush England to reach T20 World Cup final

India won by 68 runs

England’s defence of the T20 World Cup is over after they slumped to a 68-run thrashing by a superb India in the semi-final in Guyana.

Set 172 on a difficult pitch to make Saturday’s final, England’s batters folded and were dismissed for 103 in 16.4 overs.

Captain Jos Buttler gave them a solid start with 23 but his wicket was the first of four for 20 runs.

Phil Salt fell for five, Jonny Bairstow a three-ball duck and Moeen Ali eight from 10 balls.

When the superb Kuldeep Yadav, who took 3-19, bowled Harry Brook for 25 England were 68-6 and the game done, although there was still time for two dismal run-outs.

Buttler’s side were also guilty of allowing India to get to a score above par, although that was largely down to the excellence of Rohit Sharma and Suryakumar Yadav.

They overcame a slow surface that also kept low in a fine partnership of 73 from 50 balls that took India to 171-7 - Rohit hitting 57 and Suryakumar 47.

India, who have not won a World Cup for 13 years, will play first-time finalists South Africa - a meeting of the tournament’s two unbeaten sides in Barbados.

England will fly home on Friday and are next in action in a three-match Test series against West Indies, starting on 10 July.

England’s defence of the title they won in Melbourne in 2022 began with a struggle, kicked into life in the middle, but ends with a miserable defeat.

They were outclassed by India, who adapted to the tough conditions better - managing their batting innings perfectly and then being utterly ruthless with the ball.

Much of the talk beforehand was about how India would have progressed if no result was possible, with no reserve day in place.

The match was delayed by 75 minutes because of rain and interrupted again during India’s innings by another shower but, on this basis, the only thing unfair would have been Rohit’s side failing to win given the gulf between the two teams.

Before the tournament a run to the semi-finals would probably have been seen as a decent effort by England.

This result, and the fact they have only won one match against the major sides en route, means the futures of Buttler and coach Matthew Mott will be brought back into focus following the feeble defence of the 50-over World Cup last year.

They are not due to lead England again until September, when T20 and one-day international series against Australia begin.

India get revenge

England beat India by 10 wickets in Adelaide in the semi-finals in 2022. Buttler scored 80 not out that night but this time his dismissal, caught off the toe end to left-arm spinner Axar Patel’s first ball started the slide.

Salt was tied down in his eight balls before he was bowled trying to slog Jasprit Bumrah down the ground.

Bairstow was also bowled. He played a wild drive to Axar, who took 3-23, and was beaten on the inside edge. Moeen’s

dismissal was comical as he drifted out of his crease, unaware of where the ball had gone after being hit on the pad, and was stumped.

Sam Curran went plumb in front to wrist-spinner Kuldeep, who also bowled Brook around his legs.

If Moeen’s dismissal looked poor, Liam Livingstone’s was worse. He was sent back by Jofra Archer running for a single and was left well short.

As much as England were bad, credit must go to India, who charge into the final with momentum.

Rohit and SKY lift India

India’s only concern is the form of Virat Kohli. He was bowled by Reece Topley in the third over for nine as his run of low scores continued.

Crucially, with five to his name, Rohit cut hard in the air off Archer but the ball went through Phil Salt at backward point before he could get a hand to it.

Rohit rode his luck early as he looked to be aggressive, but played the match-winning partnership with Suryakumar, after Rishabh Pant was caught at mid-wicket off Sam Curran.

When they resumed on 65-2 off eight overs after the rain delay, Livingstone and Adil Rashid battled to restrain them but Curran was struck for 19 in one over.

Rohit was bowled by a Rashid googly that kept low and Suryakumar skied an Archer slower ball to long-on just as they threatened to take the game away.

From there England battled to limit the damage, with Chris Jordan dismissing Hardik Pandya and Shivam Dube in consecutive balls but not before Hardik had struck two flat sixes in 23 from 12 balls, while Ravindra Jadeja added 17 not out late on.

Livingstone and Rashid were the pick of the bowlers but that was only a sign of what was to come from Kuldeep and Axar.

Five-time champion Thompson-Herah out of Olympics

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Elaine Thompson-Herah, the two-time Olympic champion in the 100m and 200m, will miss the Paris Olympics with an Achilles injury.

The 31-year-old Jamaican, a five-time Olympic gold medallist, sustained the injury at the New York City Grand Prix on 9 June and had to be carried off the track.

Thompson-Herah - the only sprinter other than compatriot Usain Bolt to win multiple Olympic titles in both the 100m and 200m - was aiming to defend her 100m crown after choosing not to race in the Jamaica 200m trials.

She said a “small tear on my Achilles tendon” ended her chances of competing at a third Olympics.

“It’s a long road but I am willing to start over and keep working and to make full recovery and resume my track career,” Thompson-Herah wrote on Instagram.

“I am hurt and devastated to be missing the Olympics this year but at the end of the day it’s sports and my health comes first.”

Jamaicans have won the past four Olympic gold medals in the women’s 100m.

Thompson-Herah won gold in the 100m and 200m in Rio in 2016 and defended her titles in Tokyo five years later.

She won a fifth Olympic gold in Japan as part of Jamaica’s 4x100m relay team.
